PREVENTION OF BLACL


This is the season of the year when the cattlemen should lay plans for
the prevention of losses of calves with blackleg. Blackleg is a specific infective di-
sease of cattle, characterized by gaseous swellings in the various muscle tissues. The term blackleg is a mis-
nomer, as it implies that this disease nomer, as it implies that this disease
is confined to the structures of the legs. As a matter of fact, blackleg of
the heart or the muisces between the heart or the musces between
the ribs or the diaphragm is not at all unusual. Blackleg is very prev-
alent. It has been estimated that the alent. It has been estimated that the
loss of calves from this disease alone exceeds $\$ 6,000,000$ so that blackleg annually causes a loss of aproximately $\$ 25,000,000$ to the cattlemen. The cause of blackleg is a germ
which is universally distributed in soi's, particularly pastures, and lots where animals have died of the di-
sease. This germ may be transport ed for many miles by the agency of carrion animals, such as buzzards,
wolves, crows, dogs, wolves, crows, dogs, etc. This di-
seas also may be introduced onto a premises by means of feed. The germ, occurring in the soil easily can
contaminate the feed in particles of dust, and many outbreaks have been investigated where feed has appar-
ently been the ently been the source of infection.
After blackleg has occurred on the farm, said farm must be considered permanently infected.
This disease may occur any season This disease may occur any season
of the year, though it is more common in the spring and fall months although mature animals may die of blackleg. The germ of blackleg gains
entrance to the animal body through wounds of the skin, or they may be ingested on foods and pass out into
