FRANKLIN WAS A VEGETARIAN

Declares He Saved Money With Which to Buy Books and Gained by Reason of Clear-Headedness.

Franklin told us how to outwit the beef trust, save money, improve our health and enrich the brain all at one stroke. As nobody else could possibly tell it so well as Ben himself, I quote him, writes Girard in the Philadelphia Ledger.

"When about sixteen years of age I happened to meet with a book, written by one Tryon, recommending a vegetable diet. I determined to go into it. My brother, being yet unmarried, did not keep house, but boarded himself and his apprentices in another family.

"My refusing to eat flesh occasioned an inconvenience, and I was frequently chid for my singularity. I made myself acquainted with Tryon's manner of preparing some of his dishes, such as boiling potatoes or rice, making hasty pudding and a few others, and then proposed to my brother that if he would give me weekly half the money he paid for my board, I would board myself. He instantly agreed to it, and I presently found that I could save half what he paid me.

"This was an additional fund for the buying of books, but I had another advantage in it. I made the greater progress from that greater clearness of head and quicker apprehension which generally attend temperance in eating and drinking."

And he kept on thinking so clearly that he was one of the most active creators of the constitution of the United States when he was eighty-one years old.

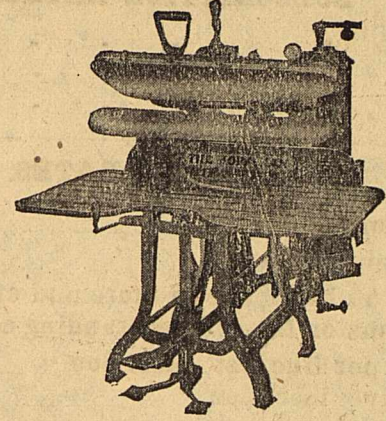

Feeding the World.

This company is mindful of the fact that a big per cent of the foodstuff used by the people in the U. If the exigencies of the government requires it, the entire facilities of the Santa Fe will be devoted to the service of the government, even to the extent of canceling all trains now serving the public; but the most resourceful prophet looking into the future, can see no such situation. The transportation of more than 100,000 cars of material for Army Camps and the National Guard Camps now in progress over the several railways, without interfering with the regular movement of traffic, is the best evidence that the carriers can discharge the duty devolving upon them in any emergency by which they may be confronted.

Railway Maintenance Costly.

"The key to railroad efficiency is good track and equipment," said R. J. Parker, general manager of Western Lines of the Santa Fe System, to-day is discussing the movement of million soldiers and their equipment and supplies to the various training camps.

The up-keep of track, locomotives, and other rolling stock is therefore the first considera-

tion. The cost of this is heavy. The maintenance of way and structures on the 5869 miles of Western Lines for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, cost \$4,790,049.43 or about \$1238.00 a mile. The maintenance of equipment cost \$7,137,617.62 or about \$1847.00 a mile; a total cost per mile of line for these two items alone of over \$3,000.00 or nearly one half the entire cost of moving the traffic of the year.

"It takes an army of men, distributed along the entire line, to renew worn steel and ties and bridges, culverts, and roadbeds in good repair. Another army of men looks after locomotives and rolling stock generally. It required eternal vigilance night and day to keep track and equipment in condition for safe and speedy movement of traffic.

"The Santa Fe continued to maintain track and equipment cost what it may, as the Santa Fe territory must be developed. The Santa Fe is an integral part of the industrial and business life of every community on its lines and endeavors to perform its part by moving traffic promptly and safely. This demands good track and equipments.

"Present traffic conditions are abnormal," Mr. Parker added, "and it is not easy to maintain the all important efficiency required to move the heavy government business without inconvenience to the public. The Santa Fe therefore appreciates more ever the co-operation of the people along its lines."

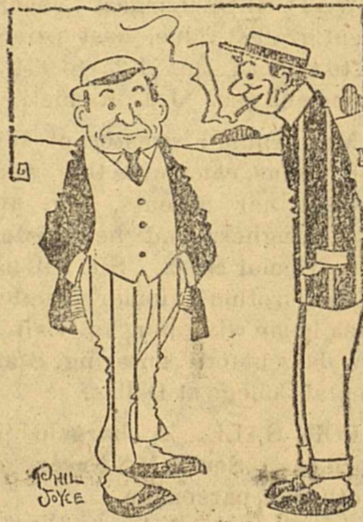
ADJECTIVE IS MODERN EVIL

Authors of Ancient Classics Were Not Given to Its Excessive Use as Are Writers of Today.

This being the era of pretexts, with war as the basis, the suggestion comes that our literary folk economize in the matter of adjectives. These and their associates, the adverbs, are looked upon as diseases of the vocabulary, the excess adipose tissue, so to speak, says the Cincinnati Enquirer. The five-meal per diem Germans have found that enforced abstemious living has been good for them physically, though it has brought mental suffering. So, too, it is argued, our literature will be improved by the exclusion, as far as possible, of adjectives.

The authors of the ancient classics were not given to elaboration of substantives. In Leonardo, Dante and Virgil these facts are amply supported. In the "Divina Commedia," which contains all told 6,215 adjectives, only 17 are in the superlative. In the second book of the "Aeneid," in which is recounted the fall of Troy, there are 1,637 nouns and only 589 adjectives. It is a matter of regret that the tendency toward the use of adjectives is found in the war dispatches. That the superlative is being constantly appealed to is also regrettable. If our language, spoken and written, emerges from the conflict looking like the warriors, lean, lithe and limber, it will be a compensation for other losses.

LUMINOUS LIFE BELT.

In the darkness of a storm at sea, many a shipwrecked person, clinging to a life preserver, has finally despaired and gone down for lack of means by which he or she could signal to rescuers. It is made in either circular or folding form, and firmly strapped to it are two electric flashlights, thoroughly insulated against contact with the water and operated by a conveniently located button. The two lights are placed some distance apart so that if one is submerged the other probably will project above the water. The flashing signal of such a life belt would many times attract attention when a person clinging to an ordinary preserver would be undiscovered in the darkness.

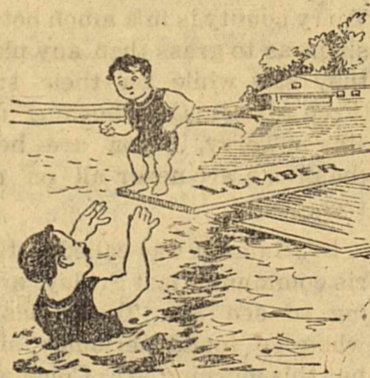
