What Our Soldier Boys Are Doing

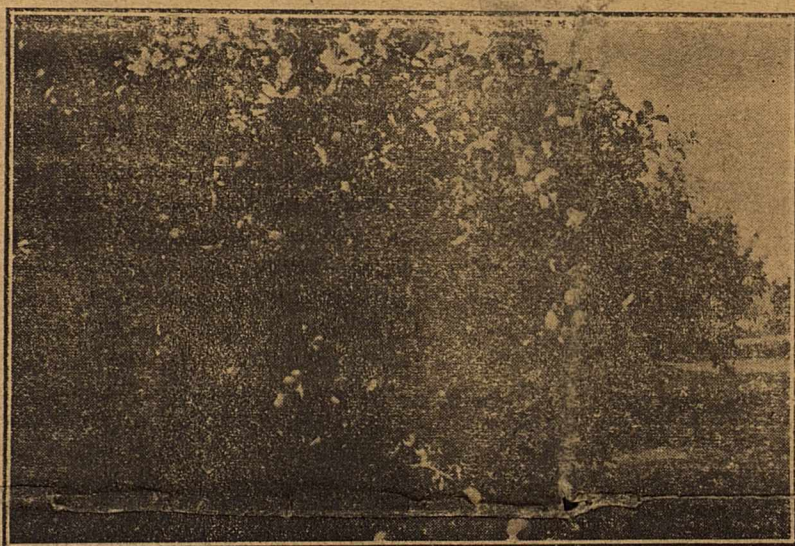
To the Herald and its many readers.

Dear Friends:-
As we have all about made perfect on the vaccination and typhoid shots, I will try to tell you what we do for exercise.

Our first bugle sounds at 5:45 and we have till six to dress. That sounds like a long time, but the first time you try to put on one of these suits you will think you need 30 minutes. Then we line up and take distances, and talk about taking exercises, the little thing comes off. You work your arms, legs, head, body and all till 6:15, then you fall out for breakfast, after which we have inspection at 7:00. Drill from 7:00 till 11:30. Go back at 1:30 and drill till 4:30. Then we have till 5:35 to shine shoes, brush our clothes and try to look as neat as possible. At 5:36 we assemble for retreat and then we are free till 11:30 if we have passes to town but if we haven't, we fall in bed at 10:00. Some of the boys have to be in bed at 9:00.

We have Wed. and Sat. evenings off, with all day Sunday. So you see we work 5 days out of a week, which amounts to 37 1/2 hrs. In addition to that we get guard duty once in a while and a few other little things like kitchen police. Believe me, we have all been on the kitchen police and Uncle Sam sure thinks his kitchens should be clean. They are scrubbed, rinsed and dried three times a day. We are afraid they will wear out these floors and tables in a few weeks if they keep this up, but they say U. S. has plenty of lumber.

The other bunch of boys arriv-

ed yesterday. They were put in same Training with us but most of us are in different Co.

You should all come down and give us a visit, and then you would quit addressing our letters to San Antonio. If 30,000 isn't a city we are in a bad fix.

They have 21000 men in the aviation and that outfit made our eyes open up. It looks like U. S. has enough air ships there to chase down every bird in Germany. You should see them fly. There is one in the air all the time, but sometimes 20 or 30. They loop the-loop, do the figure 8 and cut all kinds of monkey-sines.

Some of the boys told us that you all heard that two of our boys were thrown in the guard house but that is all a mistake, for I saw every one of them to night. We have been guarding prisoners that were in the guard-

house and that is about where the wires got twisted.

Come down and give us a visit any old time soon for we are expecting to leave by the 1st. of January.

Dear Sir and Friend:-

Those pictures were certainly appreciated. We kept one in our company and scattered the the others. We never recieved those first papers about the write up.

We are getting along just fine now. We nearly laugh ourselves hoarse wacthing the new fellows try to learn this stuff.

We are organized now and do most of our drilling in the morning. In our Company we have a foot ball and base ball team and

boxing matches. They furnish us instructors and we put this on twice a week in the afternoon.

We have a swimming pool here that is about one half mile long and from 12 to 20 ft. deep. The stream is kept running by two artesian wells about twice as big as my waist.

I bought me \$100.00 worth of Liberty Bonds to day. They sell them to us by keeping \$10.00 a month of our pay. Nearly every man in the camp will buy a bond. Most of these boys are willing to show the government

it with their money and lives if need be. We think the motor truck and police will get to leave by the first of the year, as they don't have so much drilling.

We have located Old Kenedy Stinson, Dave Holden, Carl Ellis and Lord knows who else. It is kind a Reunion, to take it all the way round, it is not so bad after all. There is two things they wont let us run with, that is whiskey and women. They seem to think the latter is worse than the former.

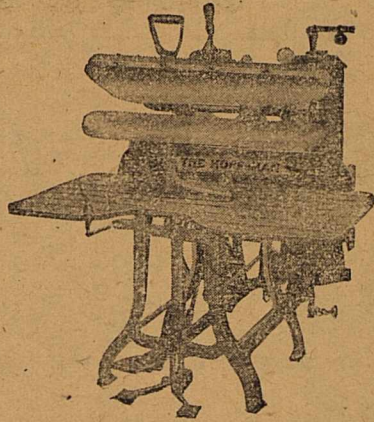

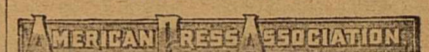

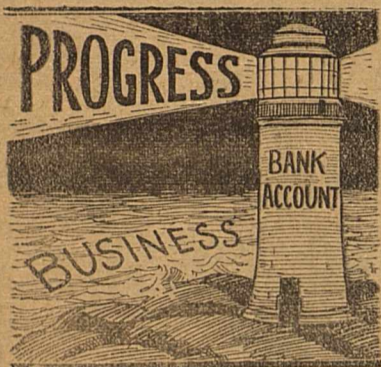

You are satisfied that it is your duty to yourself and your country to buy a Liberty Bond. Now you want to know just how to secure one.

Go to any bank, sign the application form for the bond desired. The Bonds are of the following values: \$50 \$100, \$500, \$1000, \$5000 \$10,000.

Your Banker will take your cheque for 2 percent of the amount of the bond you decide to purchase. The remaining payments will be made as follows: 18 percent on Nov. 15th, 1917. 40 percent on Dec. 15th, 1917. 40 percent on Jan. 15th, 1917.

You can pay in full at the time of application, for any bond up to the value of \$1000, if you wish.

If you care to pay for your bond in full at the time of application, you can have your bond by about Oct. 10th. If you pay by installments you will receive your bond as you have finished paying for it.

The bonds are free from Federal, State or Local taxes. In case of wealthy people who pay income surtaxes, and hold bonds of over \$5000, there is a small tax, but as far as the average man is concerned they are free from tax.

They proceed in their experiments with animals and crops with the same interest and "horse sense" that you and the little wife, undertake in looking after the kiddies and the other vital factors which compose real life well lived. Most of these men are ruralists themselves who have learned some of their best lessons in the school of hard knocks.

One of them has written a little narrative called "The Story of Three Pigs" which has received enthusiastic approval wherever it has been read. He calls his three pigs "Tom," "Dick" and "Harry." Buying them at the same time he feeds the largest grain, nothing more. The next largest he puts in a dry lot and starts on a diet of grain and skim milk. The littlest he puts in a green field and begins to feed skim milk and grain.

Guess the answer?

Of course. The pasture and the skim milk put meet on the littlest pig the same way that the apples and milk and corn bread put the red in the little six year old kiddy's cheeks.

But the only way to learn the whole story told in the author's inimitable fashion is to write to the director of the experiment station at College Station and ask him for it.

Much Interest In Plain Exhibit.

Particular interest is attached to the agricultural exhibits from Lubbock, Terry, Crosby, and Lamb Counties in the Agricultural Building of the State Fair of Texas for the reason that these South Plains Counties lie along the roughly defined northern extremity of the portion of Texas that was drouth stricken this year. These exhibits represent crops raised under the most unfavorable conditions in the history of this section, and the splendid quality of the displays is a strong tribute to the industry and ingenuity of the farmers and the moisture-retention capacity of the soil.

The Lubbock exhibit shows grain sorghum flour manufactured by a Lubbock mill, which has been successfully used in breadmaking; also meal and silage from bear grass for stock feed. Apples 9 and pears 7 in. in circumference are shown and the booth is ceiled with Johnson grass, which is a valuable crop there, Mr. Jacob said. On a revolving stand are displayed fruit and vegetables and a sign at the rear is arranged from kafir, milo maize, feterita, wheat, oats, millet, broomcorn, corn, speltz, barley, sorghum, cane, rye, black ember, Sudan grass, and other grain bearing crops of the county.

Terry County adjoins Lubbock County at the southwest corner and within two months will have full train service over a Santa Fe line being constructed from Lubbock to Seagraves in Gaines Co. according to William Howard and J. E. Shelton, in charge of Terry County's exhibit.

"Watch our smoke when our country gets a railroad," said Mr. Howard, who went to Terry from Comanche County fourteen years ago. "Farming will greatly increase with us. I have had to haul from Lubbock, the nearest railroad point, fifty miles away. It has been dry with us this year, the worst I have ever seen it, but land values have held their own, raw land rang-

ing now, from \$8 to \$20 per acre. We old timers laugh at drouths, especially with Tom Woodward maturing mixed June corn, planted July 4, that never received a drop of rain."

A sample of the corn mentioned is on exhibit and attracting much attention. Stock farming is the leading industry in Terry County and poultry, dairy cows, and gardens irrigated by means of windmills, have been immense aids in tiding the farmers over the drouth, Mr. Howard said.

A pamphlet that is distributed at the booth announces that "Terry County is below the blizzard belt; it raises corn, cattle, hogs, mules, horses, poultry, vegetables and fruits; it has no saloons, no negroes, no Mexicans, not near enough white people; more farmers wanted."

Brownfield is the county seat with a population of 1,000, and Gomez, has about 350. The soil of Terry County is a deep red loam, ranging from mesquite hard land to red shinnery land, all having a red clay foundation, and the water, as in all South Plains counties, is good and plentiful. It is found at depth of 80 to 120 feet, according to the pamphlet.

Crosby County, abutting Lubbock County on the east was first settled by Quakers from Indiana in 1877, said W. T. Dunn who has charge of the exhibit.

"Although it is the oldest settled county on the South Plains it has been passed slightly in population by Lubbock and Hale counties because those counties got railroads before we did." Mr. Dunn explained. "The CB Live Stock Company built a railroad in 1911 from Crosbyton to Lubbock which has since been taken over by the Santa Fe. and since then then the good towns of Rawls and Lorenzo have sprung up and the population and wealth have greatly increased."

"Yesterday a wholesale grocer of Dallas commented on the fresh vegetables in the exhibits from the Plains Counties, saying that he thought they could not be had at this time of the year except from California and other distant points. The Plains could

furnish all Texas with fresh vegetables in September and the first part of October if the movement were started." —Dallas News.

At the present writing there is only one case of typhoid in town, one of W. B. Basham's sons, who has had it about it a week. Several cases are convalescing.
