### REFRIGERATOR INFORMATION

Many housewives have learned from sad experiences in loss of perishable foods that next to the ice is not the coldest place in the home refrigerator. To the housewife who has not had this experience the Food Administration gives this advice:

"Many put their butter and milk right next to the ice because they think it is the coldest place, but, as a matter of fact, the coldest place is at the bottom of the refrigerator. Hot air rises and air that is not being constantly purified by circulation around the blocks of ice soon are unfitted to come into contact with the food. When the warm air in the refrigerator rises it carries with it impurities and moisture which are absorbed from the surface of the food, and if allowed to remain in the air spoil the food. The air which is warmed by passing over the food comes in contact with the ice where the moisture is condensed upon the surface and the impurities are carried off by the melting ice. The air is thus dried, cooled and purified. The cooled immediately descends to gather up more moisture and impurities and thus the process is repeated continually.

"It is advisable to allow heated food to cool before placing it in the refrigerator. If put in when warm it raises the temperature of the refrigerator higher than it should go and melts ice unnecessarily. The trapdoor through which the meltage passes out out at the bottom of the refrigerator should be kept in place, if it is broken or lost a constant stream of warm air is allowed to flow into the refrigerator."

### CULL THE POULTRY FLOCK

To encourage the production of better poultry, specialists of the United States Department of

Agriculture are now conducting a campaign urging all poultry growers to cull their flock at this season and keep only the best laying hens for next year. In this work they are urging poultry departments of agricultural fairs, county agents, and poultry breeders to take a greater interest in poultry shows, poultry displays at fairs. In the present emergency, to use to the fullest extent the power of popular exhibition of poultry to create new interest, it is more important to have small wherever an exhibit can be brought together than to have what poultrymen are accustomed to call quality shows.

## SALVATION ARMY STOPS THE WAR

TEMPORARILY HOLDS UP ACTIVITIES ON ONE SMALL PART OF WESTERN FRONT

The Salvation Army has a reputation for starting things in the A. E. F., but one day last week, in a shell-marred little village at the American front, the Salvation Army brought the United States Army to a standstill. Several hundred artillerymen had gathered for the regular Wednesday night religious service, held in the hutment, conducted by that organization at this point, and, in closing, sang vigorously three verses of "The Star-Spangled Banner." A major who was passing came immediately to attention, his example being followed by all the men and officers within hearing, and also by a scattering of French soldiers who were just emerging from the Catholic Church. By the time the second verse was well under way three companies of infantry, marching from a rest camp toward the front, had also come to a rigid salute, blocking the road to a quartermaster's supply train, who had, perforce, to follow suit. The "Star-Spangled Banner" has a deeper meaning to the man who has done a few turns in the trenches; but, as one man remarked who was caught in the barber chair just after the lather had been applied, there are moments when a soldier would rather not hear it!

## SALVATION ARMY WAR WORK SUMMARY

FACTS AND FIGURES SHOWING  
EXTENT OF SERVICE RENDERED

Following is a summary of the Salvation Army War Work for which \$5,000,000 is now asked for its continuation and extension:

201 Huts for religious and social work, and for dispensing comforts to Soldiers and Sailors.

200,000 Soldiers and Sailors attend Salvation Army Buildings DAILY. Many thousands have professed conversion.

107 Buildings of Salvation Army in United States placed at disposal of Government for war relief purposes.

69 Motor-Ambulances manned by Salvationists under direction of Red Cross.

300 Rest-Rooms equipped with papers, magazines, books, etc., in charge of Salvation Officers.

320 Salvation Army Officers devote their entire time to religious and social work among Soldiers and Sailors.

50,000 members of Salvation Army fighting with Allies' armies.

53 Salvation Army Officers have been officially appointed Chaplains.

6,000 Beds provided in 52 hotels close to railway stations and landing points in seaport cities for Soldiers going to and from the front. Others are in preparation.

Militant Religious Organization Closer to Firing Line Than Any Other Workers in France

A strong current of public confidence and friendliness has set in toward The Salvation Army. ### Hooks Without Holes.

Persons living in apartments or furnished rooms will find this a useful device for increasing closet capacity: Fasten one end of a heavy wire—picture wire works well—to a hook in the closet, thread the other end through the spring of a patent clothespin, wind the wire about the second hook and so on around the closet until there is a clothespin between each pair of hooks. This is an excellent way of holding skirts or waists and can be removed easily.

### Spots on the Ceiling.

More often than not, the ceiling will have black spots over the radiators and gasjets, while the other parts will still be clean. Try this method of cleaning the oiled spots: With a very soft cloth remove all the loose dirt, wiping always in one direction. Then dip a soft, dry cloth into some dry calamine powder of the same shade as the ceiling, finish and rub gently away from the wall and toward the center and renewing the powder dressing occasionally.

If our soldiers were like such citizens the Hun could easily subjugate America and take from us the measly coin we seem to loathe to donate to the cause of humanity.—Stanton Reporter.

At last we have learned where Jim got the money. In an investigation of Texas Brewers by the Federal court at Austin, this week, one of the brewers admitted under oath that the Texas Brewing interests had furnished Jim the \$156,000.00 in 1917, when he was in straits, and also admitting they let him have the money because he had discouraged liquor legislation, and that when the court of impeachment canned Jim, they charged the account off their books. ## AMERICAN AND GERMAN FIANCES.

Pessimistic Americans who view with alarm our increasing national obligations may derive a great deal of comfort from a comparison of financial condition of the United States contrasted with that of Germany.

The total resources of the United States are estimated at about 250,000,000,000; our annual earnings are estimated at about 50,000,000,000. Our national debt, including the third liberty loan, may be put around 12,000,000,000.

Before the war our Government was spending about 1,000,000,000 a year. When the war is ended, interest charges, less the interest collected from our loans to our allies, Government insurance expenses, and other necessary expenditures growing out of the war may conservatively be estimated at something like \$1,000,000,000. We are confronted, therefore, when peace comes, with raising only a couple of billions a year revenue, a slight task for a nation of such tremendous wealth, capacity, and resources. The resources of Germany be-

fore the war were estimated to be \$80,000,000,000. The annual expenditures than of the Imperial Government were about \$80,000,000,000. Her debt now is \$30,000,000,000, and her resources and man power have been severely impaired. After the war she is confronted with additional expenditures growing out of the war totaling some \$4,000,000,000.

The interest of her war debt, even if the debt grows no larger, will be about \$1,500,000,000. Altogether she is niggardly in her pensions to private soldiers and their families, \$1,000,000,000 a year would hardly suffice to pay even small pensions to her injured and the families of her soldiers who have been killed. Her war debt must be paid some time and a sinking fund of 5 per cent would add \$1,500,000,000 to her annual taxation. Here is a total increase of \$4,000,000,000 all due to the war.

Of course both the United States and Germany may greatly increase their debts, but the increases will not change the relative situations.

The Germans Government has drained the German people of their gold, even their jewels and heirlooms, and yet the Imperial Bank of Germany now has but little over \$500,000,000 of gold in its vaults. The United States has made no special effort to obtain gold, has made no call upon the people for the precious metal, and yet to-day has in its Treasury vaults practically \$2,500,000,000 of gold coin and bullion.

## THE LURKING TRAITOR

Just a short while ago a boy wearing khaki of his country was summoned before a court-martial board on charges preferred against him. He was only a boy, but the marks of drink's ravages were upon him. With averted eyes he brokenly and hesitatingly answered the questions and with a helpless, frightened look, shambled out when dismissed.

Broad-minded military judges, yet strict disciplinarians, were lenient, holding that the boy was not responsible for the acts committed.

When the finding of the board were reviewed, there appeared this:

"He was not developed mentally and altho he claims to be eighteen years of age he is like a boy of eight or ten years.

He attended school for only parts of three seasons and then interruptedly. His home influence have been bad. His parents are alcoholics and he has been allowed the use of alcohol ever since he can remember. He has almost no sense of right or wrong or responsibility. He can neither read or write."

## THE UNITED STATES CARES

Paris, Aug. 2. What of those who give all that man can over there? When the military funeral is over, and the volley of tribute fired over the soldiers grave, who cares? The answer is that the United States government cares and this is the story of what it does for the comfort of the sick, in honor of those who die, and for the consolation of the people at home.

Private Shellie J. Poole, once of Alabama and late of 328th Infantry, was taken sick with the measles, and soon developed pneumonia. Direct from a transport, he was sent to an American Rest Camp Hospital in England. This particular hospital is a 250 hut organization, under canvas.

Pool's fever remained at about 101 degrees. As he grew worse two men were assigned to watch him constantly. This was done principally through fear that he might, in delirium, get out of bed and catch additional cold. The man fought well for his life but repeated crises wore him down. The camp surgeon was with him when he died. He was the first patient to be lost in that hospital.

The body of Private Poole was taken to a local chapel and two days later he was buried in Kirksdale Cemetery with military honors. An identification tag was placed in the casket. A careful record was made of just where he was buried and the number of his grave. Moreover a copy of the record was placed in a bottle and buried two feet above the casket so that it could be dug up and read if desired.

But the interest of the government and of its auxiliary forces in Private Shellie J. Poole did not end there. It is the intention of the United States to carry its dead back to America after the war, and in the meantime there are things to be done for the living at home.

The Y. M. C. A. secretary in charge of work in that camp hospital wrote to Private Poole's mother. He told her all the details of the death of her son—such details are not put in official reports—and she will know that Private Poole was not friendless at the end. When the grass has grown over the grave the Y. M. C. A. will send Mrs. Poole a photograph of it. And all this will be repeated in the case of every

soldier who dies in foreign service.

In the particular hospital about which this story has been written all the nursing is done by men. The surgeons are army officers and the attendants and orderlies enlisted men of the medical corps. But this does not mean that the patients do not have the tenderest care. Swift retribution comes to that attendant who is careless or indifferent to his duties.
