## TERRY COUNTY CHAPTER "GOES OVER THE TOP"

### BIG RED CROSS DRIVE PROVES SUCCESS FROM EVERY ANGLE. MANY HEROES AND HEROINES DEVELOPED IN THIS CHAPTER

Well, it is all over for this time and Terry, Yoakum and Seagraves people are breathing easier; in fact they are ready now to do the shouting, and rest a spell from their labor, but are ready at all times to come again. They are determined to win this war or bust a gallus.

One of the proudest men in this town is Mr. O. T. Halley, manager of the drive, who while he don't want to accept any praises for his own strenuous labor, has kept reminding us almost every

day since the drive got under headway to be sure and tell the good people of the chapter how very much he appreciated their efforts. He has also received a wire from J. L. Johnson, Chairman of the Southwestern District of St. Louis, thanking the people of Terry County Chapter for their work, and their patriotic devotion to the cause of humanity.

Our quota was \$2,000.00. Of this, Terry county raised \$2,112.28, Seagraves, \$702.82, and Yo-

kum county \$650.00, making a total of \$3465.10. So you can see why we are proud of our over subscription of 1,465.10, and this on top of a drouth of a two years duration, which was only recently broken. You may break the westerners pocket book, but you cant do anything with his optimistic spirit.

Among the larger amounts and how they were raised, we might mention the Junior Red Cross entertainment, "Uncle Sam's Children" \$35.70; The Saturday night play "Among the Breakers" \$143.50, Saturday week luncheon and doll rack \$109.40, Woodman donation and raffle \$100.00 voting Contest \$1.68. One of the largest Free Will donations came from the little community of Harris, in northwest Terry, and we understand the total for Terry and Yoakum counties in that community of perhaps three score householders amounted to \$275.00. Seagraves raised theirs by free will donation, raffle and auction, and we have not received

the good news of just how Yoakum county went over the top.

There was a lot of people, men, women and children that made a real sacrifice in this campaign, and their bread cast upon the waters will not return to them void. We have especially in mind a farmer with very moderate means living in the Groves community, and we do not mind mentioning his name, John Waltrip, who donated a good shoat. This did not bring as much as John thought it ought to at auction, so he bought it in for \$12.00 and gave it back to the Red Cross, and sold for about as much next time. The red pig that brought \$58.00 at Seagraves, and was donated by the last owner down there to be sold at Brownfield, finally brought in some over \$100.00 here Saturday. The Woodman Steer finally brought in around \$200.00. But of all the high priced article that sold here, it was the egg layed by the Red

Cross Hen during the auction. Here is the story as it goes to the big dailies:

Mrs. John C. Scudday, donated a coop, containing a Red Hen and Rooster to be sold to the highest bidder, benefit of the Great One Hundred Million Red Cross Drive. While on the Grand Stand as the sale progressed the hen laid an egg in the coop and the quick eye of JOHN S. POWELL, Program manager detected the egg, at once a campaign was started for a World's Record.

The egg was sold and resold until the unheard of price of \$173.06 was received in 48 hours after it was layed. Mr. M. V. Brownfield was the last owner, also the owner of the hen. It would take 10 eggs to weigh a pound, it would take 400 eggs to weigh as much as the \$10,000 Turkey sent to President Wilson, which would weigh about 40 pounds, the eggs at this price

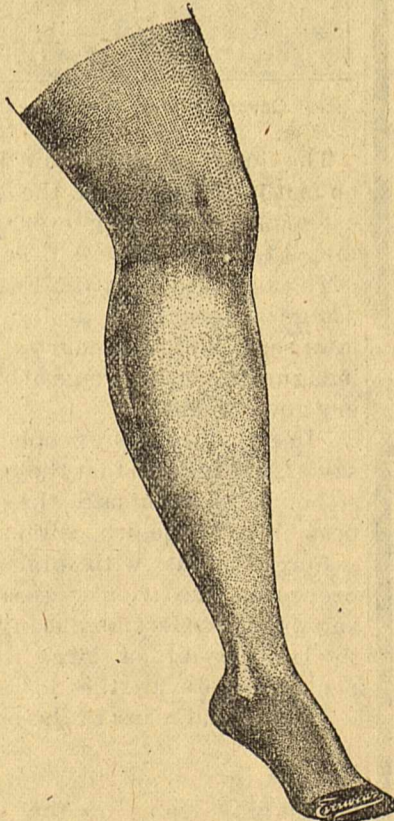

### IS TEXAS SO BENIGHTED AS TO RE-ELECT JIM FERGUSON



Governor Wm. P. Hobby.

The liquor interests now have on foot in Texas one of the biggest conspiracies they ever promoted to restore booze in Texas.

The aim is to elect Jim Ferguson governor, get the prohibition laws repealed in the courts and inaugurate another reign of brewery government.

"Impossible" many people will say. And the fact that they say so helps to eliminate the impossibility of the proposition.

Ferguson has with him the breweries the whisky soaked antis, the pro-Germans, many of the labor leaders, a large number of farmers at the forks of the creek, and many of the politicians.

W. P. Hobby has with him the honest antis, most of the prohibitionists, a great deal of the honest rank and file of labor the more intelligent people throughout the state, most of the voters are in the towns and a goodly number of the women.

Hobby can be elected if his supporters are not too cocksure of victory. But if they take his

line up as evidence that there is no use to fight, Ferguson is apt to be the next governor. Certainly the forces that stand behind Hobby are in the majority if there can permeate the state a wave of intense interest that will guarantee a full strength vote July 27.

With all due respect to the people of Texas, ignorance is dense in parts of this state. This does not apply to any person who has sufficient intelligence to know that it is true.

Ferguson is making his appeal to the ignorance of Texas. He and his hirelings are going up and down the state telling that "a greivous wrong was done Jim Ferguson." And the most ignorant are believing it. The first time Ferguson ran he appealed to the ignorant on his land plank and won. Now he is telling the more ignorant people that a bunch of high brows are at Austin spending their tax money on higher education' and the more ignorant are believing it.

The method of this campaign is something like the first one made by Ferguson and the breweries. In the first campaign the Ferguson Brewery propaganda was circulated throughout Texas by the Commercial Secretaries in county papers by means of boiler plate and thru bulletins; this time it is being done thru the Ferguson Forum, a publication started for the purpose of electing Ferguson. The state is being deluged with copies of this paper.

It has in it such appeals as "Back to the school room with the political teacher," and "Back to the courtroom with the political lawyer." Tho' to an intelligent person these sayings would have no appeal, it is a strange thing that they will win applause from many people thruout the state. To many they are the last word in sound philosophy and thought.

Ferguson is an able campaigner. He is all camouflage, but he gets away with it among those

to whom he addresses himself. For instance, Ferguson gets on a rostrum and when they bring him a glass to drink from, he refuses it and pulls from his pocket a gourd and drinks from it. That is down right sham and nonsense but it really makes a hit with some people.

The people of Houston, men and women, should see to it that Ferguson doesn't put over this camouflage and get him self elected governor of a state in which their city is located. Houston should vote unanimously for W. P. Hobby.—Houston Press

## ABOUT THOSE CHILDREN OF YOURS

One word to the women of America who live peaceful lives in happy homes.

Let us draw a picture for you of a scene at Evian, in France. Six hundred and eighty Belgian children are leaving a train—thin, sickly, from four to twelve years of age—children of men who refused to work for the Germans and of mothers who let their children go rather than to let them starve. They are pouring off the train, little ones clinging to the older ones, girls all crying, boys trying to cheer. They have come all the long way alone. On the platform are the Red Cross workers to meet them. Those children who can walk at all march along crying, "Meat, meat, we are going to have meat." Their little claw-like hands are significant.

Two such trains pull into Evian every day.

Another picture—it appeared in the illustrated papers recently, it showed an English widow with her eight children and the wording underneath ran as follows: "If the mother recovers from her injuries she will have six less mouths to feed—a bomb smashed their poor little home to pieces."

Do you care to see a picture of Italian life where women and children are marched in front of the German army in order that the Italian soldiers may kill them if they fire?

Would you care to think of such scenes as are described in these words:—"All along the Piave River (in Italy) last night we could hear the screams of women in the hands of the Germans?"

Women of America, it is to save your children from such a fate that you are asked to economize and save and loan to the government all the money you can. We hope our brave boys and our allies will prevent the Germans from ever reaching our shores, but even so, don't you want to help fight for the poor children of Belgium, France and Italy. 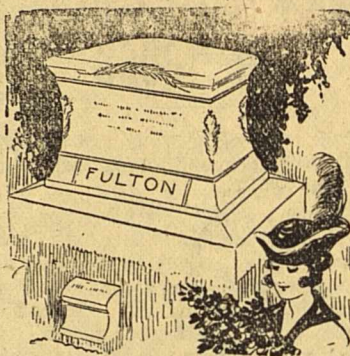

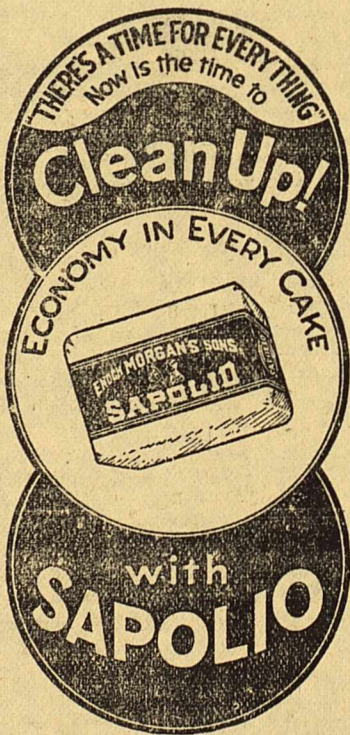

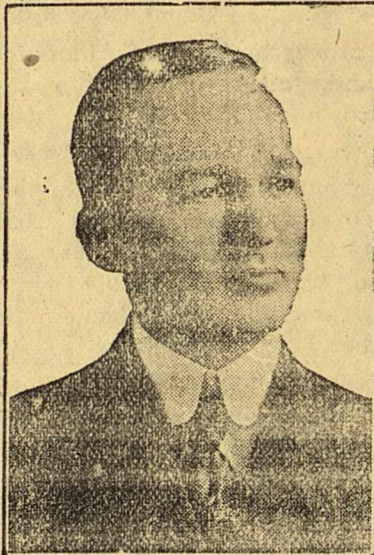

## OAK POISONING

It has been definitely proved that excessive feeding on oak leaves and buds causes stock poisoning. Reports of stock poisoning from Colorado, Utah, Texas, and New Mexico were investigated by specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture, and a study was conducted in certain districts where oak is the principal form of vegetation. It was found that the poisoning usually occurs in early spring before grasses and other suitable forage have developed sufficiently to furnish a supply of feed. The department specialists recommend, therefore, that cattle should not be turned on the summer range too early or that they be provided with some other feed until the grasses have a good start.

The losses from oak in America seem to be confined to cattle although there have been unconfirmed reports of the poisoning of sheep. No cases are known among horses. The most noticeable symptom is extreme constipation; the affected animal becomes gaunt, its coat rough, its nose dry and cracked. The attitude is peculiar, the head being extended forward. Appetite is lost and weakness increases until the case is ended by death. These symptoms appear after rather long feeding upon the oak, not less than about a week, and the animals may die in two weeks or in some cases linger for an indefinite period.

### TREATMENT OF OAK CASES

While affected animals may be relieved by treatment (Epson salt in 1 pound doses or given in the drinking water), the sensible treatment is to prevent the trouble by proper feeding. It has been found experimentally that if a small quantity of hay is added to the daily ration no harm results from oak feeding. As a quantity as three pounds of alfalfa hay daily with oak will provide a maintenance ration for a two year old steer. Oak may be considered a good forage when other feed is provided. In fact, cattle in Utah frequently come off the oak ranges in the fall in fine condition.

There is no doubt that in some localities cattle are admitted to the summer range too early. They frequently pass into the oak zone when there is practically nothing else on the range and their greed for green material they are forced to eat the young leaves. It has been shown by observation that they do not eat them by preference, but will take grass more readily if any is to be found. It is therefore more profitable in the end to feed a little longer and use the range only after the grasses have had a fair start. The exact time when this should be done cannot be determined in advance, but should be fixed each year after careful study of the range.

### AMERICAN MINERAL WATERS

Before the war Americans traveled far abroad to see Alpine peaks though here in our own country there are mountains and canyons and falls that surpass in grandeur even those of Switzerland; so also they imported great quantities of mineral waters regardless of the fact that the United States is surpassed by few countries in the number and variety of its mineral springs. Chemical experts of the United States Geological Survey Department of the Interior, say that after American

Springs have been more fully investigated and exploited and provided with better accommodations for hydrotherapeutic treatment they can furnish counter parts of nearly all the famous spring resorts in Europe. There is also a satisfactory assurance that if mineral waters are a war time necessity in convalescent hospitals they can be supplied from American springs, so that imports may be completely shut off without deprivation to patients in this country.

A report on the production of the mineral springs of the United States in 1916, giving lists of springs and sales of waters by States can be obtained free of charge by applying to the Director of the United States Geological Survey, Washington, D. C.
