LIKE A MEDIEVAL ROMANCE

Rich American Living in France Was Imprisoned, Tortured and Robbed by His Employees.

The sensational series of adventures which befell a wealthy American sojourning in France will not have been forgotten, though no fresh details regarding the affair transpired while the investigation was following its course, says a Paris correspondent. Mr. Slater was sequestered and tortured by a hired bully at the instigation of his chauffeur and a woman named Roosmal, the latter couple being arrested just after they had got married and as they were alighting from a motor car purchased with the American's money, at the gates of the chateau in which they had kept him a prisoner.

It has now been established, the Matin's correspondent at Gannat says, that the chauffeur and his wife spent 80,000 francs during their tenancy of the Chateau du Bouchaud. In order to force him to satisfy their pressing and continual need for money, Barran, the "jailer" told off to guard Mr. Slater, tortured his victim in a thousand ways, beating him, placing dead cats and rats and irritant powder in his bed, and on each occasion informing him that it was the work of the "Black Hand."

Meanwhile Biscaye, the chauffeur, appropriated his employer's linen, silver and jewels, sold his valuable furniture, had his own initials embroidered on Mr. Slater's underwear and, taking the latter's overcoat, worth 10,000 francs, to a tailor, had it altered to fit himself.

SOLDIERS BLINDED IN WAR

They Are Happier and More Fortunate Than Those Who Have Lost Arms or Legs, It Is Claimed.

"It has been frequently stated that the soldiers who have lost their sight in the world war are happier than those who have lost legs or arms or have been otherwise maimed," remarked Capt. H. A. Jones, a member of a Canadian regiment, who recently was invalidated home, according to the Washington Post.

"I found that this was true, for in the two months I spent in the hospitals of England I observed closely the bearing and conduct of the blinded soldiers. The feeling of helplessness that overwhelms a strong, healthy, newly blind man is incredibly relieved when he finds that the one who is to instruct him in some profitable employment is suffering from the same handicap as himself. Men who are prepared to argue and disagree with the methods of a sighted instructor follow with keenness and appreciation those instructors who are themselves blind.

"I venture to say that of all the soldiers who have been seriously wounded in the war and must be handicapped the rest of their lives the blind will be far more independent and able to take care of themselves than those otherwise maimed. So many industries of profit are taught the blind soldiers and they apply themselves so assiduously that they become more proficient in whatever occupation they take up than a legless or armless soldier could possibly become in anything he elected to follow."

CHINESE WOULD BUILD SHIPS.

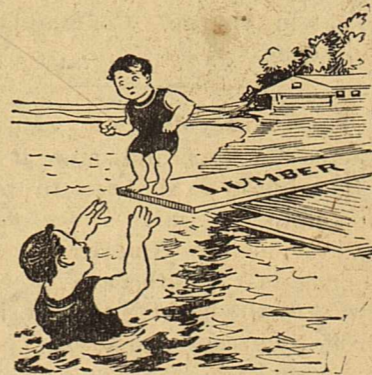

"To live as a member of the great white race of men, to share its thoughts and aspirations, it is necessary that a man should

read his newspaper," said U. S. Senator Sterling, of South Dakota, in an address to the students at the University of South Dakota. "The newspaper," he continued, "has come to be indispensable. It goes and penetrates everywhere. It has been said has been said of the newspapers that they are to the whole civilized world what the daily house talk is to the household; they keep our daily interest in each other; they save us from the evils of isolation. "I like to go back to the splendid principle on which the fine structure rests. And that principle is the freedom of the press. Our forefathers must have had the gift of prophecy in regard to the press; they must have foreseen to what power and influence it would come. They had no dread of publicity of official acts or motives. They had faith in the ultimate triumph of truth. Jefferson was willing that error might be presented if truth could be left free to combat it. He was opposed to the censorship of the press, and said that if he must choose between a government without newspapers and newspapers without a government he would prefer to risk the newspapers without the government. He believed that public opinion would measurably correct things if public opinion were left free, but that government without a free expression of public opinion would become a despotism.

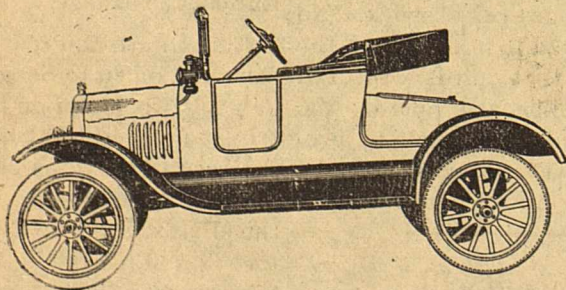

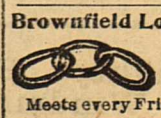

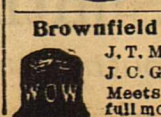

The Appearance Of Radium.

The Geological Survey, Department of Interior, has received numerous inquiries about the appearance of radium, many of which seem to have been prompted by carelessly written stories, appearing in periodicals of the poorer class, that tell of remarkable finds of nearly pure radium.

Radium is a metal, and has a white metallic luster; it has been isolated only once or twice, and few people have seen it. Radium is ordinarily obtained in the form of salts, and is usually so sold and used. These salts are all white or nearly white substances whose appearance is no more remarkable than that of common salt or baking powder. Radium is found in nature in quantities so exceedingly small that it is never visible even when the material is examined with a powerful microscope. Ordinarily radium ore carries only a small fraction of a grain of radium per ton of material, and radium will never be found in large masses because it formed by the decay of uranium, a process that is wonderfully slow, and radium itself decays and changes into other elements so rapidly that it is impossible for it to accumulate naturally in visible masses. Radium and radium minerals are not generally luminescent. Tubes containing radium glow from impurities present which the radiations from the radium cause to give light.

Minerals that carry radium are fairly easy to determine, for

they affect photographic films in the same way as ordinary light, and they can also be identified by their effect upon an electroscope.

Apple Orchards.

The editor and family accompanied by Walter Holden and family, saw two or three of the best apple orchards in the country Sunday, and while the long drouth has put a crimp in them they are holding up exceptionally well, and it makes one have even more confidence in old Terry. Sunday morning we saw Wm. Howard's orchard, 6 miles north of town. His trees have a very light crop, on account of the May 7th frost, and with few exceptions, the fruit is small and knotty. In the afternoon we saw the 25 acre orchard of Ben Broughton, two miles north of Gomez. In returning, we saw the best orchard in the trip, out at the Sawyer residence, one mile west of town, which has had more rain, and seems to be better cultivated. Having our camera along we got a few snaps of this orchard which will be produced in the Herald latter.

Mr. Holden says there is little fruit of any kind grown down his way and he was surprised to find a good apple and grape country so near him. Old Terry is hard to beat.

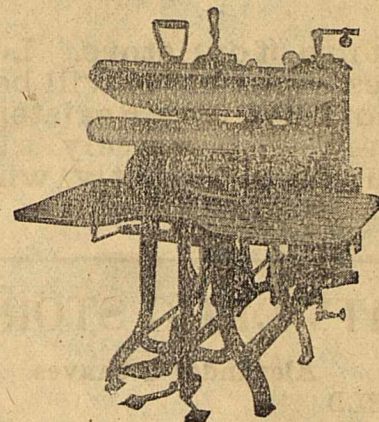
