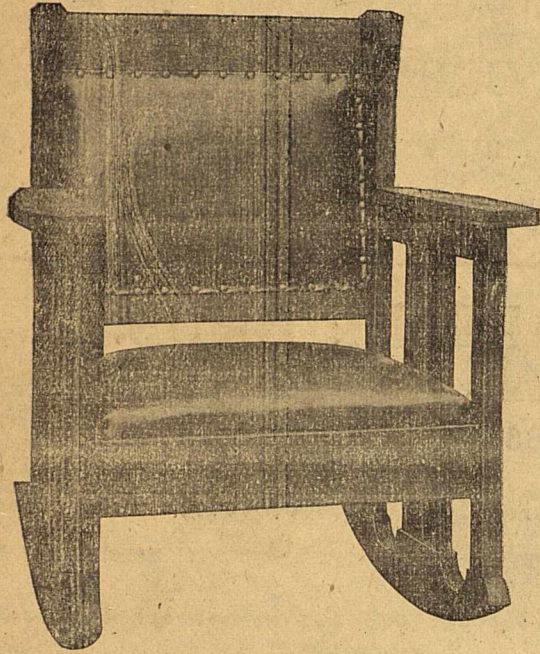
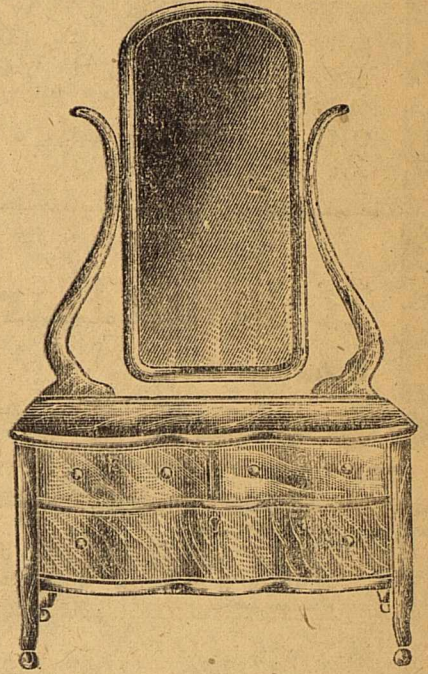

He Beat the Dry Weather.

He lived on a black, waxy prairie land almost due north of Dallas in a county that borders on Red River. His corn crop failed completely, but he never gave up. His wheat and oat stubble land untouched. On the 20th day he started his wheat drill over the stubble, putting in sorghum cane. On the same day he put four mules to a lister and began laying off rows, following immediately behind with a planter, putting in milo maize. After the maize was in, June corn was planted and the work finished in 2 or 3 days.

When he planted these things the earth was dry and there was not a shadow of a chance for a seed to come up until rain came. Rain fell in about in about a week after the last seed were sown in the dry earth. The cane, the milo maize and the June corn made fine yields. Early frost nipped the corn just a bit causing it to appear shrunken, but it weighed out 25 bushels, to the acre. Cane was cut with a wheat binder; maize with a row binder. The farmer fattened ten head of hogs and fed twelve head over until next year's crop was made. He ran a ten mule force and fed the animals on these crops from the time of harvest until the next year's crop was made.

MORAL: Never give up. One victory is recompense for a thousand defeats. The corn crops of Texas is nearly nothing this year. Large areas are burned up so far as corn is concerned. Every acre of corn land that has failed and every acre of stubble land should be planted to food

localities fails to plant crops by reason of lack of funds to buy seed. Secretaries of chambers of commerce and executives officers of other business organiza-

tions should take steps to secure seed for various localities.

We have all seen plenty of rain in July, August and September following a dry winter and spring. Have seen it more than once and may see it again this year.

June corn, milo maize, Spanish peanuts and soy beans will make a crop in about 100 days. Other crops about as follows: Sudan grass, 65 days; feterita, 75 days; New Era or hay pea (blue-speckled) 65 days; black-eyed and whippoorwill peas, 75 days; butter beans, small variety, 75 days. The crops can be grown practically anywhere in Texas if they are up by the end of the first week in August. Only a little rain on them is needed. Some have been grown when up even later. Plant, Plant, Plant.

THE STATE OF TEXAS: To the Sheriff or any Constable of Terry County—Greeting: You are hereby commanded to summon Clarence Ullery to be and appear before the Honorable County Court of Terry County, Texas, at the next regular term thereof, to be holden at the Court House in Brownfield, Terry County, Texas 4th Monday in August A. D. 1917, same being the 27th day of August A. D. 1917, then and there to answer the Plaintiff's Petition, filed in a suit in said Court on the 31st day of October A. D. 1916, wherein American National Bank of Roswell is Plaintiff and Clarence Ullery is Defendant. File number of said suit being No. 54. The nature of the Plaintiff's demand is as follows, to wit: That plaintiff, American National Bank of Roswell is a corporation organized and existing under the National Banking laws of the United States of America with its principal office and place of business at Roswell in Chaves County, in the State of New Mexico. That the defendant, Clarence Ullery, resides in Oklahoma City, in Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and owns real estate in Terry County, Texas.

That heretofore on, to-wit, the 14th day of June A. D. 1914, the defendant Clarence Ullery, for a valuable consideration made, executed and delivered to plaintiff his certain promissory note dated June 14th, 1914, for the sum of Three Hundred (\$300 00) Dollars payable to the order of the American National Bank of Roswell on the 4th day of September, A. D. 1914 with interest thereon at the rate of ten per cent per annum from maturity until paid and ten per cent additional on the sum of the principal and interest at date of payment as attorneys' fees, if after maturity said note is placed in the hands

of an attorneys for collection.

That plaintiff is still the legal holder and owner of said note; that same is long passed due and unpaid and, although often requested the defendant has failed and refused and still fails and refuses to pay the same or any part thereof, to plaintiff's damage in the sum of \$500 00.

HINTS FOR THE HORSE LOVER

Narrow-Chested Animals Do Not Possess Endurance of Broad-Chested Ones—Keep Things Orderly.

The horse that is "all legs" is not the one you want. Try to get those that are well set, neither too long legs nor too long bodies.

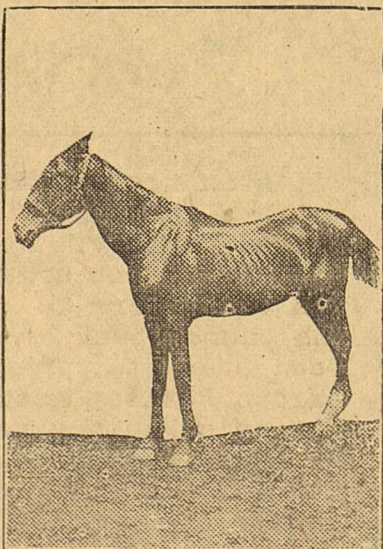
When a good horse lags don't put the whip on and make it go anyway. Stop and look into the matter. That horse is not well. If it were it would not lag. You do not like to be forced to work when you are sick. The horse is most like a man of any living animal.

It is foolish for the farmer to get

the notion that he can win money on the track with his horses. It is all right to give the horse a chance to show what is in them, but don't do it for money ever.

Have the sides of your stalls well nailed to place. Horses sometimes find out that they can crowd the partitions out of place and once they get that habit they will make life miserable for you.

Some horses have a way of throwing their hay out on the floor the first thing they do after feeding. If you feed through a chute from overhead you will be free from this difficulty. If not, the best way is to build in front

of the horses a rack of round, hardwood poles an inch or two in diameter, running from the manger overhead, firmly secured at both ends.

Narrow-chested horses have not the endurance that those have with good broad chests. Don't buy a thin-breasted horse.

Study your blacksmith, as well as your horses' feet.

Some horses can't eat straw without having impaction of the bowels, and that sometimes causes death.

A ration of good wheat bran once a week is a fine change for a horse. Wet it up good and he will relish it and it will act nicely on his bowels.

Hang up your dung forks. Don't stand them against the side of the barn, where they may be run into by a horse passing that way.

It is sometimes said that you can make any horse a good walker when you break him. That is not always true. You never can make fast walkers of some horses. It is not in them and you cannot put it in unless you

do it before they are born.

It is easy to hang up your harness if you once get into the habit of it. How many friends do you know that drop them on the floor?

The reason the varnish is coming off your wagon or carriage may be that you keep it in the room where horses are stabled. The chemicals from horse manure and urine will do it every time.

MOLDY FEED IS DANGEROUS

Farmers Are Losing Cattle From Eating Acorns—Take Precautions to Keep Poisons Out.

It is dangerous to give moldy or spoiled hay and other feeds to live stock, especially horses. Such feed is apt to cause sickness and even death. We have heard of instances where farmers have lost a number of valuable animals from this cause. Care should be exercised to see that all feed is in good condition. Hay put up when too damp may mold, corn and oats often harbor various kinds of fungous diseases that may be poisonous to stock, and corn silage when improperly stored may cause trouble. The food an animal eats has a marked influence upon its physical well-being. We are informed that, in Wisconsin, farmers are losing cattle from eating acorns picked up in the pastures. Young cattle are particularly affected. Sheep and hogs can eat the acorns without bad effects, and milch cows seldom die from this cause, but young calves are poisoned and little can be done for them. It is the part of wisdom to take precautions to keep feeds known to be dangerous away from animals, and give them only that which is in good and sound condition.—Farmer's Guide

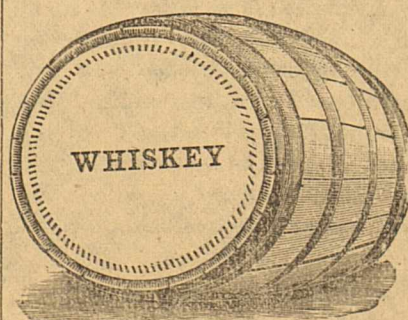

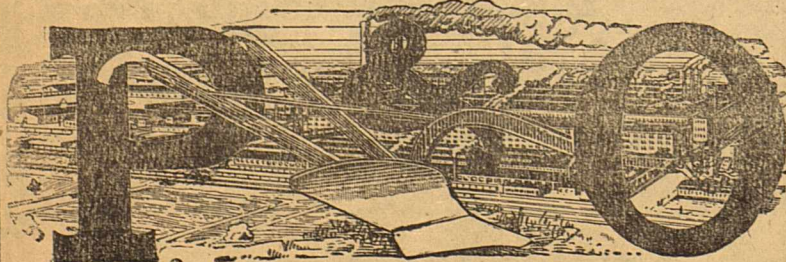

Buying Nickles at 37 Cents Each.

Extension of remarks of Hon. Charles H. Randall of California, in the house of representatives, Thursday, June 7, 1917.

Mr. Randall. Mr. Speaker, under the proposed schedules of alcoholic-liquor revenue the United States presents the ridiculous spectacle of buying its own nickels from the liquor traffic at the rate of \$4.49 per dozen, or 37 cents each! It is needless to say that I am apposed to the transaction and that every member of this House, wet or dry, should unite against such financial idiocy. There is nothing morally or financially sound in drawing revenue from any traffic or institution that brings disease, death debauchery, or any other harm to the people. It is repugnant to every moral and financial sense. But if the liquor traffic actually paid one single little lonesome tinker's tin tizzy of net revenue that would be both holy and wise compared with the folly which we commit in the pending revenue bill, for we submit to a national loss of \$7.56 in good, clean, wholesome money for every polluted, blood blistered, crime-cranked, tear stained dollar that covers into the Treasury.
