A cyclone struck about a mile southwest of Lelia Lake Tuesday afternoon, near the Dunkle farm, took all the woater from a four acre lake, uprooted trees, and otherwise disported itself in the approved cyclonic fashion, except that nobody was hurt and no homes demolished. The funnel shaped cloud and the debris picked up by the wind when it struck the earth were plainly visible in Hedley (much too plainly for comfort) and the storm seemed much nearer than it really was, and coming this way. 



Slaughter, cowpuncher came to town one day while the overall disease had everybody in its grasp. He was promptly accosted by a committee and requested to don a pair of overalls. 


