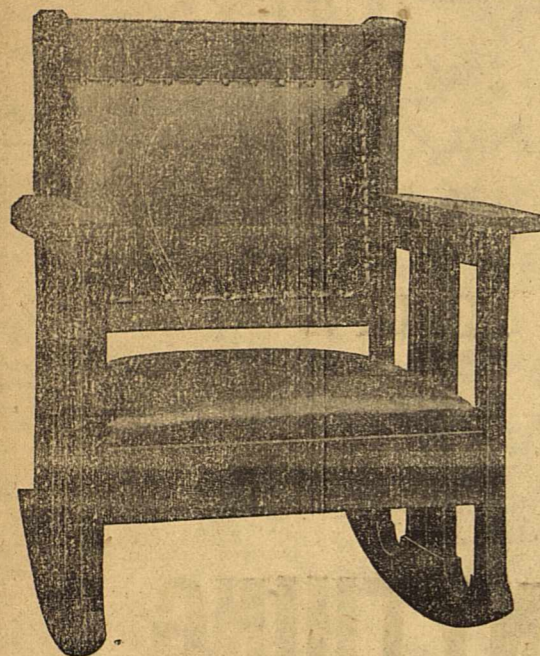
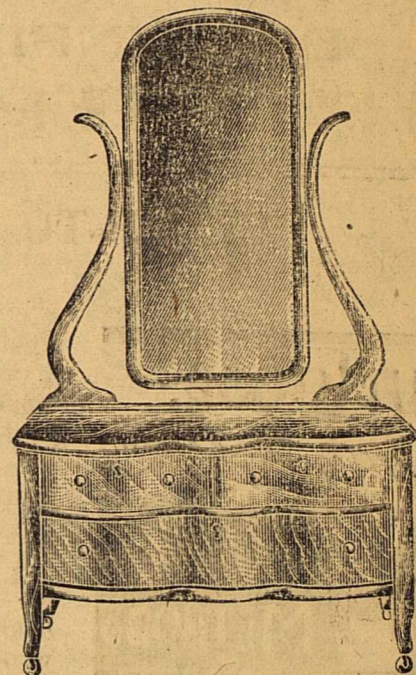

The Plot to Rule the World.

Two years before the outbreak of the present war, German general, Bernardi, published his remarkable book—"Germany and the Next War." It should be remembered that in Germany that authors do not publish what they please unless they please to publish what suits the German government.

Here are some of the things Bernardi said in his book. It is well to keep these things in mind when you read the German declaration that the present war was forced on Germany.

"War is a necessary element in the life of a nation for three reasons: First, it is a biological necessity. Healthy nations increase in numbers. They must have new territory to accommodate their surplus population and this must be obtained by conquest. The right of conquest is universally acknowledged. Might become the supreme right.

"Second, war is a moral necessity. When the states recoil from war the individual becomes cramped. Selfishness ruins riot. War is necessary to save the state from social petrification and stagnation.

"Third, war is a Christian necessity. It demands the exercise of constancy, heroism, devotion to one's country. Christianity is based on the law of love. But to love another nation at all the individual must love his own the less. Therefore supreme love for the state demands no love for the nation save one's own. Love for collective humanity outside of one's own state is impossible.

Arbitration treaties are detrimental to an aspiring people. The efforts directed toward the abolition of the war are not only foolish but absolutely immoral. That the weak nation has the same right to live as the powerful is unthinkable. The whole idea is contrary to the most disastrous consequences.

War is a peculiar necessity for Germany at the present time if she is to become, as God intends her, the sovereign of the world. "What we wish to attain must now be fought for.

War is not only a necessity for Germany, but is a duty which she owes to the world. God has raised up the German nation to be the world teacher. No nation on the globe is so able to grasp and appropriate all elements of culture as she.

"Thus the issue presented to Germany is 'World power or downfall.'

"In meeting this issue Germany must take the aggressive as did Frederick the Great. Germany must not wait until war is forced upon her. That is to court political downfall. The all important thing is not to postpone the war as long as possible but to bring it on under the most favorable conditions possible. In war the advantages are always with the attacking party. Germany must act on the defensive and strike the first blow.

In such a war Germany must expect the hostility of the civilized world. The Triple Alliance probably will break up by the withdrawal from it of Italy.

"England will be Germany's chief enemy upon the sea. A specific agreement with England is a will-o-the-wisp which no serious German statesman

Combination Shoe Polisher.
