#### THE TEXAS LOYALTY ACT.

Declaring that if any person shall, during the time the United States of America is at war, use any language, in the presence of another, of and concerning the United States of America, the entry or continuance of the United States of America, in the war, or of and concerning any flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States of America, or any imitation thereof, or the uniform of any officer of the army of the United States of America, which language is disloyal to the United States of America, or abusive in character and calculated to bring in disrepute the United States of America, the entry, or continuance of the United States of America, in the war, the army, navy, marine corps, of the United States of America, or any flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States of America,

or any imitation thereof, or the uniform of any officer of the army of the United States of America, of such a nature as to be reasonably calculated to provoke a breach of the peace, if said in the presence and hearing of a citizen of the United States of America, shall be a felony, any fixing the punishment for such action to confinement in the State penitentiary for any period of time not less than two years, nor more than twenty-five years; declaring that if any person shall, during the time the United States of America is at war, commit to writing or printing, or both writing and printing, by letters, words, signs, figures, or in any other manner, and in any language, anything of the kind of and concerning those things just enumerated in this caption, and of the kind and character thus stated in this caption, that such person shall be guilty of a felony, and shall be punished as above stat-

ed; declaring that any person who shall knowingly, publicly or privately, mutilate, deface, defile, defile, tramp upon, or cast contempt; either by words or acts, upon any flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States of America, or of the uniform of any of its officers of the army, or either of them, shall be guilty of a felony, and punishment as just stated; declaring that any person who, during the war between the United States and any other nation, shall knowingly display, or have in his possession for any purpose whatsoever, any flag, standard, color, or ensign, or coat of arms, of any nation with which the United States is at war, or any imitation there, or that of any State, subdivision, city or municipality of any such nation, shall be guilty of a felony, and punishment by confinement in the penitentiary for the length of time first stated in this caption; authorizing any officer to arrest, without

warrant, anyone violating any section of this Act; prescribing the force and measures which may be adopted in such case; declaring that any officer about to make arrest shall have the authority to require any person violating the provisions of this Act to desist from such violation, and authorizing the use of such force and measures as are necessary to cause such person to so desist; fixing venue and jurisdiction for violations of this Act in the district courts of the counties in which such violations occur and in the district court of Travis County, Texas; provided that the Suspended Sentence Law of this State shall not apply in convictions had under this Act; making it the duty of any person knowing of a violation of this Act to report same to some officer authorized to make arrests, and making it the duty of such officer making arrest to carry the offender before such officer authorized to investigate such char-

ges, and to make such orders and to enter such judgments as the law directs and; declaring an emergency.

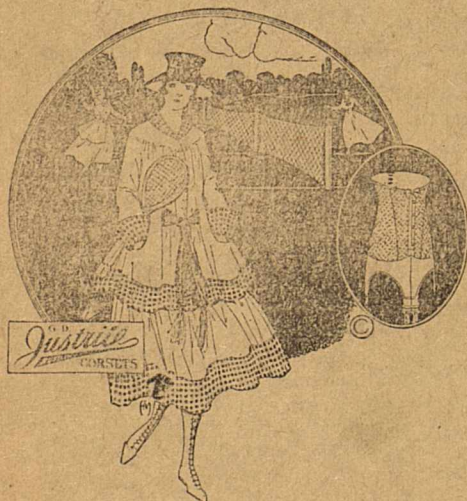

### GAS AND FLAME REGIMENT OPEN FOR ENLISTMENTS

Captain F. W. Fonda, of the El Paso Main Recruiting Office, is in receipt of instructions from the Adjutant General reopening the 30th Engineers, Gas and Flame Regiment.

This regiment is being recruited from men who want to go "over there", and get into the thickest of the greatest activities at once. For the information of those who might be interested, Captain Fonda has asked that the public be informed that the physical requirements for this regiment are unusually strict, but that the chances for advancement was unusually good. All

men accepted must have good muscular development, and be capable of undergoing active service at the front. These men will be required in the field of operations to supervise the American Offensive all along the front in this most important work. This is a branch of the Service in which men by quick thought and daring action may be able to paralyze the enemy's advance or demoralize his forces prior to an attack by our troops, consequently such men must be of the type who have the habit of doing the things they set out to do.

Any red-blooded young man (not registered), who is physically qualified, may enlist, and men especially wanted are chemists, powdermen, men able to repair and operate gas and steam engines, pipe fitters, electricians, interpreters, blacksmiths, plumbers, boilermakers, and chauffeurs.

The 30th Engineers is a regiment composed entirely of volunteers.

### PANHANDLE FOOD CAMPAIGN

Amarillo Texas, Mar. 18, 1918  
The Panhandle food and feed production campaign was started in earnest to-day when the executive committee met with the county chairman of the forty four counties in northwest Texas. The attendance was large, only a few of the counties not being represented. The organization as agreed upon is made up of the executive committee of five members appointed by the Buyers and Sellers convention, a chairman in each county and county committee of one member from each precinct. There are four sub-committees as follows: Finance, Judge J. D. Hamlin; of Farwell, chairman; labor, Dr. Cunningham of Amarillo, chairman; seed, Allan Early of Amarillo, chairman; and publicity, F. R. Jamison of Canadian,

chairman.

The purpose of this campaign is to increase the production of kafir, milo, and other sorghum grain this year. The weather conditions are very unfavorable for wheat and to make up for the shortage in wheat these other grains will be produced more extensively. They are splendid substitutes for wheat as human food.

The great problems to be met in this campaign for increase in the production of the sorghum grains are the financing of the greater acreage and providing labor. The seed supply is satisfactory in most localities. Dr. Cunningham proposes that the people in the towns be given the chance to volunteer their assistance in cultivating and harvesting the crops. Judge Hamlin is strongly in favor of taking the local banker into the campaign to help finance the farm operations.

The meeting was attended by substantial business men, farmers and professional men interested in producing food to help win the war and at the same time build up the country. It was noticeable that the Panhandle press was strongly represented in the meeting.

## NEW U. S. ARMY RIFLE SHOWS IMPROVEMENTS

The United States rifle, model of 1917, commonly called the modified Enfield, has now been tested in the service of the Army a sufficient time to warrant the assertion that it more than justifies the claims made for it, according to a statement authorized by the Secretary of War.

The new rifle takes a thirty caliber cartridge, which has the advantage over the British Enfield of being rimless. It has been found that unless the rim cartridges are fed through the magazine uniformly with the rim of the top cartridge ahead of the rim of the one immediately below, jams are likely to occur.

The model of 1917 has an overall length of 46.3 inches; a total weight including oilen and trigger case and bayonet of 10 pounds and 5 ounces. The breech mechanism is of the bolt type.

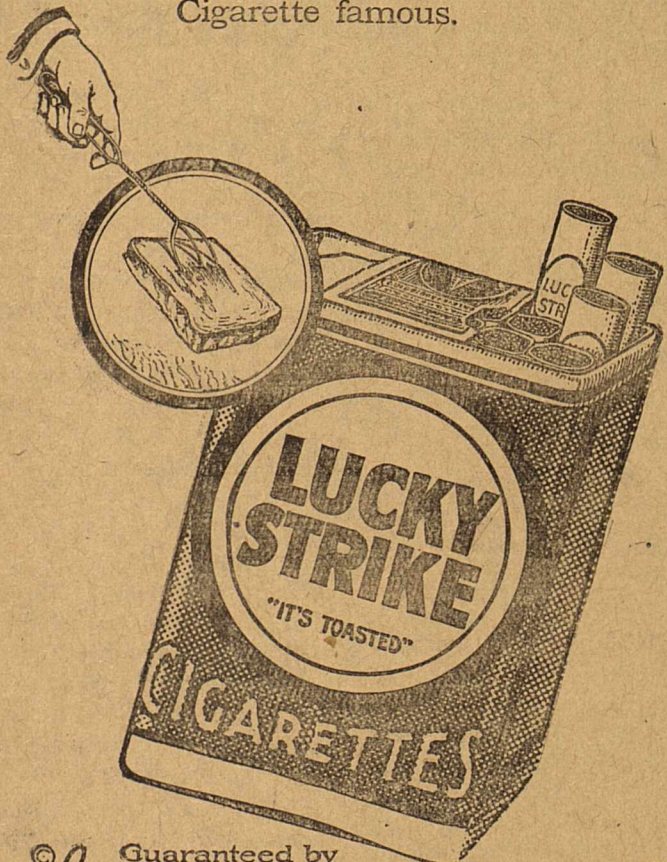

## FOOD HOARDING.

To the Public:

It has been called to my attention that there are a number of people in Terry County who purchased several hundred pounds of flour rationing law went into effect. To such persons I will such say that this is called food hoarding and is punishable by a fine of not exceeding \$5 000 and not more than two years in prison or both fine and imprisonment.

The laws say that no person shall have more than a thirty days supply of flour on hand, baseing the amount on seventy per cent of their normal requirements.

To persons having more than a thirty days supply on hand I will request that they return it to the merchant from whom purchased or to his successor.

I am satisfied that all citizens of Terry County are loyal and if any of them have an excess on hand that they will gladly return it.

There is plenty of wheat in the United States to furnish its population until the next harvest with flour, but if one community, one family or one person, should retain several hundred pounds then some family would have to do without.

The flour rationing order for Texas was brought about by the transportation situation and as soon as this difficulty is relieved the allowance will be increased. At present it is six pounds per month to each individual.

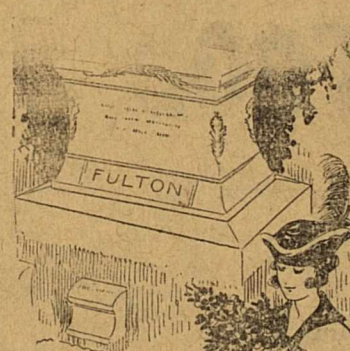
