

AMBASSADOR TALKS

Upon arriving in the United States, Sir Auckland Geddes, newly appointed British Ambassador freely discused the Irish situation. "The British Covernment," 'he said, "has decided to place squarely on the shoulders of Irishmen of Ireland the responsibility of finding for themselves within the framework of the British empire the solution of their political differences." He thought it also the duty of other British subjects, and all friends of Ireland, to stand aside and let the Irish people grapple with their own difficulties. Proposals for the secession of Ireland form the empire were rejected by the British Cabinet, he stated, for the reason among others that the British Isles form one unit of defence. Sir Auckform one unit of defence. Sir Auck-land has often been in the United States and his wife was born in New York. "I took on my appointment as British ambassador at Washington," he declared, "as the greatest honor and priviledge that could have possbly been granted me. The main hope of world peace rests on the mutual respect and understanding between the United States and Great Britian, he declared."-Pathfinder.

Blackleg is a specific infective disease of cattle, characterized by gastissues. The term blackleg is a misis confined to the structures of the legs. As a matter of fact, blackleg of the ribs or the diaphragm is not at all unusual. Blackleg is very prevalent. It has been estimated that the loss of calves from this disease alone exceeds \$6,000,000 so that blackleg annually causes a loss of aproximately \$25,000,000 to the cattlemen.

The cause of blackleg is a germ soi's, particularly pastures, and lots where animals have died of the disease.
