## BETTER SCHOOLS TAG DAY MAY 1st.

On May the first there will be held in all parts of Texas what is known as a "Tag Day" for the purpose of arousing interest among all the people for better schools in Texas.

The Public School situation in this state has been growing steadily worse for the past two years and has now reached that point of deterioration as to be indeed alarming. In fact it will take activity and determination in no small degree on the part of the state to save our public schools from utter ruin. This year Texas schools needed about 2000 more teachers than could be secured for the schools. About 70,000 Texas children did not attend school, because teachers could not be secured to teach them. Last year at least one third of the best teachers in Texas left the profession. Conservative estimates place the number that will leave the profession this year at about one half unless something is done to better the situation.

In the November election there will be submitted to the voters of Texas an amendment to the state Constitution. This amendment purports to remove the limit on the amount of taxes which the people of any district may vote to support their own schools. If this amendment carries the people of any district can vote money to pay teachers better.

Those districts which desire to have good schools and to keep well-prepared teachers, will have liberty to take such steps as they deem proper towards this end. Those which prefer to leave their school situation as it is at present, will also be free to do this. The amendment is a local option measure. It does not raise taxes; it merely permits each school district to make such provisions as it chooses for the support of its schools.

Those who favor local self-government cannot consistently oppose this measure.

The Sheriff will begin killing prairie dogs on Monday, April the 17th 1920, on section 496, of Block D. of this county, and will continue to work until all dogs in the county have been killed.

The total expenses of killing the dogs will be charged to the owner of the land as provided by law.

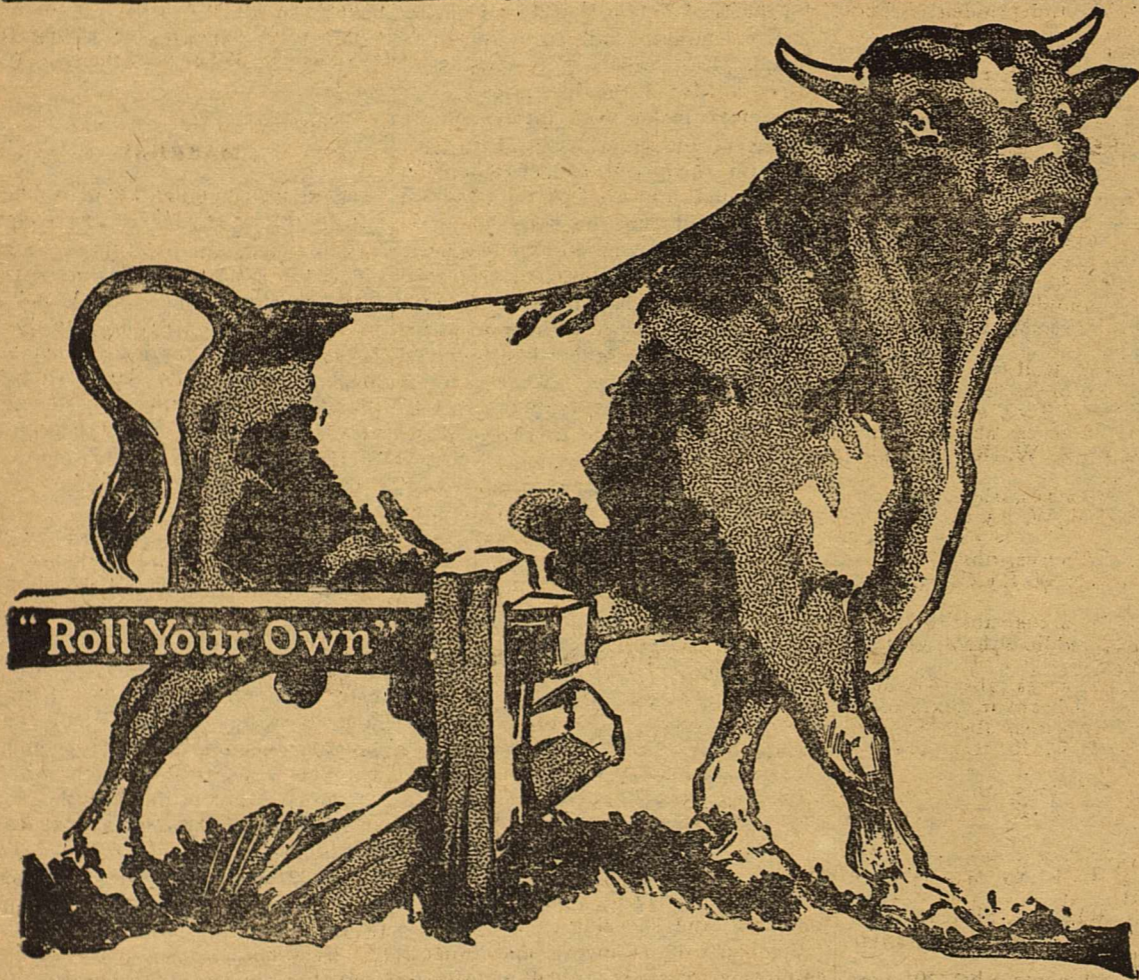

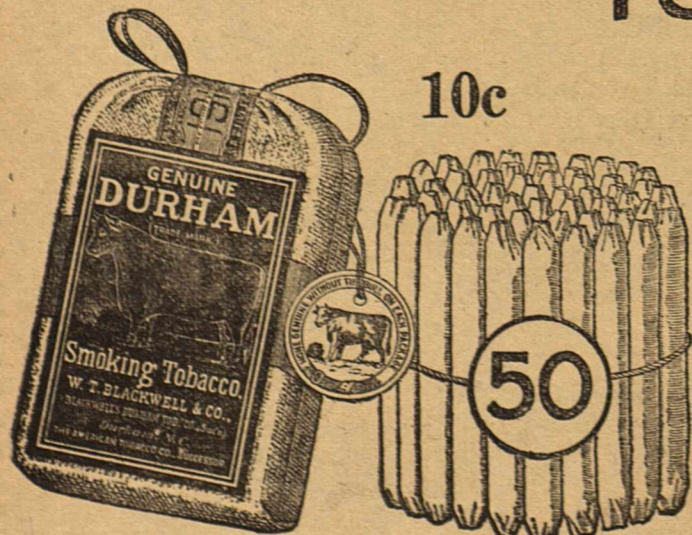

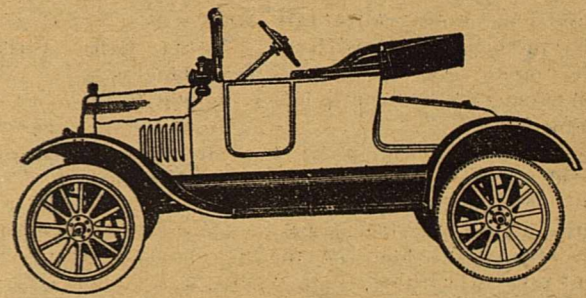

#### SPITTING, SNEEZING, COUGHING

Dr. J. B. McKnight of the State Sanatorium has issued the following statement relative to careless spitting, coughing, and sneezing:

Epidemics of influenza and other respiratory diseases, as well as infection from tuberculosis, are due largely to carelessness on the part of the public in spitting, coughing and sneezing, with no precaution for the protection of those nearby. The germs of tuberculosis, common colds, catarrh, pneumonia, influenza, and the like are spread in all directions practically every time one coughs, sneezes, or spits. Nearly everyone, though he may be well apparently, carries one or all of these germs in his mouth, throat and lungs. Coughing or sneezing without covering the face causes persons or objects to a distance of eight or ten feet to be deluged with dangerous germs, and when the spitter deposits the fecal matter from the throat or lungs on floor, sidewalk or street the first passerby may carry virulent poisonous germs into his home, affording a ready means of infection of children and susceptible adults. Our highways and byways are overlaid with this form of filth.

Nearly all of our cities have ordinances designed to prohibit spitting but these ordinances are not effective. Only when the spitter who ignores the spittoon or does not use a sputum cup and the cougher or sneezer who does not cover his face with a handkerchief are looked on by the public in the light as the person who fails to observe other common social amenities may we hope to make progress towards elimination of the respiratory diseases.

## TEXAS CAN SEND 8 MORE SENATORS

A group of Congressmen including "Uncle Joe" Cannon and Champ Clark were discussing the probable increase in the membership for that body as a result of the taking of the census, when a new member chimed in and remarked that he was glad the membership of the Senate could only be increased by two additional members through the admission of Alaska into statehood some time in the future. "Uncle Joe" smiled indulgently at the ignorance of the new member while Champ Clark, writes H. O. Bishop in the Dearborn Independent, turned upon him with this surprising statement which proved to be news to all present.

"Son, you ought to pole up a bit on your history. It is quite true that some of these days Alaska will give us two more United States Senators, but you are overlooking the great and glorious state of Texas. Don't you know that Texas can have eight more Senators any time she takes the notion? That's a fact, gentlemen! Texas can send a total of ten Senators to Washington by merely dividing herself into five states. When that State was admitted to the Union

back in 1845, some shrewd, farseeing political genius slipped a remarkable little joker into the terms of the deal, making such provision for the division of the State at any time that it might be desired.

### Can Divide State

"If you will look up the joint resolution of the Congress for annexing Texas to the United States, approved March 1, 1845, you will find, if my memory serves me right, that it reads: 'New States of convenient size, not exceeding four in number, in addition to the said state of Texas, and having sufficient population, may hereafter, by the consent of said State, be formed out of the territory thereof, which shall be entitled to admission under the provisions of the Federal Constitution.'

"I suppose for sentimental reasons there is a strong feeling among many Texans at present against dividing the State. But on the other hand, the State is so colossal in its dimensions, and the interests and physical conditions of different sections are so varied that some day the folk down there will want to divide things up. I understood a bill was introduced in the Senate of that State a few years ago providing for the crea-

tion of a new State in the Panhandle section.

"You boys can get some idea of the present unwidly magnitude of Texas by imagining it to be a huge frying pan. If you were to take it by the handle and turn it over in a westward direction, it would extend from its western boundry out into the Pacific Ocean; if turned eastward it would hit the Atlantic Ocean; northward it would blot out Chicago, Detroit, and most of the great lakes. Southward it would smother out all of Mexico."

At this point "Uncle Joe" took up the conversation, saying, "Yes Champ is right about all that aggregation of Senators Texas can flood us with any time she pleases, but I hope that will never happen because I know every mother's son of them will be Democrats."

### BAILEY NOT IN RACE

Dallas, Texas, April, 17 — "I don't believe that the Panhandle will know that Joe Bailey ever was supposed to run," says James McDowell of Farwell, Texas, in a letter to Col. Thomas Ball of the Democratic Administration Executive Committee, under date of March 12.

Mr. McDowell is a prominent stock and ranch man and has a wide acquaintance throughout the plains country. His letter as follows:

"Two years ago I stumped the county against Ferguson and urged the voters to support the man for Congress who would support President Wilson.
