A BRIEF STORY OF TERRY

We are constantly receiving inquiries about old Terry, and while we have told the story over and over a great many times, the story never gets old to us, and we are always willing to accommodate our new readers with a little more Terry.

SANESTORMS: Yes, we have them, so does every other place west of Dallas, and west of the chiggers and tick, and west of the fever and ague, and west of the hurricane and tornado belt in Texas, and if you think you like these things better than you would standstorns for two or three months in the year, then you had best stay where you are. Our standstorns are generally caused by and are a result of tornadoes in the east, and we can't help either.

DROUTHS: It gets dry out here, but you don't expect to find the rainfall of the Mississippi swamps in a country classed as a desert for 100 years, do you. But not a drop of water that falls here ever reaches the gulf, as every bit of it sinks into the deep red clay subsoil, there to await the demand of the growing plant. For seventeen years, farming has been carried on here, with one crop failure. How many failures from dry weather and floods have you seen where you are at in that time. We had a crop failure in 1917, but the rest of west Texas with a few exceptions saw three.

RAINFALL: In giving you the rainfall in Terry county for the past six years, we are not giving you just guess figures, but official government figures taken from the local weather station in Brownfield:

1914, 29.19 inches; 1915, 24.82; 1916, 18.30; 1917, 10.70; 1918, 19.00; 1919, 27.00, with an average annual rainfall for the six years of 21 1/2 inches, and we know that splendid crops here can be made with 18 inches.

AGE: On the 4th day of the coming June, Miss Terry will be sweet sixteen, and the old settlers should celebrate that occasion, for she has

given them fifteen bountiful harvests in that time.

CLIMATE: With the exception of the two months of sandstorms in the spring, which do not blow from the same direction all the time, we have one of the most delightful climates to be found in the whole of the United States, and this is according to government figures. There is almost always a delightful breeze in the summer and one does not have to lay wake half the summer nights on account of heat and humidity, and you must be careful that there is at least one blanket on the bed, for you will need it before day.

RACES: Or rather we should have said race, for there is only one here except a few Mexicans on the Santa Fe section forces, and with this exception they are all native white Americans; very little foreign blood here and what there is has been so long over you will never know the difference. The south Plains people come nearer being the genuine, patriotic Americans than any other section of Uncle Sam's vast domain.

ALTITUDE: While our land is cheap, the same cannot be said of our altitude, for we are a little more than 3000 feet above the level of the sea, and that is the reason that you always have a coming appetite, and are ready at a moment's notice to drop into the lap of Morpheus for a good old snooze. It is the ozone in the extremely rarified air.

CLIMATE: The climate is generally dry in the winter and early spring months, though there are generally some snows in the winter, but the rains come in the spring plenty early for planting purposes, and almost all of it falls in the growing months of May, June, July, August, September and October.

CROPS: The crops are corn, cotton, maize, kafir, cane, etc. The grain known as "small" will grow here too, but owing to the fact that there has never been a thresher in the county, and the further fact that the people got started out on corn, these grains

with the exception of millet have not been given a thorough trial. Millet often reaches a height of six feet here. In the seventeen years that Terry county has been farmed, one farmer that has been here all that time has made sixteen corn crops and one failure, and he will make an affidavit to this effect. One farmer came here from Oklahoma three or four years ago, has made three crops of corn that will total near 20,000 bushels, and he will make affidavit to that effect. While no exact figures can be given, taking the combined shipments made here by local grain men and adding them, one will find that between 125 and 150 cars of corn was shipped from Brownfield alone this past season, not to say anything about the maize, kafir and cotton, and don't forget that there is not more than four or five hundred farmers in Terry county to do all this. In one carefully computed and weighed load of corn off one acre of land the past season, it showed a little better than 43 bushels. That beat most of the land in Illinois and Iowa that sell for \$300 per acre, and on our land the corn paid for the land. In fact one farmer offered to sell his corn crop for \$1.00 per bushel in the field and throw in the land early last fall. There was more than 10,000 bushels of corn gathered off his four hundred acre farm. Did you ever hear of such as this before?

As we stated above, there was shipped out vast quantities of maize and kafir and the local gin turned out more than 1100 bales of cotton the past season. For some reason or another, and we always layed it to the extra amount of work required, the farmers of Terry county have never gone very heavy on cotton, although as much as 1 bale per acre and more have been produced here more than one of the eleven years we have been in old Terry.

FRUITS: The fruits consist of apples, peaches, plums, apricots, cherries and grapes, some of the berries and all the temperate climate melons

Apples and grapes are almost sure crops; plums a little less sure, and you need not depend on your peaches more than one out of every three but then you can put up and keep enough to do all that time, even if you just have a little town orchard. As to the melons, they are here in profusion every year, and in 1918, when there was hardly a melon anywhere else in West Texas, some of our growers were supplying the big hotels of West Texas. Yes, they do grow good and juicy and red to the rind, and when these good summer days of real pleasure, among the fruits, melons, string beans, and "rosenyears" arrive, and you can be fanned with a cool sea like breeze by night you will forget all about the sandstorms of early spring, and will try to forget the chills and fever and the doctor bills you endured in the east.

SOCIETY: We claim we do have good society for our people are made up of mostly western people and the word "selfish" is not in their vocabulary. Some of the people dance, but if you don't, you don't have to attend these functions. But all of the people, sometime, go to church. They are sure enough charitable, too for they have given more than two thousand dollars in cash besides other things too numerous to mention to home folks that have had fires and sickness and other misfortunes in the past twelve months, not to say anything about the eleven years we have resided in old Terry. If you are honest and work, you will not starve here; NEVER.

SCHOOLS: Here is another thing that few counties in the east excel us in and few equal. Did you ever see a rural school in the east with twenty pupils where they were building a \$15,000 school building? Well, they do here, and they are building good ones in almost every district in the county. Brownfield is just finishing a \$40,000 school building, has eight teachers that carry you to the 11th grade—we mean through the 11th. The school terms are from six to

nine months.

CHURCHES: All the principle denominations of the protestant faiths are represented here. There are five church organizations in Brownfield—the Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Church of Christ and Christian. The four first mentioned have houses of worship, and each of them have local ministers.

LODCES: Those that love their lodges will not be deprived of that pleasure here, for the principle ones are here. The Masons have the blue and Royal Arch chapters here, the Odd Fellow, Woodmen, Eastern Star, Rebekahs and the Woodmen Circle also have lodges.

Brownfield has large and well supplied stores of all kinds, three big lumber yards, two banks that had on deposit more than \$600,000.00 the last call we printed, a modern gin, theatre, grist mill, two hotels and several boarding houses and a \$6000 newspaper plant. Gomez, Meadow, Tokio and Harris are thriving villages that was ever introduced, it supported, win- of the church organizations, besides splendid schools.

Terry county land ranges from a deep sand on through what is know as a mixed breed land to a tight sand land, but all is underlayed with a deep red clay subsoil, and the price ranges from about \$15.00 per acre to \$60.00 according to the location and the improvements. This land is underlayed with what is know as sheet water at a depth of 60 to 100 feet, and the supply is inexhaustable, and almost chemically pure.

While we have made a great deal of mention of the crops and fruits, we have not said a word about its stock possibilities, and that is one of its main feature, for before farming was ever introduced, it supported, winter and summer, vast herds of cattle, and even now, it is regarded as one of the best stockfarmers countries in the whole world. The reason for this is the fact that stock are unusually free from the diseases and

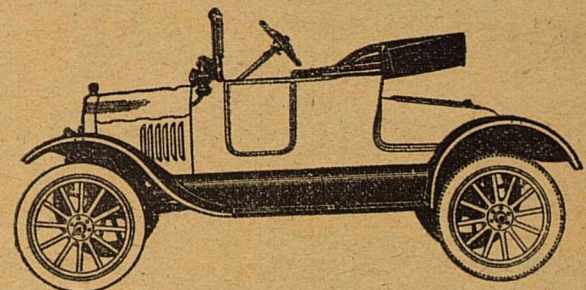

Precinct conventions have been called for the 1st Saturday in May, and the County Convention has been called for the Tuesday following the Precinct Conventions, and if you are not at both, and the county goes instructed for what you think is the wrong people and the wrong principals, don't raise a roar after the trick has been turned. Be on hand and use your franchise like you see best.

The idea is simply this. Will Terry county send a delegate to the State Convention denouncing the great administration of Woodrow Wilson, or

will it send one with a ringing endorsement of the achievements of the Democratic party under the brilliant leadership of Wilson? It is not because a business man carries a large space that he is a wreckless advertiser, providing he gives the space the attention his other business departments get. Former Attorney General B. F. But the bond election last Thursday was not forgotten, though a light vote was cast, there being only 41 votes polled and they were all for the additional \$12,000 needed in finishing and equipping our splendid new school building.
