True View of a German-American.

The following from a Mr. Kotzenabe, in the Chicago Tribune, merits a nation-wide reading, both to show such Germans they need to appreciate the feelings of those Germans who have adopted America as their country, and how such Germans should regard their relations to America and humanity in this world-wide struggle to save civilization from military barbarism. Mr. Kotzenabe says: "Because of my birth, and feelings beyond my control, I have no particular love for French

and less for the British, but by a strange irony of fate, I see those nations giving their life-blood for principles which I hold dear and against the wrong principles of the people I individually love. It is a very unhappy paradox, but one that I cannot escape.

"I do not want to see the allies triumph over the land of my birth, but I do very much want to see the triumph over the principles for which they are fighting. It sickens my soul to think of this nation going forth to destroy people, many of whom are bound to me by ties of blood and friendship, but it must be so. It

is like a dreadful surgical operation. The militaristic, undemocratic demon which rules Germany must be cut out; it is for us to do it now.

"I try to tell myself that it is not our affair; that we should not contest ourselves with measures of defense and neutrality; but I know this is not true. If Prussianism triumphs, we shall be in real peril, and those ideas for which so much of the world's best blood has been spilled, through the centuries, will be in danger of extinction.

"Let us make war on Germany not from revenge, nor to uphold hair splitting quibbles over in-

ternational law, but with all our whole heart and all our strength because Germany worships one God (might) and we another (right). One or the other must perish.

"Let us make war on the Germany of Junkerism, the Germany of frightfulness, the Germany of arrogance and selfishness; and let us swear not to make peace until the imperial German government is the imperial German people."

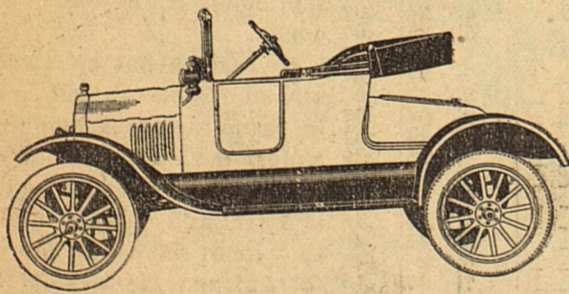

SHELL FACTORY IS BIG CITY

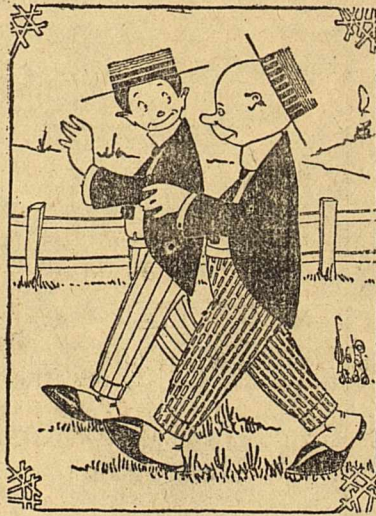
Description of One Plant in England Gives Some Idea of Immense Industry Created by War.

Some idea of the immense task imposed upon Great Britain in supplying munitions for its great guns on the battle front in France is given in a description in the Yorkshire Observer of a shell factory in Cumberland.

The factory is divided into three areas, comprising an imposing township. The men engaged in construction work number 10,500, and have numbered over 15,000. The operative labor includes 3,000 males and over 9,000 females, while of the staff of 12,000, a third are females. There are 85 hotels, housing over 6,000 workers; 134 bungalows, accommodating 1,300, and married quarters

for 500 families. There are factory police, woman police and kitchens and messrooms which supply 14,000 meals daily. There are places of worship, shops run largely on the cooperative principle, a laundry, a fire brigade, a medical staff, ambulances, a sanitary officer, modern and well-equipped schools with over 400 pupils, places of entertainment, and about everything else tending to constitute an important industrial and residential center. No sale of spirituous liquors is allowed within the area.—Providence Journal.

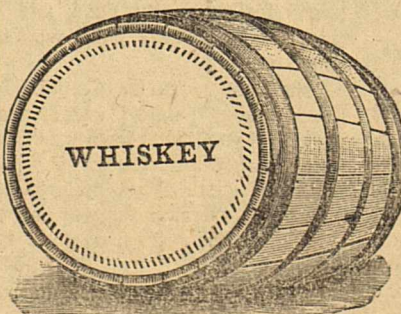

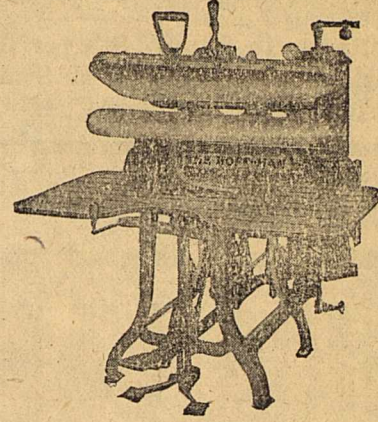

Summer Feed Crops.

Fred crops are just as important as food crops in this section. Every acre possible therefore

should be planted in feed crops after the winter grains are harvested. The late planted feed crops may not have time to mature. Yet they will make hay or help fill a silo and thereby be a means of producing more beef, mutton, pork, and butter.

Whatever is planted this late in the season, be it milo, sorghum or other forage, must be of short season varieties. The county agent will be glad to advise in the matter. The farmer himself must decide whether moisture conditions are satisfactory for planting.

In localities it is worth while planting such root crops as stock beets, red beets, turnips, rutabagoes, and others as late as in August if the moisture conditions are good. These root crops are not effected by the ordinary low fall temperatures in this section and in mild winters will grow throughout the season.

Any way feed crops are so important in this country so well adapted to live stock that every possible acre should be made to produce feed. It is also time to decide to build or dig a silo to save the feed crops. The Santa Fe Railway has issued a practical bulletin on the silo. N. M. Bainer, Topeka or L. L. Johnson Amarillo, will be glad to send you a copy.

The demand for beef, mutton, pork and butter will continue strong. The feed crops and the silo will be useful in producing those more cheaply and sufficiently and add to the farmer's bank account.
