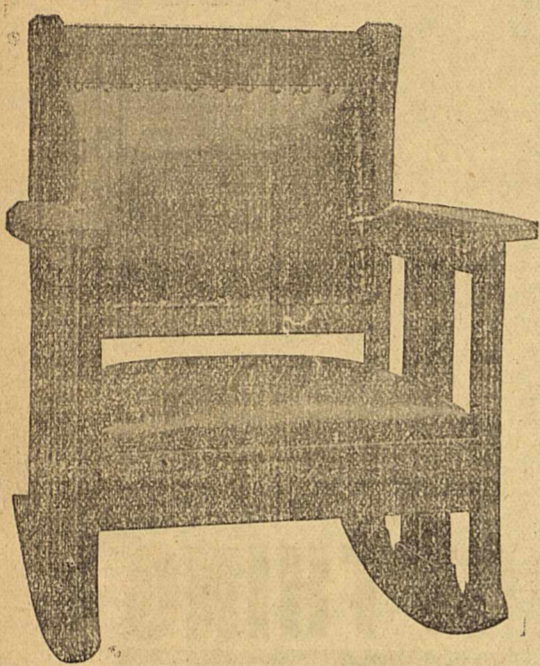
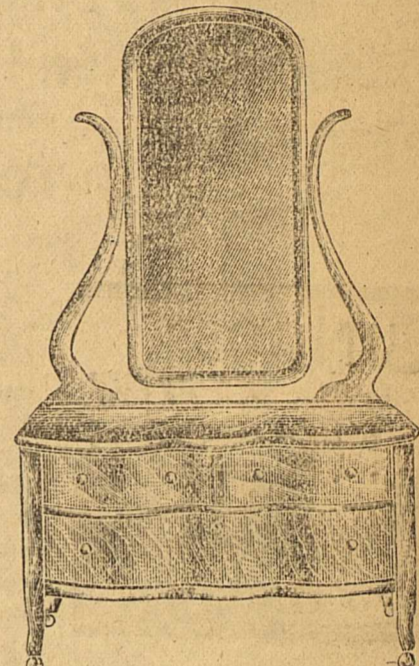

Austin, July 10th, 1917,
County Clerk, Terry County.

Dear Sir: On account of conditions resulting from an unprecedented drouth throughout the school land territory, I have concluded not to forfeit lands on August 15th this year for the non-payments of interest due to November 1st, 1917; that is, where persons are due one years interest up to last November I will not forfeit, but where inter-

est is due for 1915 it should be paid. Please make this known to your banks, land owners and other interested parties.

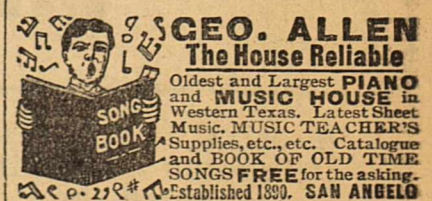

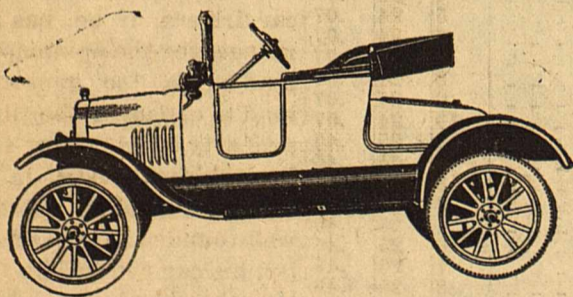

"Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" "And they all of one acclaim began to make excuses."

I can't understand by what process of reasoning any one can arrive at the conclusion that it is more the duty of one man to defend his country than it is another's. Our first duty is to God; our second is to our country our third is to our dependents, or loved ones.

The true gauge of patriotism is the willingness to face bullets on the field of battle, when liberty, or principle is in jeopardy. It certainly requires no great amount of patriotic fervor to pursue willingly and perhaps gladly, our regular occupations in time of war. The raising of crops, cattle, goats, hogs, poultry—in fact the pursuit of any gainful occupation is but very little more necessary in war times than any other times. But it does require, not only patriotism but courage, to exclaim, with Old Isiah "Here am I, send me!"

Why We are at War.

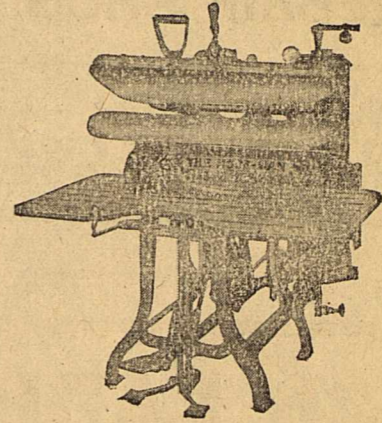
