## Liberty Loan No. 2

The following open letter to all County Judges in the Dallas Federal Reserve district has been handed to us by the Dallas Bank with request to publish.

Dear Judge:-

In view of your fine record of active patriotism during the issuance of the last Liberty Loan you will not be surprised to learn that we have decided to ask you to serve your country once more in the same manner.

You took an active part in the movement in your county which provided the money for men and material to fight the battle of civilization in which the whole world is engaged.

The thought that you were able to make a definite and tangible contribution to history must be a source of great pride to you and to the people who responded so splendidly to your call. We congratulate you. Civilization and Right have not yet established their superiority over Might and Barbarism. The common enemy of humanity is still hoping to enslave our marhood and wealth; still hoping to abuse our womankind, and tear our children limb from limb as they are doing wherever they can in Europe.

These horrors must be averted, and nothing but a continuance of your efforts—redoubled efforts, will avert them.

To urge you further is unnecessary. The answer to the call of the Liberty Loan lies deep in your heart.

However, a word on the economic and financial aspect of the matter will not be out of place. The situation is serious but not disconcerting. Our annual national income has been estimated at Forty Billion Dollars. We have to find during the first twelve months of the war, Eighteen and one-half Billion Dollars, or about 47 percent of all we earn.

We can accomplish this in only one way, viz: by economizing and saving. Waste and extravag-

ance must go. As our president has said, we must organize in the home, on the farm, in the factory—everywhere in fact for greater efficiency. The money now wasted on the "necessaries" of life must be saved and invested in the National and International cause.

We must become a nation of savers or perish. Let this be the keynote of our campaign.

Now for the details of the campaign. We believe that the methods adopted last time should be repeated in every detail, only with greater enthusiasm and force.

The amount we have to raise is larger; the danger to our nation has grown; our responsibilities are deepened proportionately. We ask you to accept the program outlined on the attached sheet, as a working plan upon which to build your organization. We believe you will agree that the foundation is a solid one.

Will you please acknowledge receipt of this letter, as it is essential that we know you have received it.

With our regards and a sincere hope that we will receive the same splendid co-operation as did before.

## "WAR BABIES" FROM BELGIUM

Writer Tells Pathetic Story of Two Youngsters Lost in Throng of Refugees From Stricken Land.

In Pierre Loti's book, "War," is this pathetic story about war babies:

"One evening a train full of Belgian refugees had just entered the railway station of one of our southern towns. Lost in that mournful throng were two quite young children, holding each other tightly by the hand, two little boys, evidently two little brothers. The elder, five years of age, perhaps, was protecting the younger whose age may have been three. No one claimed them; no one knew them. Their clothes were neat, and they wore warm little woolen stockings. So overwhelmed were they with weariness and want of sleep that they did not even cry. Scarcely could they stand upright. They could not answer the questions that were put to them, but above all they refused to let go of each other; that they would not do. At last the big, elder brother realized the responsibilities of his character of protector; he summoned up strength to speak to the lady who was bending down to him. 'Madame,' he said, in a very small, beseeching voice, already half asleep, 'Madame, is anyone going to put us to bed?' For the moment this was the only wish they were capable of forming; all that they looked for from the mercy of mankind was that someone would be so good as to put them to bed. They went to sleep at once, still holding hands and nestling close to each other. And these poor little Belgian children, sleeping side by side, made me think of two nestlings, astray."

## CAVALRY'S LAST DAYS SEEN

Army Leaders Accept Conclusion That Work of Horsemen Can Now Be Done Better by Airplane.

The new army being raised by the United States will contain no cavalry, the general staff has decreed, according to the Kansas City Star. The conclusion of the French army leaders that everything that cavalry ever did can now be done better by airplanes is accepted.

And thus passes another of the glimmers of war. No more shall the flying plumes of a Murat's cuirassiers have a place on the field of battle; no more shall a "Jeb" Stuart's daredevil ride cut off the supplies of an army; no more shall a Sheridan's hard riders lay waste a Shenandoah.

From the French word for horseman came our word chivalry, but with the coming of the airplanes, chivalry has taken to the sky. As Will Irwin says, it is the fliers in this war who do the deeds that used to be associated with the foaming steeds of the cavalry. 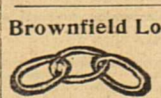

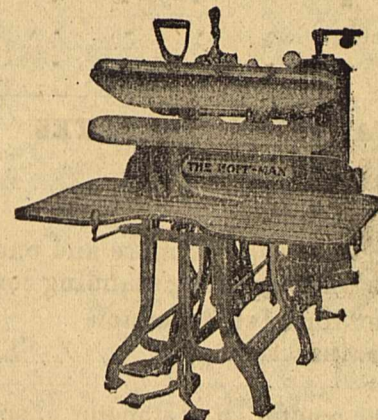

T. Whitaker is plaintiff and Jaunita Busby, and the unknown heirs of Jaunita Busby are defendants, said petition alleging that on or about the 1st day of March A. D. 1917, he was lawfully seized and possessed of the following described land and premises, situated in Yoakum County, Texas, holding and claiming the same in fee simple, to-wit:—

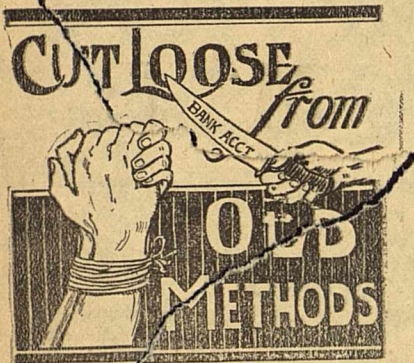

### Moves To Brownfield.

J. E. Shelton, one of the pioneer residents of this town, and the first postmaster at Roaring Springs, moved his family to Brownfield, Terry county, yesterday, where he has been engaged in the real estate business for some time.

Mr. Shelton is a desirable citizen in every sense of the word, public spirited, enterprising, loyal and a town builder, and the people of the county seat of Terry county are to be congratulated upon the acquisition of himself and his estimable wife and children. They are people of which any community can have reason to feel proud.—Roaring Springs Report.

### Repair Worn Machinery.

The great out cry for farm production and the scarcity of machinery points to the need of some way to repair a great many implements that are now useless largely because of the neglect with which they have been treated, say the United States Department of Agriculture, which adds that the machinery manufacturers and their local sales agents should help to perform this reform service.

Throughout the country there are thousand of binders, mowers and other farm machines rusting in the fence corners, and many of these might be made available for further valuable service. The manufacturers of farm machinery are admittedly unable to furnish all the new machines required and are paying for full page advertisements to influence governmental authorities to insure them necessary raw material and transportation in competition with the demand for machines of war.

The railroads of the country, according to one of their officials

are being compelled in the present emergencies to rescue practically every scrap locomotive from the old-iron graveyards and rebuild them for active service. A similar plan should be adopted, says the department, for the reclamation of this cast-off farm equipment through the agency of central repair shops where the work could be done. Many of the machines might be made available for further service with repairs of comparatively small cost.

Added to the almost sinful carelessness of some farmers there has been the attitude on the part of farm machinery manufacturers in years past to favor the abandonment of worn and disabled machines in order to sell new ones; but now the time has arrived when it is difficult to supply the market with the necessary new machinery. The department suggests that the representatives of the manufacturers, on the one hand, and of the farmers—such as farm bureau agents or county agents—on the other hand, should get together to establish the necessary farm machinery repair stations in convenient localities.

A report has gone out that there are 40 cases of typhoid in Brownfield and ten deaths. As a matter of fact, there has only been seven cases all told, with two deaths resulting. Six of these cases developed just after the picnic here, Aug. 3rd, and it is thought a visitor had fever here that day, and scattered it thru public drinking cups, which ought to be prohibited by law.

I told how at first, when notified, the coroner had thought De Soto was a molder who had drowned near Hannibal the day before and had asked that everything possible be done to revive the corpse. When the doctor said that he understood the man had been dead for 400 years the coroner abruptly told him he must not believe all he heard.

The story of the inquest was given with minute detail and included an obituary of the explorer. This gave the readers something more to talk about, and the number of those who believed in the reality of the story increased. An enterprising museum man of St. Louis heard of it and wired up an offer of \$1,000 for the casket and its contents. Some of the country press roundabout took to the yarn quite seriously, and began to argue how it was possible or impossible for the bones of the explorer to be found at this day.

Of course, our loathsome local contemporaries made no reference whatever to the incident, so that we had the home crowd in our own hands. It was an "exclusive" story, and we played it up for some days along those lines. The other papers were silent because they had been scooped the greatest scoop of the century.

So people continued to talk and to write about it until one up-river church considered the idea of running an excursion to view the remains. Then it was that we began to consider the best way to get rid of the ghostly corpus delicti.

### Vast Deposit of Asphalt.

The vastest deposit of asphalt in the world, hitherto untouched, is about to be opened up. This is in northwestern Canada, its southern boundary being about 300 miles north of Edmonton. The area, according to the Scientific American, is, probably, not less than one thousand square miles, and the average thickness is upward of 100 feet. The railroad from Edmonton, begun two years ago, is now almost completed, and it will be possible to get this asphalt out. Its form is a sand containing 15 per cent bitumen. At the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research in Pittsburgh a process for separating the asphalt from the sand has been developed.

All this is now on Canadian government property, but it is expected that it will be opened for commercial exploitation.

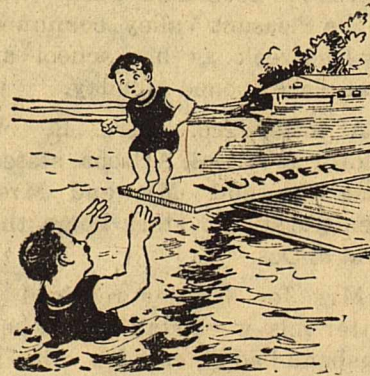
