SHALL BROWNFIELD HAVE A COUNTRY CLUB?

Just before we entered the war there was considerable talk of purchasing the natural lake in the north-east part of town from M. V. Brownfield, put down a big well and make one of the best local resorts on the Plains out of it, but the war came on and with it the drouth and crimping money matters and the enterprise, like many others had to be temporarily abandoned.

But now prosperity is knocking at our gates again, and we believe it a good time to take the matter up once more. There has been some talk of reviving the matter since the big rains when people can see or themselves just how easily a huge lake can be made. Mr. Brownfield offered to sell the lake at that time at a reasonable figure and take a good stock in the enterprise, and there is no reason to believe but what he is willing to do the same thing again.

The former plans were to put down a big well, install a high power engine and a big pump to keep the lake full, and after the ground is once thoroughly soaked, the engine would not have to be run near all the time. The banks and near the banks were to be put out in grass and trees, a club house could be built when we want to, boats could be put on the lake, and the waters stocked with government fish, which are furnished free of charge.

Now as to the benefits to be derived there is no use to make any arguments. We owe it as a duty to every boy and girl in the community, to give them a chance to learn to swim. There is no greater sport than swimming outside of the fact that it is the best muscle and bone exercise known to medical science. Besides we do not know that our boys and girls will always remain on the Plains where there is not enough surface water for them to drown in, and if

they should go off and drown elsewhere, we cannot get out of the fact that we are in a measure partly responsible. Then those who do not enjoy a swim or a boat ride can go after the finery tribe.

Of course we understand that only those who take stock would be entitled to the privileges of the lake, but the stock could be put so low that hardly anyone but could get in, or a small fee for boating or swimming could be charged those who did not take stock.

We believe this would be a good beginner for the Chamber of Commerce, and should they be able to put the matter over, the future of that organization would be assured, for they would have not only the lasting thanks, but the hearty support of every man, woman and child in the town. Will they call a meeting to take up the matter?

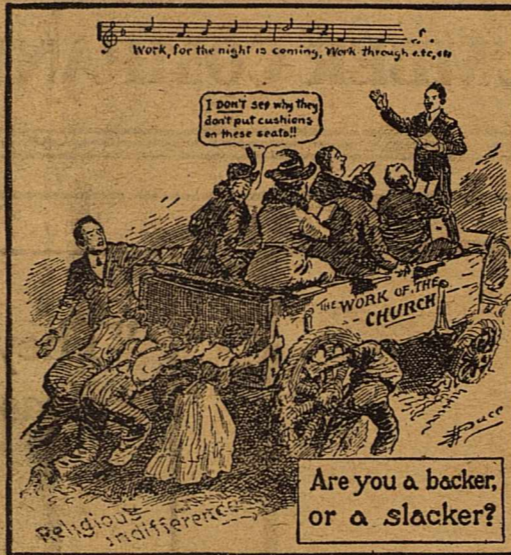

CONTRACT FOR SCHOOL BUILDING LET

We are very much pleased to announce this week that the contract for the erection of our new school building has been let. The Trustees were closeted with John L. Scott, a well known architect and contractor almost all day Tuesday, and building was finally awarded to the above gentleman for a consideration of the sum of \$24,000.00, the contractor to wreck the old school building and use as much of the material in it as possible.

The building must be ready for occupancy on October 1st.

Almost altogether new plans were accepted, which will strictly comply with all the state laws. Beginning at the basement, it will contain an auditorium that will seat almost 1000 people, and will contain two large dressing rooms that can in the future be turned into class rooms if need be. The first and second floors will contain eight class rooms, the superintendent's office, and a teachers room.

Mr. Scott left immediately for his home to begin making preparations to start the work, and will order his sand as he goes through Justiceburg. The building will be of tile and brick vinere, and Mr. Scott will use all the home labor he possibly can.

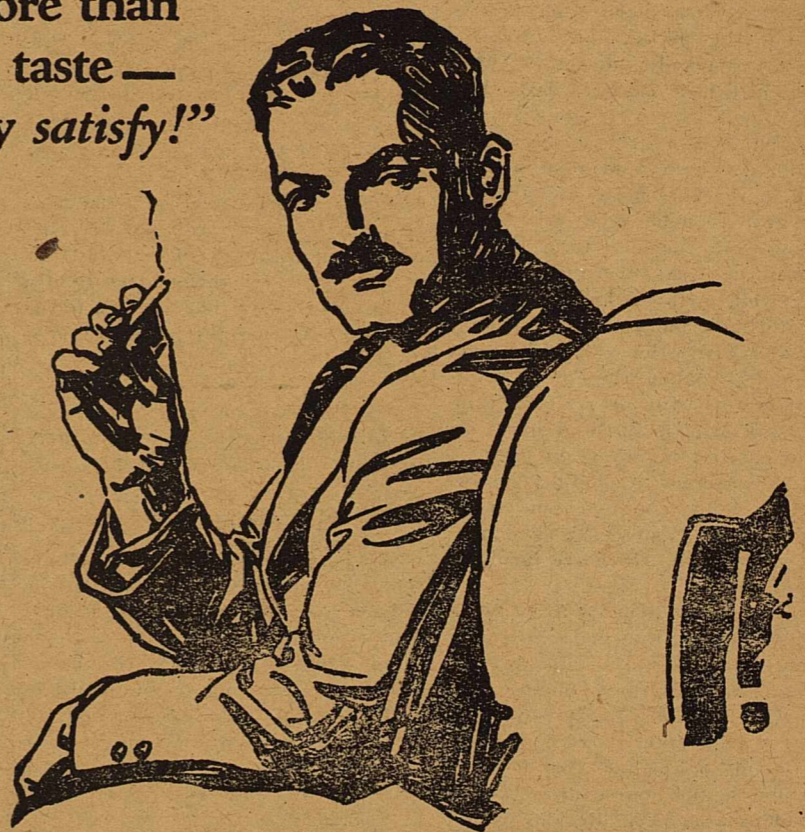

D. 1919 a petition was presented to me for an election in Common School District No. 9, of this county, on the question of authorizing a tax of and at the rate of fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in said district for the purpose of supplementing the State School Fund apportioned to said District, said petition bearing the requisite Number of signatures of property tax paying voters of said District, and being in every respect in conformity with law.

Terry County, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 27th day of June 1919, at the school house of said District No. 9, of this County as established by order of Commissioner's Court, Terry County the record of which being recorded in the minutes of said Court of Terry County, to which references are here made for boundaries of same. To determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax-paying voters of that District desire to tax themselves for the purpose of supplementing the State School Fund apportioned to said District and to determine whether the Com-

missioners Court of this County shall be authorized to levy assess and collect annually a tax of and at the rate of fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in said District for said purpose. J. D. Whitford is hereby appointed presiding officer for said election, and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the Commissioners Court of this County as required by law, for holding a general election. The ballots for said election shall

have written or printed thereon the following.

For School Tax
Against School Tax

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this County and who are resident property tax payers in said District shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The Sheriff of this County shall give notice of said election by having the same published in the Terry County Herald for twenty days before said election.

Sympathetic Strikes

The meanest strikes that have ever been waged are what is termed "sympathetic strikes." That is, where the men in one factory or industry have trouble with their employer, all the union workers in all the other industries of the city, or state, be stopped from work until the matter is settled.

For instance, were Plainview thoroughly organized, to use a union phrase, if the manager of a grocery store had trouble with one or more of his clerks, they would strike, and then all the grocery clerks, dry goods clerks, auto mechanics, printers, and all other union men in the town, would go on a strike, (even though they had no grievance against those for whom they are working) in "sympathy" with the clerks in the store where the trouble originated. Then, if this did not bring the matter to settlement, all union men in the district then the entire state, would be called out on strike. It does not matter at all what contracts the workers have with their employers, or how pleasant their relations, they are expected to drop their tools whenever a "sympathetic strike" is called.

Winnipeg Canada, and other cities in that section are now experiencing one of the greatest "sympathetic strikes" in history, and the result is going to be that the majority of the strikers, all those who are aliens, will be deported for they are nothing less than bolsheviks.

Over at Dallas, a "sympathetic strike" has been called in every industry, because an electric light and power company has trouble with its employees. A number of unions in the city and nearby cities have called the men out.

The principle on which the sympathetic strike is predicted is to make everybody suffer until the union has its way. More often than otherwise it is used for revolutionary or political purposes, and is the work of the radical elements in the union.

There is absolutely no excuse for the "sympathetic" strike. It is anarchistic, autocratic, un-American.

There should be some sort of legislation that would make a "sympathetic" strike impossible.

The "sympathetic" strike almost invariably injures the unions more than any body else, for the good level headed citizenship soon rise up in their righteous indignation and settle matters against the strikers.—Plainview News.

In a South Plains town about three years ago Ferguson was billed to make a political speech. The District Attorney was asked to introduce the gentleman, and he responded to the committee: "Yes, I'll introduce the gentleman if you'll let me do it in my own way. I would love to ask him publicly why he granted a pardon to a red handed murderer that I sent to the penitentiary for thirty years. The man had not hardly gotten his striped suit fitted to him before Ferguson pardoned him." As a sequel the man's brother was in district two weeks ago with two heinous crimes charged against him, and they were so foul that there was a feeling that the case should be taken out of the courts and tied on a telephone pole. The man figured that if his brother could take human life and come scot free through the pardon route that he could take long chances on sliding by the law, and if the law did pick him up he could wink himself out of the scrape. Contempt for the law breeds criminals.—Canadian Record.

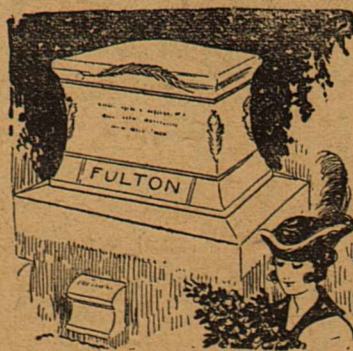

Writer Back Again

About five years ago the Farm and Ranch sent a feature writer to the South Plains and Panhandle to write an article on the tremendous crop that was being harvested. A splendid scoop for the Farm and Ranch. The writer was the greenest tenderfoot that ever set foot in West Texas. Driven in a high powered car he climbed the cap rock early in the morning, made a record run in traversing the Plains over splendid roads which nature provides before traffic cuts them out, and left the Cap Rock on the West side and entered New Mexico just as the stars were winking their good night to the nocturnal perambulators.

From that highly inspiring and knowledge diversifying inspection trip the writer prepared a glowing article, the principal thing of which seemed to be the prairie dogs which he saw along the roads and imagined that prairie dogs and rattle snakes live in the same homes.

Other idiosyncracies of his imagination furnished him the data for several nature incidents and he concluded his article with the statement that the 1914 crop was the biggest one that West Texas had for twenty years and it would be twenty years before they had another such crop. State of Texas; County of Terry: —Whereas, on the 9th day of June A. D. 1919, a petition was presented to me for an election in Common School District No. 13, of this county, on the question of authorizing a tax of and at the rate of (25c) on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in said district for the purpose of supplementing the State School Fund apportioned to said District, said petition bearing the requisite number of signature of property tax paying voters of said District, and being in every respect in

conformity with law.

Now therefore, I, W. W. Price, in my capacity as County Judge of Terry County Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 27th day of June 1919, at the Schoolhouse in said District No. 13, of this county as established by order of the Commissioner's Court, Terry County, the record of which being recorded in the minutes of said court Terry County, to which references are here made for boundaries of same To determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax-paying voters of that district desire to tax themselves for the purpose of supplementing the State School Fund apportioned to said District and to determine whether the Commissioner's Court of this county shall be authorized to levy assess and collect annually a tax of and at the rate of fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in said District for said purpose.

Jim Cunningham is hereby appoint-

ed presiding officer of said election, and he shall elect two judges and 2 clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the Commissioner's Court of this county as required by law, for holding a general election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

For School Tax

Against School Tax

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and of this county and who are resident property tax payers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The Sheriff of this county shall give notice of said election by having the same published in the Terry County Herald for twenty days before said election.

The Biggest Wheat Farmer.

Proclamation By The Governor Of Texas.

The Government of the United States is endeavoring to disseminate principles of Thrift among the peoples of this nation, that they may learn to avoid waste, save wisely, spend wisely and invest their savings safely and judiciously.

The government is offering the opportunity of making safe and judicious investments through the medium of thrift stamps and War Savings Stamps, that they may have money invested for any future emergencies or opportunities that may arise;

It has been decided to designate the eight days from June 29th to July 6th, 1919, inclusive, as thrift message week in the Eleventh Federal District, during which time Thrift Messages will be delivered and the benefits accruing from a life of thrift be pointed out.

The entire State of Texas is within the boundry of the Eleventh Federal District.

THEREFORE, I W. P. Hobby, Governor of the State of Texas do hereby proclaim the eight days from June 29th to July 6th, A. D. 1919, both inclusive, as Thrift Message Week, that Thrift Parades be held on Independence day, and do call upon the citizens of the State of Texas to join in its observance.

I urge that thrift messages be delivered at all public gatherings held in the State of Texas during thrift message week, that Thrift Message Parades be held on Independence day, July 4th, and that all bells in the State of Texas be rung and that all whistles in the State of Texas be blown at 10 o'clock each morning and at 4 o'clock each afternoon during

Thrift Message Week, and that the purpose and object of the Government's Saving Campaign be given an earnest attention by all citizens of the State of Texas.

In Testimony Whereof, I have here unto signed my name and caused the seal of the State to be hereon impressed, at the City of Austin, Texas, this the 13th day of June, A. D. 1919.

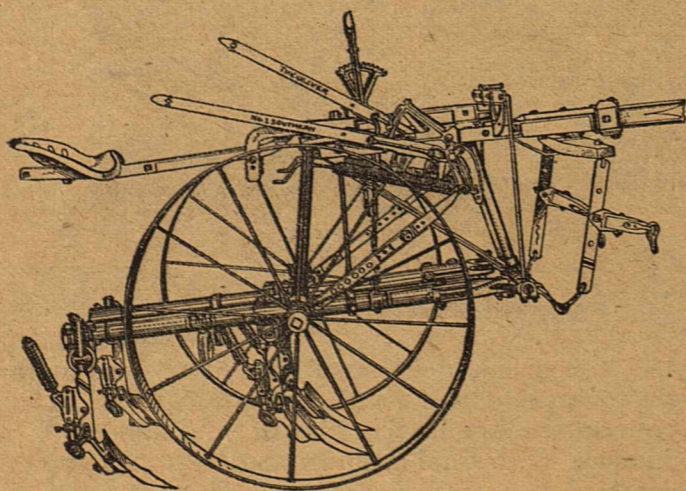
Returns Show Three Of Four Amendments Defeated.

Complete returns of the election held on May 24th in which four constitutional amendments were voted on, show that only one of the four was adopted. Prohibition was defeated by a majority of 20,075; Woman Suffrage was defeated by a majority of 24,029; Governor's Salary Increase was defeated by a majority of 85,767 and home ownership was defeated by a majority of 969. Two hundred and forty six counties held elections and two, Upton and Moore did not hold elections. Only 297,889 votes were cast on the prohibition amendment, and it carried the highest vote cast of the four, which shows that the vote over Texas was exceedingly light. The voting strength of the State according to poll tax receipts being 649,045.
