#### Camp Travis,

The following letter is from a young Captain of the 358th Infantry Regiment.—Ed.

Camp Travis Texas, Oct. 14, 1917

Mrs. Alice Jenkins, Gomez, Texas

Dear Mrs. Jenkins:

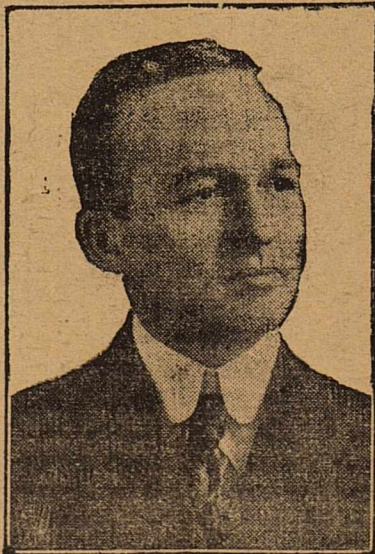
Have been wondering more than once what you are doing and how the life on the ranch is with all of you. I suppose you are as hard worked as ever, and that Augusta is as fat as a pig and Sammie as fat as two pigs.

This is Sunday afternoon and I haven't much to do until dinner we have "dinner" now, some style to this Army, so I will write you that letter that I wanted to write several times. Well I'll tell you about myself first, for when it comes to blowing my own horn, I'm always at home on that job. I've gone up a little in usefulness since I saw you last. Reported down here for duty on the 27th of August after a most pleasant vacation at Athens, where I was treated like a king, and was assigned to the 358th Infantry for duty, was made Supply Officer for the Regiment on the 30th, and since have been a busy human. Am in charge of the procuring of all supplies, subsistence, animals, arms from the depot, and for their distribution, as our Regiment has 3700 men when we reach full strength, we now have 2900 of them, I have a job on my hands. It takes 7400 pairs of shoes, and 3760 pairs of heavy marching shoes to supply them for 4 months. 7400 blankets to cover them up with. 3700 iron beds, 22200 pairs of stockings, 7400 hats etc., to clothe them, then I have a mess bill at pres-

ent amounting to about \$1200 per day to feed them and the bread bill is 2900 lbs daily. Then I have tentage, chairs, stoves, pots, pans, horseshoes, nails, saws, and the thousands of other things needed to equip a unit of the Army. Also have a corral with 399 horses and mules, and 92 wagons to look after. Have a working corps of 138 men who help me look after all this, of course, mechanics, shoe repairers, painters, wheelrights, blacksmiths, carpenters, gunsmiths, horseshoers, clerks, bookkeepers commissary men, nearly every trade you can think of is represented in my organization, and I'm the Boss. I'm thankful for the overtime and extra hours that I used to put in at the office for I know that those hours are helping me now when I am called upon to do a real service and to fill a place of some responsibility. And we are working up a really efficient army. I feel honored to be associated with the men who are whipping this this big army of ours into shape. They are taking the raw drafts from the towns and countries and making fit men of them. They are giving them that training that will make the leaders have confidence in them when the time comes. Mrs. Jenkins, I can't see anything but good in this war for us as a nation. If the war continues for a year or two longer and we assemble two million men or more in training camps over the country and in France, what does it matter if we lose some in battle if we can by training send them back to their homes better in minds and bodies. The results accomplished will be worth the price we pay. If you could only see these men as I see them when

they report in civilian clothes, and then daily watch the change in them you could see what I mean by saying that the war is a good thing for us. Lots of these men can't read, can't sign their own names, don't know the meaning of sanitation; have never had a chance to improve themselves, but now not only have they got a chance but they have got to take it. We make them go to school at night, teach them how to read and write, and have schools of history that teach them what the meaning of "Country" is. Of course we have men from every walk and station of life but the Army methods are reaching out everywhere and developing the men in that particular line they are weak in, and the boys are liking

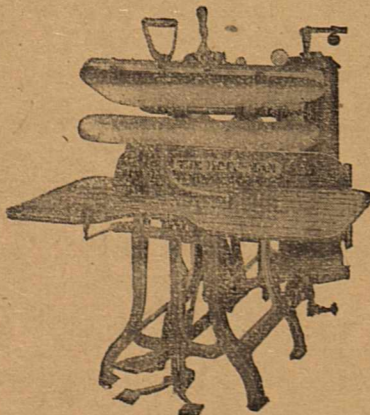

## SALT DEVELOPS NEW VIRTUES

## Electrically Heated Mine Ambulance.

A useful form of ambulance is being introduced in one of the mines of one of the Western states. Formerly it was usual, when an accident occurred in the mine, to place the injured man on a stretcher, transporting him to the surface in a mine car. As the distance to be traveled might be from three to four miles and against the high velocity intake current of air, the injured men often became chilled and this retarded recovery. The difficulty has now been overcome by the use of a specially designed ambulance, which is electrically heated and lighted, and is equipped with a cot suspended on springs to obviate any jarring. The ambulance can accommodate both the patient and an attendant, and is equipped with receptacles on either side in which first-aid supplies, hot-water bottles, blankets and other necessities can be stored.

## WAR TALKS

By UNCLE DAN

Number Two

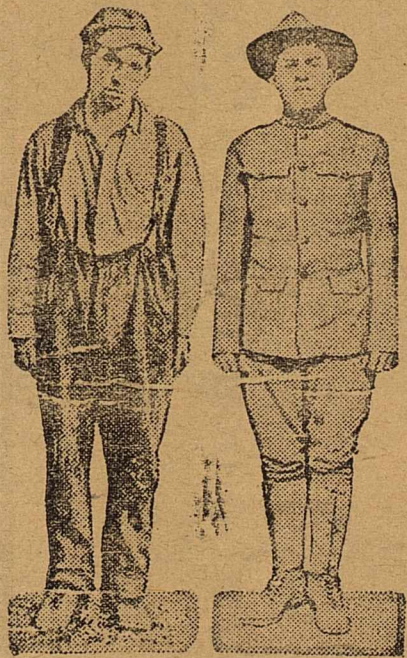
We have arranged for a series of six interesting articles, "War Talks, by Uncle Dan," written by Mr. Howard H. Gross, president of the Universal Military Training League, of which this is the first. They tell in a graphic way why military training is of value, both to the nation and to the individual, and our readers will find them of unusual interest.

Jimmie Collins Tells What He Saw—  
What Military Training Does for Boys.

"Well, here we are!" exclaimed Billie, presenting his chum, Jimmie Col-

lins. "Very glad to see you, Mr. Collins," said Uncle Dan with a smile. "Aw," said Billie, "Just call him Jimmie. That's the only name he knows. He's the pitcher of our baseball nine, and he's some pitcher, too. Just feel of his arm." "Well," said Uncle Dan, feeling, "That's a mighty good arm!" "Now, boys," said Uncle Dan, "what do you want to talk about?" "Well," said Jimmie, "I was down to Jalesburg a few months ago when the boys came home from the Mexican border. They looked fine. Everybody was surprised to see how straight they stood and how manly they were. The boys seemed proud to wear the uniform. I tell you their muscles were as hard as nails. I heard Banker Haskett say that the training and discipline the boys had had was exactly what every boy in the country ought to have, and that now these boys could get a better job at higher pay than they could have had before. Do you think that's so, Uncle Dan?"

Uncle Dan replied: "I have a friend who employs hundreds of young men. He always gives boys having had military training the preference; he says it pays to do so. He finds they are more alert, more prompt, more courteous; they know how to carry out orders; they are quicker to think and to act than those without training. He said from his experience he believed that six or eight months of intensive military training would add at least 20 per cent to a man's

earning capacity, and that it was the best investment any young man could make.

"Billie, if you will go up to my room and bring my small handbag, I will let you see two photographs of the same young man, showing what only five months of intensive training on the Mexican border did for him."

The bag was brought. Uncle Dan, showing the pictures, said: "Well, here they are. They tell their own story and it is a mighty interesting one. The young man, before training, has a discouraged look; he has seen but little of the world. There was very little in his surroundings to bring him out. When he joined the colors and Uncle Sam took him in charge, life for him took on a new meaning. He saw a chance to do something and be something. He woke up. His captain says he is twice the man he was when he joined the army. This may be one of the extreme cases," said Uncle Dan. "I can tell you, though, that war or no war, no one thing will do the young men of this nation so much good in so short a time as a few months of intensive military training. It fits a man to fight his own life battles in the business world as well as to defend his country and its flag.

"Nearly every civilized country gives its boys military training. It is compulsory. It is based upon the fact that it is the duty of everyone to help defend his country; and as war is now carried on, no one can do much unless he is trained. Also, the records show that the killed and wounded among untrained troops is nearly three times as great as it is with well-trained men who know how to fight and how to protect themselves. By this plan a nation has trained men to defend her and the individual is a stronger and better man for the training.

"If the Chamberlain Bill for Military Training is passed by congress, as it ought to be, the same thing would be done for millions of other young men throughout the land. Everybody ought to demand of his congressman and senators the passage of this bill."

"All right, sir, exclaimed Jimmie, we will see Judge Brownell, Mr. Haskett, and Professor Slocum, and get them busy."

Among the cases tried, were the following no jury cases, being suits to clear titles:

W. L. Ellwood vs. J. W. Nunn et al; judgement for plaintiff.

Frank Alvoid vs Benjamin H. Wisdom; judgement for plaintiff.

W. L. Ellwood vs. Texas G. Anderson; verdict for plaintiff.

Geo. W. Neill and I. H. Hudson vs. W. H. Wisdom; verdict for plaintiffs.

Applications of Joe Black and Dock Crouch to have disabilities removed, reviewed and granted.

The Jury case of Flora May Walker vs. Mrs. Mary Duffau McCormack and husband was then tried, but the plaintiff having married during the summer, the case was restyled Flora May Rush and husband P. L. Rush vs. above. ## Explosive Dealers Must Register.

That any person desiring to manufacture, sell, export, import store, or purchase explosives or ingredients, or to keep explosives or ingredients in his possession shall make application for license, which application should state under oath, the name of applicant; the place of birth; whether native born or naturalized citizen of the United States of America; if a naturalized citizen, the place and date of naturalization; business in which engaged; the amount and kind of explosives or ingredients which during the past six months have been purchased, disposed of, or used by him; the amount and kind of explosives or ingredients now on hand; whether sales, if any, have been made to jobbers, wholesalers, retailers, or consumers, the kind of license to be issued, and the kind and amount of explosives or ingredients to be authorized by the license; and such further information as the Director of the Bureau of Mines may, by rule, from time to time require.

Applications for vendor's, or purchaser's, or forman's license shall be made to such officers of the State, Territory, or dependency having jurisdiction in the district within which the explosives or ingredients are to be used or sold, and having the power to administer oaths as may be designated by the Director of the Bureau of Mines, who shall issue the same in the name of such director. Such officers shall be entitled to receive from the applicant a fee of 25c for each license issued. They shall keep an accurate record of all licenses issued in manner and form to be prescribed by the Director of the Bureau of Mines to whom they shall make reports to from time to time as may be by rule issued by the director required. The necessary blanks and blank records shall be furnished to such officers by the said director. Licensing officers shall be subject to removal for cause by the Director of the Bureau of Mines, and all licenses issued by them shall be subject to revocation by the director as provided in section eleven.
