County Attorney Wm. F. St. John Takes Hand.

Wm. F. St. John county Food Administrator of Terry County, pledged cooperation in the food conservation movement, at the great meeting held in Amarillo, last Thursday.

During the week of Oct. 28 to Nov 4, every home in this county will be visited by the County Food Administrator and his assistants for the purpose of enlisting all of our people in the cause of saving all the food that has hitherto been wasted or allowed to spoil. Our Food Administrator is a busy man this week making plans for the great drive beginning Monday morning, and his assistants will be thoroughly trained by the opening of the campaign. The pledge card campaign will be carried on in every county in the United States, and will be pushed vigorously. After the pledge cards are received in Washington, and every family's name registered there, instructions in regard to saving food will be mailed out. The men and women who make the canvass in this county are instructed to take the names of any who refuse to sign the cards and the reason for refusal. These refusals will be forwarded to Washington.

It was clearly pointed out in the great meeting at Amarillo last Thursday when County Administrators from forty counties in this northwest Texas section gathered for a conference with Porter A. Whaley, District Food Administrator, that the necessity of saving food had become so apparent to the government, that if our people refused to save the waste in foods, our nation would soon be on the

meal ticket basis as the nations of Europe are to-day. Necessity was the key note of the meeting. Saving the bits will add greatly to the whole. It is not a question of whether our people want to or not—it is a question of life or death of democracy, and in which our Government will not shrink to compel the person who refuses to help our boys and our Allies who are fighting.

The Food Administrator from Dalhart issued a challenge to the Administrators in each of the forty-four counties, stating that his county would show the greatest per cent of people having signed the pledge cards by Nov. 4. Every county at once accepted the challenge, and every County Administrator and assistants are doing their best to beat Dallam. The people of this county are anxious that we win in this friendly competition and all will assist our Administrator in the work.

Condemn Feeding Wheat.

Regarding the farmers who have been feeding wheat to hogs the following resolution was offered at the meeting in Amarillo:

Amarillo, Texas, Oct. 18, 1917. To the Honorable Porter A. Whaley, District Food Administrator for the 8th District of Texas:

We, your committee, appointed to present resolutions looking to the conservation of the food supply of America particularly affecting the bread supply beg leave to report as follows and await your further commands:

Whereas it is a well known fact that there exists a shortage in wheat for the use of the allied nations and numerous farmers and stock feeders are and have been feeding wheat to hogs and other live stock and whereas there can possibly be no argu-

ment advanced in favor of this practice; either on account of relative food values or cost of feeding as compared with the standard stock grains, therefore be it

Resolved that we the county food administrators of the 8th district of Texas unhesitatingly condemn this practice as wasteful and criminal and pledge ourselves to use our every effort to prevent the improper use of wheat as stock food and thereby avoid a forcible intervention of the Federal Government.

Wilson O. K. 'S. Revised Draft Regulations.

Washington, Oct. 20—President Wilson has approved the new draft regulations which will be promulgated soon to govern the selection of the remainder of registered men for the national army.

The new plan aims to classify each of the nine million not yet drafted in his place in the national scheme of defense and to postpone the drafting of men most needed in war industries and those having dependents.

To every registered man a questionnaire will be sent him to fill out and return to his local board. Upon perusal of the questionnaire he will be assigned to one of five classes. If he is dissatisfied with the position assigned him by the local board he has the right of appeal to the district board to change his status.

Class No. 1, the first from which the armies will be drawn, will include all physically fit men who have nothing to keep them from serving. Class No. 2 will include those less fit or those engaged in the industry necessary to the prosecution of war. Class No. 3, those still less fit or highly skilled operators; class No. 4, will contain the who should be the last to be taken. Class No. 5, will be known as the "discard class," and in it will be placed those wholly unfit for military service, either on account of total physical disability or in dispensability to the government in other service.

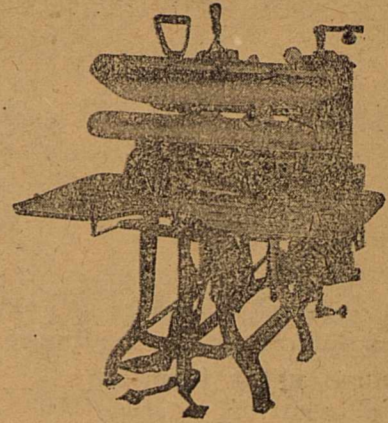

What's The Use Of Money

This the reply to the man who says, "I can do better with my money than buying Liberty Bonds."

He can not do better. He can not do as well. He means that he can obtain a higher interest rate.

Let us suppose that every one or even a large number of men talked this way. The Loan would fail. That would mean the defeat of civilization, and the triumph of Germany.

and our export trade is at a stand still. Do you realize what would be the condition of trade? It would be paralyzed. Markets would fall to peices, industries would be stopped, every where there would be country wide unemployment. Enormous indemnities would have to be paid to Germany to call off her armies; taxes so enormous that they would stagger the imagination, would have to be imposed, and the man who said "I can do better with my money than buying Liberty Bonds" would feel himself to be the most foolish and mistaken man on earth. His dollar that he could "do better" with, would be worth maybe twenty five to fifty cents to him.

Truly—What's the use of money, unless we win this war?

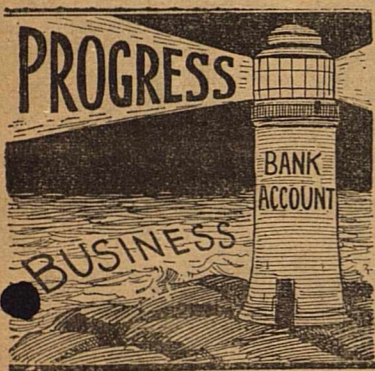

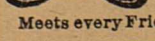

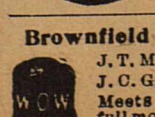
