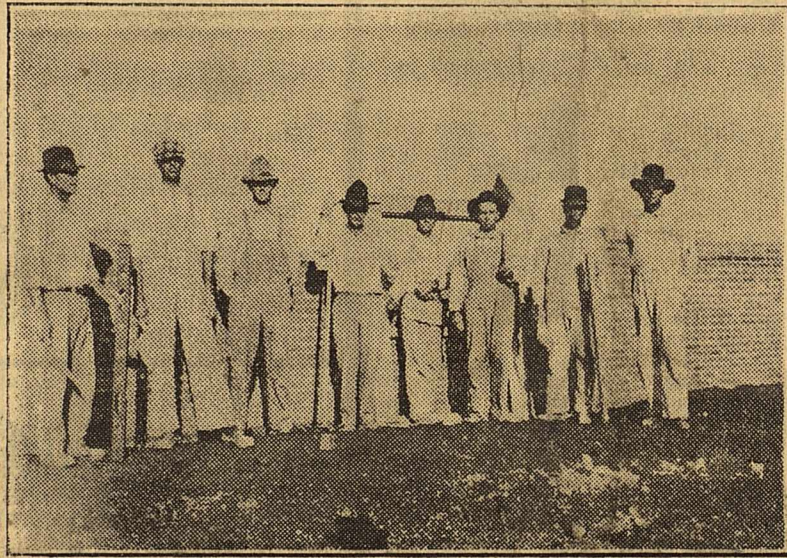
### As Avalanche Editor

Sees us.

The Avalanche editor had the pleasure of seeing the country between Lubbock and Seminole last week. We left Lubbock in an auto accompanied by the senior Dow and our niece of Lampassas county, for a drive to Seminole, the county seat of Gaines county, about ten o'clock Thursday morning and arrived at our destination that afternoon after a very pleasant trip. There is a great stretch of country between these places, and the soil as a whole is rich, and adapted to agricultural uses. This year the seasons have not been as favorable as common, and crops generally speaking are very short, though there are quite a number of what might be termed good crops all along the road between Lubbock and Brownfield but these are rather scattered. A dandy good rain about a week before we passed through there had fallen in the vicinity of Brownfield and Gomez, and late crops were looking fine and with an average frost date will make a great amount of bundle feed if not some grain.

We found that Brownfield had grown very much during the past few months, and new buildings were being built; one brick business house being in the number of new ones. This is becoming a very prosperous looking town and quite dignified since the railroad runs through there and it looks good to see the cars standing on the siding being unloaded of their freight of various kinds goods.

On down the railroad track thirty miles we came to the end of the new road, where the new town of Seagraves is being built.

This is a pretty location, the streets have all been graded, and new buildings, both residence and business, are being built. The new bank is in operation a store building and a long distance telephone office. A wholesale house is also being built, and other improvements going on. This will in all probability be one of the leading wholesale centers of that section of the country. We noted the great improvements of the roads through the sandy portions of Terry and Gaines counties, which means much to the traveling public, and we understand that a petition is now being circulated in Gaines for the issuance of quite a road bond for further road improvements. Range conditions though not ideal in that country, seemed fair, and cattle looked fine. Thousands of cattle being pastured there this year besides those owned by local ranchmen.

In Seminole we found many familiar faces, who were braving it out in hopes of getting a railroad soon from Midland. The lack of which has been a serious handicap to the development of that great country. A spirit of optimism prevails, and Seminole will come to the front some day, not far in the future. ### Street Work.

For the past two weeks, there has been considerable street work in Brownfield, and with its completion, the town looks much better, and will be more comfortable in wet weather.

More than \$300.00 was spent on two blocks on the north 6th, running between the Higginbotham-Harris Lumber Co., and the Bradly Garage. This now gives four blocks of well graded street, and surfaced with the lime rock on this street. The work was done by W. M. Parks and a crew of hands.

M. V. Brownfield started the grading and surfacing of one block on west Small, and was joined by the Merc., the Bank and the R. H. Kemp Lumber Co. This is a fine piece of work, adds to the beauty and comfort of our town and should be kept up.

### Commissioners Court.

Commissioners Court met last Monday and transacted considerable business in one day, most of which was in regard to roads, and the appointment of Overseers.

Overseers were appointed on the roads up and down the railroad. They condemned a number of streets and alleys for Robt. Holgate, thus permitting the land to go back to acreage property. Geo. W. Neill was granted a franchise by the body, in Terry county as follows:

It is ordered that the South Plains Phone Co., its successor or assigns, are hereby authorized to maintain and extend its Local telephone exchange, and long distance toll lines along the streets and alleys of Brownfield and other towns in Terry county, provided the poles or wires does not interfere with or discommode public travel, and provided said Phone Co. shall abide by all laws pertaining to such enterprises.

This permit shall extend for a period of twenty five years.

Washington.—The government has completed preparations for the big drive against seditious and disloyal newspapers, and other publications under the provisions of the recently enacted trading with the enemy law.

German and Hungarian newspapers, and not a few pacifistic and pro German publications in the English language will be the first to feel the iron hand of the government, which, with the approbation of all loyal Americans, is determined to put an end the aid and comfort being given to the enemy in an indolent manner within the American household.

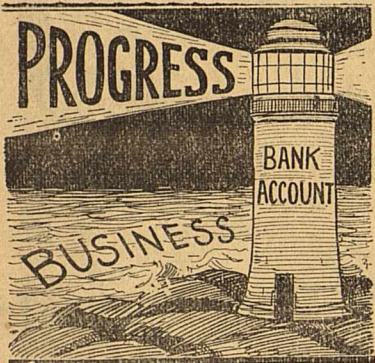

Such things will happen here just as sure as you are alive, unless we smash the Germans so that they are utterly unable to reach the shores of this country. The German fleet and the German army will take just one week to get here if we are beaten. They have made up their minds that America shall pay for this war. They have made up their minds that our wealthy men shall give their money, and that you farmers shall provide the food for their armies and their people at home.

2. That heretofore, to-wit, on the last day of January, 1917, this plaintiff was the owner in fee simple, from and under sovereignty of the soil, and in the actual, peaceable, adverse possession of the following described tract or parcel of land situated in Terry County, Texas, to-wit:

Six hundred and forty (640) acres of land situated and described as follows: Known as Survey No. 137, Lot D-11, on the Waters of Rich Lake, a tributary of the Colorado River, about 6.5 miles south and eight (8) degrees west from the center of the county, the original patent being issued to F. W. Wherefore premises considered, plaintiff prays judgment of the court that the defendants be cited to appear and answer this petition, that plaintiff have judgment for the title and possession of said above described land and premises, and that all clouds be removed from the title of same; and that a writ of restitution issue, judgment for damages, cost of suit, and for such other and further relief, special and general, in law and equity that it may be entitled to and will ever pray.

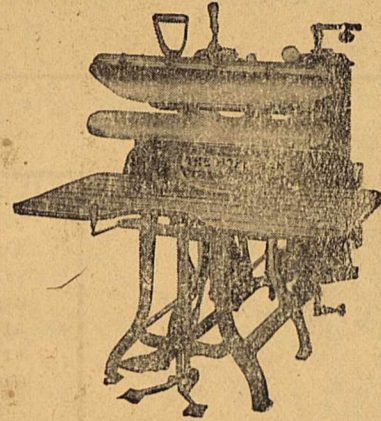
