



Even there the American spirner has a very decided advantage over the English spinner, owing to the ing an even higher pro rata tax than more middlemen handling the cotton after it reaches the shores of England, thence to the mills fifty miles distant, than is the case in America. As each must figure larger profits, to enable him to pay these heavy war taxes, these taxes multiply as the bale passes from hand to hand, until by the time it has reached the Lancashire spinner, there is an added expense in profits and multiplied war txes, amounting to what is variously estimated at \$50.00 to 100.00 per bale, the later estimate being aption to the tax on Mills profits. #### ANCIENT SWAMP ANIMALS OF NEW MEXICO.

Fossil turtles, some of them not less than three million and others seven million years old, have recently been found in San Juan County, Northern New Mexico. Remains of extinct turtles are rather common, but most of them consist of many small pieces, badly crushed and flattened of otherwise damaged.
