TO GATHER CLOTHING

To provide relief for the destitute people of Europe the American Red Cross has been called upon to furnish at least 10,000 tons of clothing, shoes and bedding, of which amount, 1,000 tons has been assigned to the Southwestern Division as its quota. To meet this demand a clothing collection campaign has been planned for the week of March 24-31, and twice as large a quantity as was raised last year for the Belgians must be raised for them and others.

Millions of people who were driven from their homes in Northern France, Belgium, Italy, Roumania, Greece, Serbia, Montenegro, Palestine, Albania, Czecho-Slovakia, Poland and Southern Slav countries are rapidly returning. They find villages and small cities a complete waste, and in the larger cities factories have been dismantled and the equipment taken to Germany. There are no textile factories to produce cloth from which clothing could be made, consequently clothing is almost impossible to be had, even to those who have money. Such conditions have been unanimously verified by representatives of the American Red Cross and the European Relief Administration.

To meet this emergency the American Red Cross is sending 1,000,000 garments to the refugees monthly, and the

American people have been asked to furnish 10,000 tons of clothing to continue this relief.

This clothing collection campaign differs from the one last year in that it is for the benefit of the people of all the devastated countries and the American Red Cross becomes responsible for the clothing from the time of its collection until it is distributed to the needy individual in Europe. The campaign takes place when Americans are changing from heavy to lighter wearing apparel. Many thousands of suits, dresses, coats, overcoats, shoes, blankets, articles of bedding, soft hats, pieces of cloth will be put away, and much of it will never again be used. It is from this surplus of used clothing and material that the 10,000 tons must come. By this slight sacrifice Americans may be of a vitally necessary service to millions of people who have proven their worth by enduring the most distressing privations and cruelties the civilized world has ever known.

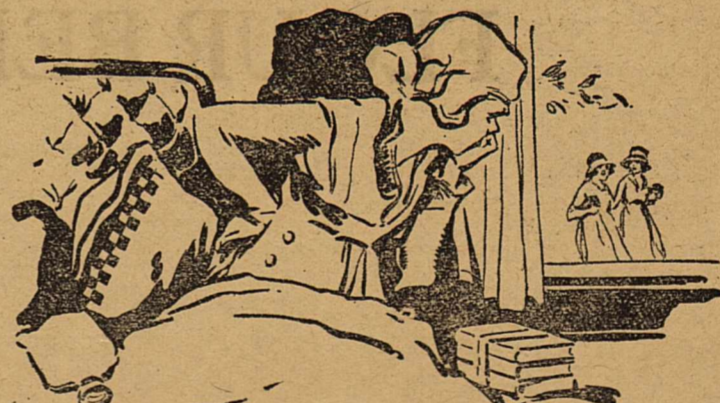

We could have sold perhaps 100 extra copies of last week's paper, containing the salt mill writup, but they were all gone by early Saturday morning. One Lubbock man sent us an order for five copies.

Hardin street for almost two blocks west of the square is almost a disgrace to the town, and most of the streets are no paved thoroughfares. Some of the property owners on that street are trying to do a little improving in front of their own property, but it takes concerted action to succeed. There is a remedy to make the careless or indifferent carry on, and that remedy is incorporation.

Two of the Fort Worth Co., men, who will likely build a mill, have already shipped in their cars. 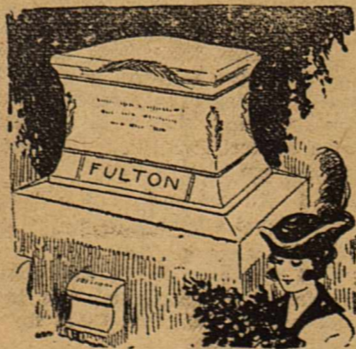

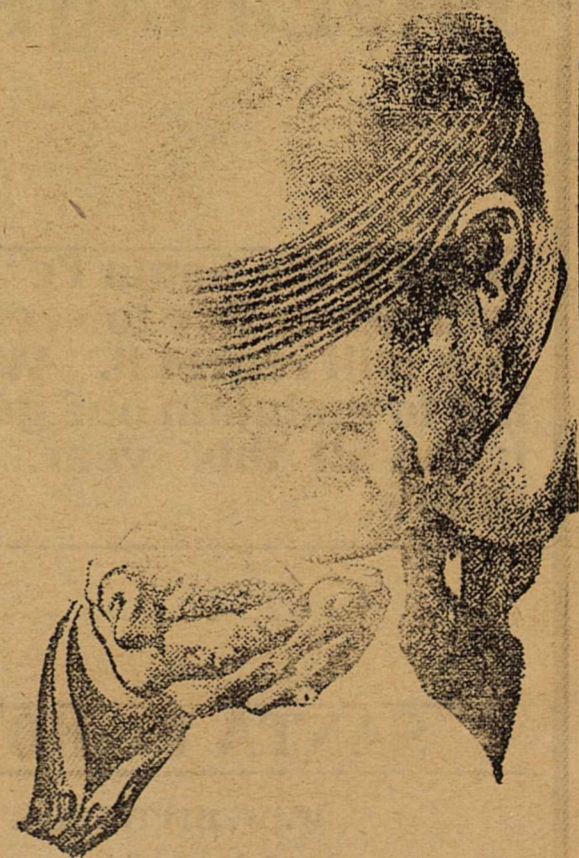

The captain of each side is given a complete set of letters of the alphabet. The captains line up their twenty six players on opposite sides of the room, parallel to each other. The leader of the game calls out a word to be spelled, for instance "dog". Both sides tries to form the word first, the one forming it correctly first being the winner. (A line is drawn at the end of the room where the word is formed). The side that wins ten points first, wins and is awarded the ten points. If the letter appears twice in the word, shake the letter. The Judges decide which side forms the word first.

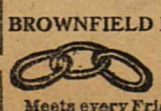

The only drawback to wide use of this dairy product as a universal drink is the fact that it must be made locally and regularly, for it can not be kept in good condition for a long period

of time. Looked at from another angle this apparent drawback is a good thing because it will create a demand for the production of more milk for its manufacture. It stimulates the dairy industry, by furnishing a market for skim milk, which has always been considered more or less a by product.

It is now the opportunity of the creameries and Ice Cream manufacturers to put this product of the dairy on the market, create a demand for it, then see that the demand is always met, with a product that is good, clean and wholesome.

DENIES REPORT

New York, March 15

William Solane, Chairman of the National War Work Council, Y. M. C. A., denying the report circulated by the Universal Hearst news service to the effect that the Y. M. C. A. had under consideration a plan for diverting money contributed by the public for soldier welfare to the erection of permanent Association buildings throughout America, issues the following statement.

"At no time has the Y. M. C. A. advocated or even suggested that any money contributed for war welfare work to be used to erect

permanent buildings for the Association, or that it be used for any purpose other than for which it was contributed, the welfare of the men in the service. The statement is unqualifiedly false. Any plan that would look to a diversion of the money in the manner mentioned is entirely contrary to the consistent and firm stand the Y. M. C. A. has taken."

U. S. HAD 2ND LARGEST ARMY WHEN ARMISTICE CAME

The total strength of the United States army on November 11, when the armistice was signed, and when the American war effort was set at its peak, was 3,793,273 officers and men, including marine corps on duty with the army in Europe, according to statistical tables made public by the War Department.

Included in the tables is a comprehensive statement of the strength of the allied and German forces on the Western front. The statement shows that on July 1, for the first time, the allied rifle strength exceeded that of the Germans.

Rifle strength, which means the men standing in the trenches ready to go over the top with bayonet, the allied total was 1,556,600, and the Germans 1,412,000.

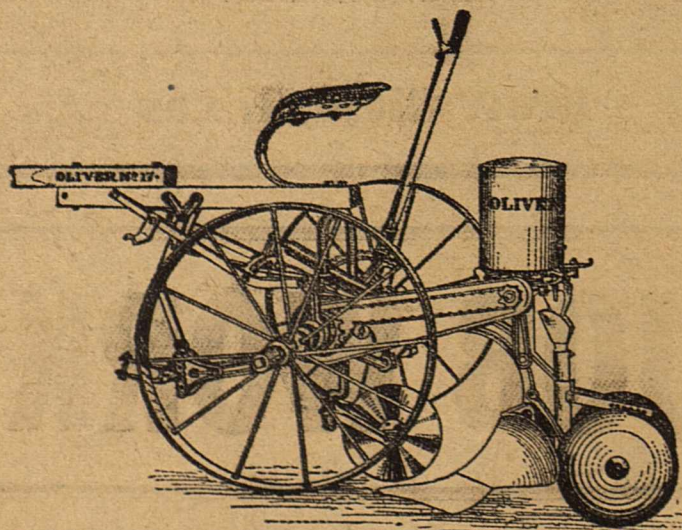
NOTICE OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES ELECTION
