NEW BANK FOR BROWNFIELD

**FIRST NATIONAL BANK IS THE NAME;
WILL ERECT MODERN BANKING BUILDING**

For several weeks, the Herald man has known that there was in contemplation a new banking institution for this city, but has not had anything to say about the matter, for the reason that every thing was not settled, the promoters were not ready for any publicity.

The organizers of this new bank, are R. M. Kendrick, the present cashier of the First State Bank of Plains, Texas, and who will be the active Vice President of the First National Bank of Brownfield, and will move over in the near future, to have charge

of the construction of the new banking building. His associate in this enterprise, is Mr. Carter Wilder, of Kansas City, who will be the President. Mr. Wilder is one of the editors of the Trans-Mississippi Banker, one of the best known financial publications of the country, and he is everywhere recognized as one of the best financiers in the west.

Application for the charter has been made, and the inspector will be here in a few days to go over the situation with Messrs. Kendrick and Wilder, and at the same time look over Brown-

field, and its trade territory.

While here last week from Kansas City, these gentlemen contracted with M. V. Brownfield, for what is known as the Goree corner, one on which the Goree store stands, or the T. corner on the northwest corner of the square, for which they are to pay \$4000.00 when the deed and abstracts are delivered.

Upon this corner they will as soon as they can get their blue prints and plans, together with the material, begin the erection of a modern two story banking building 25x100 feet. The bank will only use half of the lower floor and the other will be rented for store purposes. The upper floor will contain a number of model offices, with south front.

This bank will be chartered with \$25 000 capital stock, and is to be known as the First Nation-

STATE BANK TO BUILD

**SOME MATERIAL NOW ON THE ROAD;
A THOROUGHLY MODERN BUILDING**

We made mention some time ago in these columns that the Brownfield State Bank, had purchased the north corner, of the west side of the square, from Judge W R. Spencer, and would at a near future date begin the erection of a thoroughly modern banking building on that corner, and in an interview with the cashier, O T. Halley, this week he gave us the following information for publication.

"Building operation will begin at once, as we now have the blue prints, and some of the material now on the road, the building to

be ready for occupancy, as soon as the work can be rushed through, especially that part of it to be occupied by the bank proper.

This building is to be 25x110 feet, two stories, and it will either be of re-inforced concrete, or brick, as that part has not been settled yet, but the contract will be let in a few days, at that time this item will be settled. The bank will use about 60 ft. of the front end, the rear end to be made into a neat store building. We will have twelve very neat

TO STOP LOSS OF 150,000,000 EGGS

Washington, D. C. Over 150,000,000 eggs will be lost to the food supply of the United States if the old practice of sending hens to market at this season, is continued. Figures compiled by the poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture show that more than 5,000,000 laying hens, each capable of producing 30 eggs, are sent to market from the Southern States in the winter and early spring.

Every effort therefore, is being made to encourage farmers to keep their hens until after the spring laying season, thereby getting a dividend for keeping the hen through the winter.

The specialists point out that when a hen is sold for meat early in the spring, the farmer gets no egg return for feeding and keeping her through the worst months of the year.

Moreover, the hen is marketable as poultry after she has produced her spring eggs. Poultry in May may bring 2 cents a pound less than it does in February, but, they point out, the 30 eggs produced by the hen, largely from wastes, more than offset any reduction in the price offered for live poultry.

An energetic egg saving campaign to prevent the early slaughter of the hen that "lays the golden egg" is now being conducted through the Southern States. North of the Ohio River, farmers have long appreciated the advantage of getting the

spring crop of eggs and marketing their hens after the laying season or in the fall. They believe that adoption of this plan by southern chicken raisers will be profitable and will materially add to the food supply of the Nation.

The Grand Jury of Scurry County has just recently adjourned and in making their report to the Honorable District Judge, they state in part:

"We find a condition existing that we wish to call to the attention of the people of our county and especially of Snyder; and we feel that this should be thoroughly weighed by the fathers and mothers. We have had conclusive evidence that boys and girls of tender years, 15 and even under, are permitted to take joy rides in automobiles and buggies at night and remain out at times as late as 2 and 3 o'clock at night.

"This condition is not normal and can only lead to disorder and ruin if permitted to continue. This can be remedied by the parents of these young people and we admonish all parents to take immediate steps to put an end to this condition and thereby save your boys and girls from what might be ruin."

This condition does not exist in Scurry County alone nor any one county or community, but it is universal. In these days of automobiles, we are losing sight of the old time care and protection of our families. Parents allow their daughters to auto and buggy ride late and early hours, and then have hysterical fits if the daughter goes wrong, and brings shame and disgrace to the family.

It is a late hour to begin thinking about these things, but even now, a halt should be called and the wholesale auto riding at night without a chaperone should be stopped.—Lynn County News.

HOW SCHOOL BOARDS SOMETIMES DECIEVE THEMSELVES

There are two classes of falsehoods: those told to the other fellow and those told to one's self. Of these two classes the latter is the much more damaging to human character. A man can decieve himself into believing almost anything. He can falsify to himself until he actually comes to believe his own lies. It is as possible for a group of men to do this thing as for an individual.

Last year a board of school trustees in Texas honestly decieved itself into believing it wanted to employ a school teacher. It advised with the county superintendent, wrote letters of inquiry to two school presidents and had considerable correspondence with a teacher's agency. But this board was not looking for a man or a woman truly qualified to teach school. The truth is, it wanted an acceptable Baptist with a teacher's certificate.

Two years ago another school board in Texas spent more than two months looking for a socialist legally qualified to teach school. In like manner other school boards have employed men and women to teach school not because of their fitness and training for the sacred duties of the school room but because they happened to be Methodists, democrats, republican, choir leader, cripples or widows.

School boards have a legal right to demand that a teacher be of good moral character. It is well that the teacher possesses the elements of social and religious leadership. It is one of the privileges of citizenship that the teacher affiliate with some political party if he cares to do so. But that a man is of a good moral character and is a Baptist, a Mason, and a democrat besides, does not necessarily mean that he is qualified to lead and instruct the youth of the land.

Selecting teachers upon the basis of church, fraternal, and political affiliations is a dangerous practice. It tends to lower the standard of the teacher and make the minds of innocent children prey for the ill-trained and uninformed.

One of the most responsible offices in the land is that of school trustee. Upon this officer rests the responsibility of selecting the men and women who will direct the thoughts of our boys and girls—our young American—moral character, power of leadership, ability, to instruct, and training should be the dominant elements influencing the trustee in his choice of a teacher.—U. of T. Bulletin.

GROWING PIGS.

"It is the experience of many hog raisers that they have no trouble in fattening hogs, while they have a great deal of trouble in successfully raising pigs," says Don T. Griswold of the Extension Service, Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. "This is due to the fact that growing pig are more particular as to their requirements in foods and more subject to diseases and parasites. Growing pigs and other growing animals of all kind require more protein in proportion to the other constituents of their foods than grown animals. Ordinarily our farmgrown feeds are deficient in protein; also, growing animals of all sorts do best on protein from some animal source, such as milk, tankage, meat meal, rabbits, etc. It is very important that pigs be allowed to nurse their mothers as long as possible and that the mothers be made to produce as much milk as possible.

Infestations of lice, mange and intestinal worms are especially harmful to young pigs.

As in New York the cold snap in January developed into the worse felt in the Panhandle section of Northwest Texas for years, and the blizzard of snow, sleet and sand was the most terrible in the recollection of the oldest cowman.

The blizzard struck them at 10 o'clock in the morning when within ten miles of the county seat. They missed the road and ran into a drift which stopped their car for good, the radiator having frozen.

Believing the blizzard would abate before nightfall, they got into the car which was a touring type, covered up as best they could with one robe, and tried to be comfortable. But the storm increased in fury, and they spent an agonizing night, with the mercury 7 degrees below zero. When

day dawned they found they were only a half mile from a ranch house. One of the men had his feet frozen, and later had to have seven toes amputated.

A physician and his wife in the same district, were also caught out the same night in their closed car, after the exhaust had become plugged with snow and sand. Two blankets and a foot warmer kept them from freezing. —New York Times, Sunday Feb 10th.

DON'TS FOR THE SOLDIERS

Camp Travis, Texas.

Experience of thousands of members of the National Army upon reporting for duty at Camp Travis, has developed some "don'ts" that may be timely for the second contingent of men selected to serve their country, who will soon leave for training camps. The first one of these is an admonition against trunks, for which there is no room and no place. A suit case is the best thing in which to bring spare clothes and is a good thing to have here in which to keep clothes, whether you bring anything in it or not.

Don't overload with underwear, socks, shirts, etc. Uncle Sam issues underwear and socks and you must wear the kind issued, so your other articles will have to be disposed of or returned to your home.

Don't wear your best clothes or even your good clothes to camp. It may be several days before your uniform can be issued to you and you will have fatigue duty to do in your good clothes. It is best to bring clothes you can give away to the Belgian Relief Society. Your civilian clothes cannot be kept in camp and will have to be sold or sent to your home.

The same thing applies to your shoes. It is not bad however to have some light slippers or moccasins to slip on when you have taken off your marching shoes.

Three bath towels and as many

Bed clothes are not needed. Blankets, bed sack and quilts are issued by the Government. A small pillow can be purchased here at the camp exchanges if desired.

The Government issues in addition to bedding, summer and winter clothes, overcoats, poncho or rain coat, sox, underwear, woolen shirts, hat, hat cord, bolt barrack bag or laundry bag, comb, brush, soap and towels, shoes, one pair for dress and one for marching and drilling, gloves and leggins.

A mess kit is also issued which includes knives, forks and spoons plates and drinking cup.
