Notes of Interest From Federal Reserve Bank.

What is my duty, what is the most sensible and profitable course for me to follow in my private and business affairs during the continuance of the war.

This is a great question confronting every American citizen. Here is a common sense reply: Before we can settle the matter in detail, we must grasp those elementary principles which govern national affairs. This does not involve great learning or research, for economic knowledge is little else than common sense applied to big subjects.

The war will be won by the Nation which can place the greatest number of men, the greatest amount of material, in the field, and produce the greatest amount of food-stuff to supply its military and civilian forces. This fact is so generally recognized that it is not necessary to bring forward elaborate arguments to prove it.

We are a wealthy nation, and the question arises as to whether or not we can win the war by throwing our surplus wealth into the struggle. We cannot.

Why? Because our savings, as a Nation, have equalled about 5 Billion Dollars annually, before we entered the war, and our war estimates for the first year's operations calls for an expenditure of about Eighteen Billion Dollars or over 3 1-2 times as much as have ever been saved before in one year.

Now there are three courses open to us. We can endeavor to produce 3 1-2 times as much wealth this year as ever we did before. We can endeavor to save 3 1-2 times as much money this year as ever we did before. We can lie down on the whole proposition and let Germany win.

Having described this little treatise as a common sense reply to great question, we will eliminate the last mentioned possibility.

We cannot produce 3 1-2 times as much wealth this year as ever before. It will take several years to adjust our affairs so as to produce such results.

To save 3 1-2 times as much as ever we have before is quite possible, but would mean actual hardship for millions of our people.

The most sensible solution of the problem is to aim at a combination of production and self-denial which would find us at the end of a year at least 3 1-2 times wealthier as a nation, than ever before.

The methods indicated has been followed by our Allies with results that have astonished the world. After 2 1-2 years of physical and financial drain, Great Britain raised recently a

5 Billion Dollars, equivalent to 10 Billion Dollars in this country owing to the fact that we have about double the population. England has speeded up her production of wealth, denied herself so much, that despite the fact millions of her finest specimens of human material are fighting, despite the fact that she raised recently about a like amount of 5 Billion Dollars in loans, and in paying 2 1-2 Billion Dollars yearly in taxes, she was still able to produce this enormous amount in a thirty day campaign.

Germany is spending up her productions along the most scientific lines, and is starving herself. That is the sole reason Germany exists today.

Are we the super-men that we can do things differently to others?

Let us forget this talk of "Uncle Sam soon cleaning up the Germans when he gets over there". The Germans will not be "cleaned up" by talk, or even bravery alone. They must be fought with their own weapons, hard work and self-denial the things that win wars.

You farmers must produce more, must work harder; the uncultivated land of this country is a standing reproach to us. You working men must work over-time. You women must economize and save in the home. You wealthy men must walk, and let the Automobile Manufacturer be free to make trucks and cars for the government. You society women must realize that it vulgarity and almost treason to keep an army of women making your clothes when they could be doing use work for the Government. You children must help with the house-work and free men and women to fight and produce goods needed by the Country.

Locals From Army Boys Each Week.

Headquarters Ninetieth Division
Bureau of Publicity,
Camp Travis, Texas,
Nov. 10, 1917.

To the end that parents, relatives, and friends of the soldiers now composing the 90th Division, National Army, station at Camp Travis, San Antonio Texas, may be kept informed as to the health, progress, and general welfare of the men composing this army division, General Henry T. Allen, commanding has established a Publicity Bureau. This Publicity Bureau will each week send to the country newspapers of Texas and Okla., items of interest concerning the soldiers at Camp Travis. Every effort will be made to so locate these items that each newspaper will be supplied with news that relates to men from the county in which the particular newspaper is published.

General Allen is well pleased with progress the soldiers now at Camp Travis are making. If the intensive training schedule that has been followed up to this period continues to produce such splendid results, it is believed by those in high command here that the 90th Division will be trained to energetically uphold the liberties of the world at a date much earlier than has been planned. The first French officer who reached Camp Travis to assist in training this Division in the finer points of the war-game, expressed himself as being little agreeably surprised at the results of the training so far given.

To the end that there be no irksome periods of training, General Allen has given especial

attention to providing ample and healthful recreation for the soldiers of his Division. All clean athletics are given official and energetic encouragement and allotted hours each week are devoted to sports that make supple the muscles, make keen the eyes and have in them the zest of contest.

The general health of the Camp receives the constant attention of all officers, under direction of the Medical Corps. Skilled attention is given every case even of slight indisposition. The sanitary regulations are formulated with the sole idea that the soldiers now at Camp Travis remain healthy in body.

Nor is the moral and spiritual side of the soldiers overlooked. The camp is fairly dotted with Y.M.C.A., Knights of Columbus, and Young Men's Hebrew Association buildings. In these buildings every effort is made to provide entertainment, instruction and recreation for the soldiers. The moral atmosphere surrounding the camp is more pure than is to be found in any city of 30,000 population in the United States. Instances where soldiers in uniform are seen in the slightest degree under the influence of intoxicants are so rare that literally thousands of soldiers at Camp Travis have not once seen a soldier either under the slightest influence of intoxicants, or with the smell of intoxicating liquor on his breath.

The protecting laws of the Nation are keeping the soldiers clean in body. Each soldier has had impressed upon his mind the extreme importance of being clean in his thought and leading a cleanly life. The social features are gradually being developed and soon will be of sufficient

variety to provide entertainment for all spare hours. Many homes in San Antonio make it a practice to invite soldiers to Sunday dinners and at some churches in San Antonio invitations are extended to all soldiers who attend service to accompany members of the congregation to their respective homes and break bread under family influences.

General Allen wishes a message of encouragement and cheer sent relatives and friends of the soldiers that the men at Camp Travis are proving worthy of the best traditions of this nation and that they are responding to the call of the hour with a zeal that marks a high point in the training of the armies that have made history.

It is with keenly saddened heart that we chronicle the passing of Chas. F. Bell, of Marshall, Texas, at the home of his son, Will Alf Bell, of this city, Monday morning about eight o'clock. With his going passed one of the true blue citizens of the Lone Star State, and those who knew him at Marshall, say that as a business man in younger days, he did more for the moral and financial uplift of the poor, than any man in Harrison county.

While his acquaintance here consisted of more or less extended visits to his son, those who knew him best liked him most, for his courageous stand for the moral, clean things of this life, and his charitable disposition. He came out during the summer with the hope that the high altitude and dry atmosphere would restore his declining health, but death had already claimed another victim, but he was ready. His faithful wife remarked that she had anticipated a dread of his dying away from home, but was glad to say that he could have had no better attention at home, and thanked the good people of Brownfield from the depth of her heart.

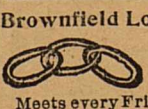

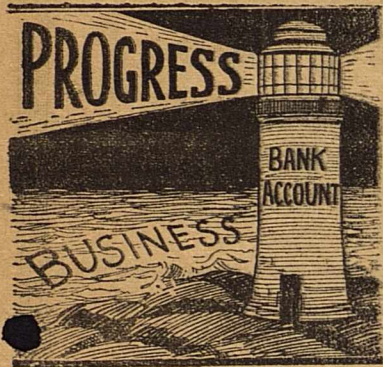

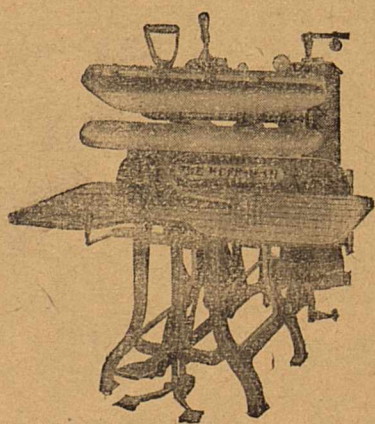

WAR TALKS

By UNCLE DAN

Number Three

How War Methods Have Changed Everybody Must Help.

"Hello, Uncle Dan, Jimmie and I have been waiting for you."

"Sorry if I have kept you long," said Uncle Dan. "Your mother has been telling me how bashful I used to be. She said if a girl spoke to me I would blush to my hair roots. Well, I reminded her of the time your father first came to see her and the joke we played on them, so I guess that will hold her for a while."

Continuing, Uncle Dan said: "You want to talk more about the war, do you? Well, war methods have undergone many changes and they are still changing. No two wars are fought alike. In early times, the weapons were stones, clubs, spears, bows and arrows, swords, etc. In this kind of warfare, victory was with the strong right arm. Men of enormous size and strength were the great warriors. The invention of gunpowder, however, has changed all this. It has enabled men to kill one another at a considerable distance, and do it wholesale. The war, as we know it now, is a combination of chemicals, machinery, mathematical calculations and highly trained men. Just think of it! Airplanes, submarines, armored tanks, or caterpillars, poison gases, and curtains of fire are all used for the first time in this war; and they are destructive beyond anything heretofore known.

"The methods followed by the kaiser and his allies are simply devilish. He must answer in history to the killing of thousands of innocent women and children. He has broken every international law and every rule of warfare; he has bombarded hospitals and undefended cities, sunk Red Cross ships on errands of mercy; he has destroyed cathedrals and priceless treasures of art that can never be replaced; he has made slaves of his prisoners; he has tried to get us into war with Japan; his emissaries have blown up our ships, burned our factories and fired our forests. He knows no mercy or honor. The most charitable view to take of this blood-thirsty tyrant is that he is crazy.

"One thing is certain," continued Uncle Dan, with great emphasis, "Our liberty, the safety of our homes and our country, and the security of the world demand the speedy and absolute overthrow of the kaiser and crushing out once and forever the reign of Prussian brutality."

"How about the German people," said Billie.

Uncle Dan replied: "The splendid German people were happy, thrifty, prosperous and contented. They have been tricked into war and made to suffer the tortures of the damned; they have been cruelly and systematically deceived. God grant that the real facts may get to them, and if they do, Lord help the kaiser!"

"Of course the allies will win," said

Mrs. Graham.

"Probably so," said Uncle Dan. "But if we are to win, we must go the limit. We must check the awful destruction to shipping by the German submarines, or we may not be able to get food and supplies to our own men and to our allies; we must also put hundreds of thousands, and perhaps millions, of first-class soldiers in the battle line.

"Food is the first consideration," Uncle Dan continued. "No army can hold out against hunger. It has been said that food will win the war, and this is largely true. Hence the importance of the farm in the war plans of our country."

Mrs. Graham interrupted by saying: "In view of the importance of farming, don't you think, Daniel, that the farmers ought to be exempted from war service?"

"No, a thousand times no," said Uncle Dan, striking the table so hard to emphasize his protest that he tipped over a vase of flowers. "We must have no class legislation. The duty to serve is the common duty of all, and no class must be relieved of this obligation. The question of exemption must be a personal one and decided by the facts surrounding each case. In no other way can we have a square deal, and to insure this, it is the duty of congress to pass immediately the Chamberlain bill, or some such measure, which is fair to all classes. It would settle all these questions and do it fairly. Safety now and safety hereafter demands such legislation, and let me suggest that you and your friends get busy with your congressman and senators and urge them to prompt action.

"It is time for us to realize that we are not living in a fools' paradise; that this great country of ours cost oceans of blood and treasure and it is only due to the loyalty, sacrifice and service of our forefathers that we have a country, and it is our highest duty to preserve it unimpaired and pass it on to posterity, no matter what the cost may be. Our citizenship and their ancestors came from all parts of the world to make this country a home and enjoy its blessings and opportunities; hence, in the crisis before us, it is the duty of everyone to stand squarely back of our country and be prepared to defend the flag. Everyone in this crisis is either pro-American or pro-German. Great as the country is, there is not room enough for two flags."
