### Are Fighting for Cause of Humanity

An Associated Press dispatch, dated at London, July 31st, and coming wireless from Amsterdam, says:

"The German authorities at Leige, Belgium, arrested, tried and sentenced to death within three days an influential Liege merchant named Groneret, his wife and their two daughters, aged 20 and 14 years, on the unapproved charge of espionage.

"The father and mother were both shot to death in the presence of their daughters. The latter were offered their freedom if they revealed the names of their parents' accomplices. The girls refused, the eldest stating: "If we speak we might cause fifty people to be killed. We would rather die alone."

"She was immediately shot. The younger girl was then tortured, outraged and also shot."

For the punishment of such inhuman outrages is one of the reasons why America is to day at war with Germany, and is one of the reasons why we will stay at war with Germany until Germany is suppressed and the world knows peace again.

Hedges vs. Fences.

In many parts of the country hedges are taking the place of fences, and the change is certainly a desirable one from the standpoint of beauty. They require little, if any, more care than a fence, and are equally as serviceable. Of course, we don't mean that hedges are more desirable for fields than fences, but as a surrounding for the house and yard they are preferable. There are two general kinds of hardy hedges, the deciduous and evergreen, but the former is more common in this country and seems to meet with the most favor. In planting deciduous shrubs, a trench 4 feet wide and 6 inches deep should be dug the length of the row. A drainage should then be provided of broken stone and the bed filled with the best soil it is possible to obtain. In planting, care should be taken to follow the direction given by the nurseryman, so that when the shrubs mature they will be close enough together.—Exchange.

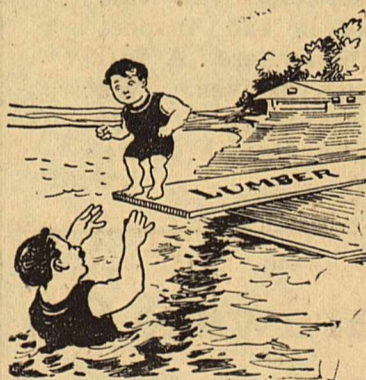

### NEWLY DISCOVERED GAS.

Thermaline is a newly discovered gas first prepared in Zurich, Switzerland. It is a combination of acetylene and oil vapor, and it finds its application in autogenous welding, where a high heat is required. It is said to have several advantages over the oxyacetylene gas now widely used for the purpose, among them being a smaller explosive range. A portable apparatus for generating the gas has been perfected by the discoverer. The generator is charged with alternate layers of calcium carbide and sawdust soaked in oil. Presumably the action of water on the carbide is used to free acetylene and the acetylene is used as a heating agent to vaporize the oil.

### Kissing the Black Stone.

As well die a Jew or a Christian as not make the pilgrimage to Mecca, said Mahomet; and no obligation of Islam is more piously discharged. It is believed that the ritual connected with the visit to the Ka'aba—the "square building"—and the kissing of the black stone go back to days of idolatry, the "time of ignorance" before the new faith bloomed, says the London Chronicle. The black stone, which measures about six inches by eight, is believed to have fallen from Paradise, to have been guarded during the deluge and handed to Abraham by Gabriel when the Ka'aba was built. Certain parts of the ceremonial—the throwing of stones at the devil, and the imitation of Hagar's distracted wanderings in the desert, are supposed to have had significance for the pre-Mohammedan times as well as for Islam.

### Sow Winter Wheat Right

The wheat growing methods on the plains have been severely tested this season. As a rule the yield of wheat on well prepared land has been higher than on land hurriedly prepared. To obtain first hand information as to the best methods actually followed in wheat growing farmers, millers, and bankers have interviewed in the Plainview, Texas and the Clovis N. M. districts and reports secured from other sections on the plains.

Yields of twenty-five bushels to the acre have been made this year. These high yields were made on well prepared and deep seed beds. Many farmers say they obtain the best results by growing a crop every other year and thoroughly working the land in the meantime to get a deep firm seed bed at the time of planting. Many double list their land. After leveling, the disc and harrow are used to kill the weed and keep the field in good tilth.

The advantage of tilling the land deep, be it wet or dry, is generally admitted. The farmers say that the crop of 1917 was made very largely on the moisture stored at the time of seeding last fall, the rainfall in some localities being only two or three inches during the growing season. The shallow seed bed had not enough moisture stored to make a fair crop.

The best time for seeding is between Sept 18th and Oct. 18th. A press drill is generally used and the seed planted deep enough to reach moisture, but not less than 2 1-2 inches. Seed of high vitality may be planted 4 inches deep, though three inches may be the best depth.

Well graded plump seed give the best results. The quality of the seed wheat is a most important consideration and the experienced farmer aims to use the best. In some localities the farmers are arranging to ship in pure seed wheat.

The seed wheat is treated for smut. This feature in wheat growing warrants the most careful attention. The methods of

treating seed grain for smut are simple and not expensive, the Formalin treatment.

Nearly every farmer pastures his wheat field. It is usually late in the spring before the stock is moved from the field. Every body admits that pasturing wheat heavily effects the grain yield.

The experience of the best wheat growers may be summed up as follows.

Have a deep firm seed bed, free from weeds and volunteer wheat at the time of seeding.

Sow the wheat between Sept. 15th and Oct. 15th, many prefer Sept. seeding.

Use only extra good seed, carefully treated for smut. One bushel to the acre is the rule.

Use a press drill and sow deep enough to reach moisture, but not less than 2 1-2 inches deep, preferably 3 inches.

Pasture very lightly if at all for a month or so in winter to obtain the best grain crop.

Wheat land must be industrially gone over the next few weeks.

### Louisiana and Texas Furnish Sulphur

More than 98 per cent of the native sulphur now produced in the United States comes from deposits in Louisiana and Texas according to Philip S. Smith, of the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, but deposits of sulphur that have been or might be productive occur in Wyoming, Nevada, Utah, California, Colorado, Oregon, and Alaska.

Louisiana and Texas apparently produce enough sulphur to supply even an extraordinary demand for the combined output of these two states, although the production has not been vigorously pushed, has so greatly exceeded the amount sold that large stocks of sulphur have accumulated.

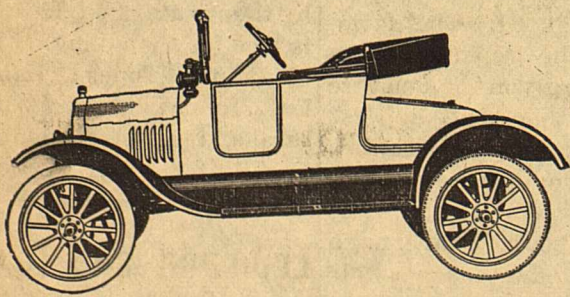
