### MORE GERMAN LIES

CAMP TRAVIS, Texas, October 25.—German propagandists again are seeking to cause dissatisfaction and heart aches among the thousands of homes in Texas and Oklahoma, and other sections of the country, from which men have gone forth to do their part in the present war. Insidious and venomous as the plans have been, they have always been discovered in time to prevent them being successful.

Now comes the German and the German sympathizer with stories "from reliable people" as to the horrible conditions which have been found to exist in the hospitals and military training camps of the country. According to these people the men are given no attention, they are allowed to die of cold, or of hunger.

They have been given no medicine, or improper medical attention.

Then some subtle German mind conceived the idea of having doctors and nurses caught in the act of injecting in fluenza germs into the food of men in the camp. To make this more realistic they decided these men or women should be "shot at sunrise." Then they spread their stories in the hope of making people lose faith in the government and its efforts.

This story was started in various sections of the country and has been attributed to practically every camp in the United States.

Added to this have been frequent telephone calls from anonymous parties to prominent Red Cross people in San Antonio and elsewhere alleging that men in camps were without food, etc.

These workers, often in the middle of the night, have hurried in cars to the places mentioned and found that their informant merely had been seeking to cause trouble.

It will be recalled that last winter when pneumonia broke

out in the camps of the country that frequent rumors of a very similar nature were circulated.

These were found to be false. Then it was charged ground glass had been found in food of soldier at training camps. Again this proved false. Then the propagandists switched their efforts to flying camps and it was charged that engines had been tampered with, that wires and nuts on the wings had been loosened, that goggles had been issued of such nature as to make vision defective and many aviators had been killed as a result.

Later came nation wide charges that Red Cross garments issued to the soldiers by the Red Cross were being marketed generally at a price from fifty to seventy five cent. This was an effort to discourage Red Cross knitters giving their time and money and assistance to the government. The government since has taken charge of all knitted garments and issues them as it does other clothing requiring a strict accounting.

Now, with the soldiers of the United States carrying the Stars and Stripes through Germany's "impregnable lines," the propagandists are seeking to cause worry by circulation of reports of lax conditions in army camps.

They have charged all manner of things which never have been proven. Parents, friends and relatives of men in the service have been the people attacked. Every effort has been made by the German sympathizer to cause dissatisfaction at home, to cause worry at home. Then letters naturally would go forward to the men and weaken their morale.

The latest efforts of the Germans in the United States has been directed toward parents of those whose loved ones are in camps.

Fake letters have been sent consoling them in the loss of their sons, husbands or friends.

Investigation proves the

parties alleged to be dead, to be in good health. But the German believes he created a germ of dissatisfaction? He believes he lessened the willingness of the people to stand behind their government.

Parents, wives, children of the men in camps are warned to pay no attention to the constant rumors that are circulated but which are never printed as authentic in responsible newspapers. Beware of the people that tell of horrible conditions army camps or elsewhere and can only charge it to "someone told me." When you hear such rumors do not pass them up. Brand them as false and help beat the German at his own game in the United States just as your loved ones are defeating and beating him down by force of arms in Europe.

## REAL MEANING OF THE BUILDING RESTRICTION

Since the War Industries Board sent forth its famous Order No. 21, restricting building, we have had numerous inquiries from our readers as to the exact meaning of that order and what class of buildings were prohibited and what allowed and under what conditions.

A matter of such vital importance to the growth of Brownfield, — a matter which can so radically effect its prosperity — calls for a clear understanding and explanation.

In order to secure the official, authoritative ruling, we interviewed Mr. Milton Brown Jr., of the R. H. Kemp Lumber Co.

Mr. Brown, tells us that the main idea was to entirely stop ALL building that was not absolutely necessary; this in order to save fuel, transportation materials, money and, above all, the labor which is so vitally, required both in the draft and in direct war work on ships, buildings, airplanes, munitions, supplies, etc., from the raw materials to the finished product.

However, the War Industries Board, realizing the stagnation that would result from a literal reading of this order as well as the damage to property left subject to the ravages of time and use and weather without repairs modified the rule to permit:—

1—Repairs or extensions to existing buildings involving in the aggregate a cost of not exceeding \$2500; and

2—New construction for farm purposes only involving in the aggregate a cost not exceeding \$1000.

The matter, as explained by Mr. Brown, is quite clear, and there should be no misunderstanding.

Briefly, anyone can, just as before, and without a permit:—

1—Make repairs or extensions to any EXISTING building of any kind, providing the TOTAL COST, including labor, material and everything else, in UNDER \$2500;

2—Build any NEW building, for FARM PURPOSES ONLY, where the TOTAL COST, as above, is UNDER \$1000;

3—For ALL OTHER BUILDING WORK, a permit must be first secured through (name of local official) representing locally the War Industries Board.

Any violation of this regulation will subject the dealer to a loss of all privileges of purchasing his stock.

Each builder is put individually on his honor to confine his construction work to REALLY ESSENTIAL BUILDINGS and also to use as little "skilled labor" as possible.

It will be seen from the above that while NEW buildings, except small ones for the farm, are frowned on, yet REPAIRS AND NECESSARY EXTENSIONS are permissible without permit; and we believe in view of the tremendous building that will immediately follow the declaration of peace, that it will be exceedingly wise for our readers to plan for all such work at their earliest opportunity.

There is a little piece of muslin hanging in the front window of the Brownfield State Bank, about four by five feet dimension, that cost old Terry the sum of eighteen thousand two hundred and fifty dollars, but it is worth ever cent of it. This treasured little

Some of the objections to the Free Text Book law, to be voted on next Tuesday, is that the State has no right to give anything away, and no more right to give books to the children, than to furnish them clothes. The books will no more be given the children than the desk they sit on, and the parents of the children are held responsible for the books. The books are just as much a part of the school as the house, stoves, desks, windows or the teacher, and all States that have tried it would no more go back to the old law, than they would give up the Free School System. Two years ago, the Legislature passed a compulsory school law, forcing parents to send their children to school, and now, why not equip the children that you are forcing to school. We all know that buying books is a serious task for the well to do, to say nothing of the poor with large families, yet the increased taxes will not be noticeable. When you go to the polls next Tuesday, go with the resolution that Texas will have Free School indeed and in truth, and never be guilty of casting a vote against the education of poor but worthy girl or boy. We have a great responsibility upon us in educating and refining the coming generation, and it lays within us as to whether it will be a generation of good or bad citizens.

We cannot refrain from saying to our readers how very important it is to cast a vote next Tuesday, for every Democratic vote is an indirect endorsement of the National Administration in this great crisis, as well as the present State administration in its efforts to clean up Texas. It is a well known fact that the Republicans, who have been out for several years are itching to get back with their prohibitive tariffs, and are spending money like everything to accomplish this end. And it is also a fact that all of them have not supported President Wilson's War Policies, and there is no reason to suppose those up for election will. While the Socialist can cut no figure, having had a comparison of their kind of government in Russia, in the Bolsheviks, that has about disgusted all the decent and sincere Socialists, the Republicans on the other hand still hold almost an equal amount of power with the Democrats. ## GOVERNMENT W.S.S. PLEDGES ARE DUE; PAY BY END OF WEEK

All War Savings Stamp Pledges should be redeemed by the end of this week. Maybe you were unable to completely liquidate your pledge Thursday, Oct. 24, the first day of the payment call, but be sure the matter is attended to before this week ends.

Every pledger in the county is called upon to discharge his obligation to the Government.

Pledges for November and December, although they do not mature before this week ends, should be paid at this time.

Make your arrangements at the banks, postoffice or any of the sales agencies where War Savings Stamps can be obtained.

Complete tabulations showing the exact amount which has been invested in War Savings Stamps in response to the call made Thursday, Oct. 24, for complete liquidation of pledges are not yet available, but the total has been increasing materially every day.

All pledges, including those for November and December, should receive attention not later than Saturday, the end of this week.

By that time every pledger should have made the necessary arrangements incident to meetings this call for the complete liquidation of his obligation to the Government.

In speaking of the payment now of November and December pledges, Louis Lipsitz, who is director of War Savings in Texas for the Federal Government, said:

"In view of the pressing need of

money to carry out successfully the enormous war movements in France now, I am quite certain that every loyal Texan will gladly take up the November and December portions of his pledge at the same time he liquidates that portion of his pledge due and payable on or before the end of this week. Even though the complete payment of his pledge to include the November and December amounts may cramp him a bit financially or call for self-sacrifice, I am confident that every Texan will see that his whole pledge for the year is entirely paid before this week ends."



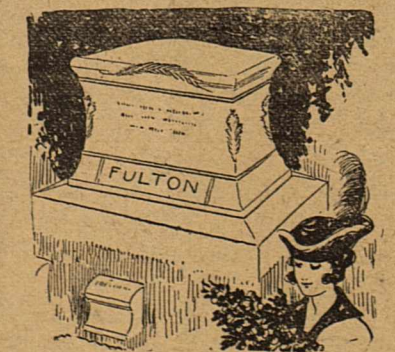

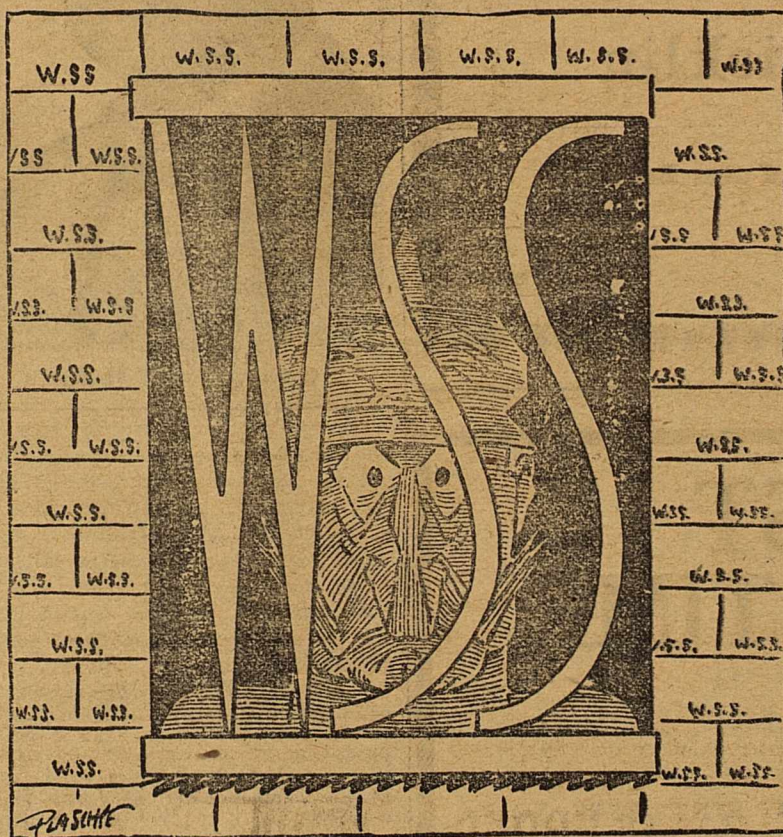

## IMPERATIVE DEMAND FOR MUNITION WORKERS.

We cannot afford to play into the hands of the enemy by slackening our efforts at this particular time.

Messages are being sent out from Washington by the heads of almost every department, which are indicative that peace is afar off, unlooked for and undesirable under the existing conditions. The consensus of opinion being that "America has just begun to fight."

Our armies in France are now in the midst of a great offensive. To carry it through to a successful conclusion it is absolutely essential that vital war projects be furnished with men at once.

Especially is this true in regards to munition plants, where a shortage of common, skilled and semi-skilled labor exists which will be ruinous if not supplied immediately.

Our boys need munition—our plants need men—5200 from this State within the next 30 days—there are more idle men on our streets in this State than would fill this State's quota—more male clerks in our mercantile establishments, private chauffeurs—attendants of barber shops, shoe shining parlors, billiard and pool rooms and other places which can be filled by women, boys or old men unfit for hard labor, than would fill our quota many times over.

Something must be done to bring these men to realization of the needs of their country—public opinion must be aroused and men branded who should and will not respond to the call.

Some of our larger cities in Texas through the Women's Working Reserve have started a movement among the female residents and patriotic male citizens to refuse to be waited on by able-bodied male clerks or floor walkers whose place could be filled by a women, they taking the stand that if these men refuse to keep the "boys at the front" supplied with munitions and other war necessities they must consider them unpatriotic and make this felt by refusing to be served by them.

Men in non-war industries will have no one to blame but themselves, if they are shamed by the women, for not taking their just share of the responsibilities of the war, accepting the burdens and hardships in the same manner and with the same spirit as did our boys who went into the trenches.

Let us put it up squarely to the non-war workers that a crisis is at hand and they must do their part. The Community Labor Boards will direct all assembled workers to the nearest U. S. Employment Office for immediate placement.

The sad news of the death of the above citizen came in during the night, Wed, and it was only Tuesday that he came into Lubbock with a bad case of pneumonia, being then almost delirious, and was at once hastened to a sanitarium, but alas! too late.

Claude was one of the real old settlers of Terry county, and was one of those big hearted pioneers, that would give the last monthful of food, or the last raiment to a neighbor. He always stood for better schools, and together with his faithful wife, did their part toward the financial betterment of the Brownfield Methodist church, though he himself, did not take so active part as Mrs. Criswell, personally.

About three years ago, Claud moved to Yoakum county, having sold his town property here and purchased some grazing land there, and from every source, it was reported that he was doing fine, and when he was stricken with pneumonia, he was just returning from Kansas City, where he had been with some cattle.

He stood well in Yoakum county as well as Terry, and was nominated one of the County Commissioners at the July primaries, and would have been elected next Tuesday.

He was at one time a member of the Woodman lodge, but had let his policy drop a little more than a year ago, having moved away from Brownfield, where membership was, and was a member of the Odd Fellows Lodge. He was about 42 years old.

He will be buried in the old family cemetery at Matador, Texas.

### PREPARATION TO KILL HOGS.

In preparing hogs to be slaughtered a fast of 24 to 36 hours, plenty of water, careful handling, and rest before slaughter are all important in securing meat in the best condition for use, either fresh or for curing purposes. Food in the stomach decomposes very rapidly after slaughter, and

where the dressing is slow the gases generated often affect the flavor of the meat. Water should be given freely up to the time of slaughter, as it keeps the temperature normal. It is highly important that the animal be not excited in any way sufficiently to raise the temperature of the body. If the animal becomes heated it is better to allow it to rest overnight before killing than to risk spoiling the meat. It is also essential that the hog be carefully handled so as not to bruise its body.

### TO SHOW KILLING FROST IN FALL

The Weather Bureau will publish this fall in its National Weather and Crop Bulletin a series of charts showing for the country east of the Rocky Mountains the southward progression of the earliest killing-frost date line and the total area covered by killing frost to the date of each issue. These charts are expected to be of much interest and value, as they will indicate the time of the ending of the growing season for summer crops this year in the various sections of the country. Much loss occasionally comes from early frosts, and interest is unusually great this year because of the possibility of frost damage affecting the food supply. The National Weather and Crop Bulletin will be published weekly until October 9, and thereafter monthly.
