Baptists To Hold S. S. Convention At Mineral Wells

State Gathering To Open At Resort City April 14 Will Attract 5,000 Visitors

The annual Baptist State Sunday School Convention to be held in Mineral Wells April 14, 15, 16, will be the first statewide Baptist convention to be held in this Centennial year. An attendance of over 5,000 is expected. Delegates will attend from 3,219 Baptist Sunday schools in Texas. There are 45,000 Sunday school officers and teachers actively engaged in these Baptist schools.

Conferences and round-table discussions of Sunday school problems will feature most of the morning and afternoon sessions. The evening sessions will be inspirational with special music and song service preceding the addresses.

G. S. Hopkins, general secretary, announced that 141 speakers and conference leaders have been contacted to have a part on the program. Principal speakers who will deliver inspirational addresses are Dr. W. Marshall Craig, Dallas; J. N. Barrette, Nashville, Tenn.; Dr. Karl H. Moore, Brownwood; Rev. R. E. Day, Big Spring; Dr. J. Howard Williams, Dallas; Dr. T. L. Holcomb, Nashville; Robert H. Coleman, Dallas, and Dr. F. M. McConnell, Dallas.

Dr. Clyde B. Campbell, Mineral Wells, will bring the welcome address and the Rev. H. E. Fowler, president of the convention, will respond. The keynote address will be given by Dr. John L. Hill, Nashville, Tenn.

The convention music will be the best that can be obtained. Robert Jolly of Houston will have charge of the music during the entire convention. Special music will be rendered by a choral club from Dallas, quartet and trio from Fort Worth, and various instrumental music. W. B. Moore of College Avenue Baptist, Fort Worth, will be the convention pianist.

MITCHELL COUNTY PLANTS HANDLE 22,634 BALES OF COTTON FROM LAST CROP

Twenty Counties In Section Gin 425,693 Bales, With Jones Well Ahead, Final U. S. Report States

Total gin receipts in Mitchell county from the crop of 1935 was 22,634 bales, according to tabulation announced recently by the department of commerce. The figures are over ten thousand in advance of total for the year previous, when 12,574 bales were ginned.

Twenty counties of this section of West Texas ginned 425,693 bales of cotton of the 1935 crop, the final report for the crop year.

Jones county, with 61,790 bales, led the region. Nine of the 20 counties accounted for 315,914 bales.

Five others, which are more or less evenly split in territory between farm land and range or hill country, produced 110,679 bales. The five were Dickens, Howard, Stonewall, Nolan and Martin. Nolan ended the season just one bale ahead of Dickens, which was only 111 bales higher than Howard.

The six other counties, in which farming country is somewhat smaller in area than the uncultivated territory, produced 77,604 bales. In this group were Throckmorton, Callahan, Coke, Midland, Eastland and Shackelford.

SPRING GARDENS ARE 4-H CLUB SUBJECTS

Spring gardens have been talked at 4-H club meetings of Mitchell county during March. Seed identification and information afforded amusement as well as interest to the club members.

Adoption of yellow and green or leafy vegetables has been assigned as one of the 1936 goals in garden work. To give the adopted varieties more renown, salads and sandwiches are being made of them. Three menus per girl are asked as an assignment so that better combinations may be known in using the familiar vegetables. School girls need leafy vegetables and unless they use some in their lunches they may not have them for the evening meal.

Raw cabbage has been rated as good as oranges and grape fruit in affording Vitamin C. Club girls have learned that cooked cabbage is best cooked only 20 minutes in a generous amount of water.

Hot beds have already been planted to tomatoes, peppers and eggplant. The following varieties of yellow vegetables have been recommended: Yellow Crookneck squash, Chantenay and Danvers Half Long Carrots, Little Sugar pumpkins.

Green vegetables and leafy vegetables afford a long list: Beans, pinto and Refugee; Peas, cream and black-eyed; tender greens; Swiss Chard; New Zealand spinach; English Peas-Alaska.

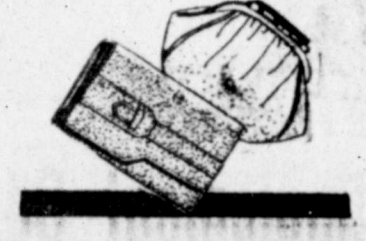

President Roosevelt Warns Against An Increase In Cotton Acreage This Year

President Roosevelt Thursday issued warning to farmers of the South that unofficial reports received at Washington indicated that they planned a fifteen per cent increase in cotton acreage this year, in spite of Federal efforts to further stabilize the industry.

The chief executive's comment termed "talking things over with my friends," has been given wide comment in the press. The Dallas News offers the following editorial comment:

President Roosevelt's warning to farmers not to increase cotton acreage in the face of a still burdensome carry-over comes at the right time. Planting is going ahead at an increasing rate; it has reached the Texas Gulf Coast region and is being extended steadily northward. The Cotton Belt of the Old South has

sources, might result in a depressing surplus which would work an immediate hardship upon producers.

Texas farmers should turn their attention to growing more feed to put into trench silos or stacks against the lean years which always arrive in any crop cycle. Texas has never had too much feed in all its history. Every farm should have at least two years of feed stored against crop failure. That is better than a front yard full of cotton bales with no market.

Texas farmers also had better remember that Brazil, Egypt, India, the Sudan, Argentina, Russia are all increasing their acreage. These foreigners got the jump on our farmers during the last few years and last season they supplied 14,222,000 bales of the world's cotton consumption of 25,128,000. The United States supplied only 11,206,000 bales. Farmers should take a hint from these figures.

COLORADO CITY OF 40 YEARS AGO MENTIONED IN CROSBYTON REVIEW

The "Colorado City" of forty years ago is prominently mentioned in one of the historical articles included in the Crosbyton Review's special edition celebrating the 28th birthday of the city of Crosbyton.

The article was written by N. Y. (Uncle Nell) Bicknell, and the por-

tion of it referring to Colorado City reads as follows:


"The building of the court house at Estacado was begun in 1887 and finished in 1888. Temple Ellis and myself hauled the first two loads of lumber that went into the court house from Colorado City, then the nearest railroad and shipping point. It usually took us four days to make the trip and six days in returning. In the winter it took eight days to make the return trip.

"On our trips down to Colorado City, we went by the way of Snyder which had a hotel and general store at that time, and on our return trips in order to avoid the sand between Snyder and Colorado, we came back by old Durham, about four miles east of where Gail in Borden county now is."

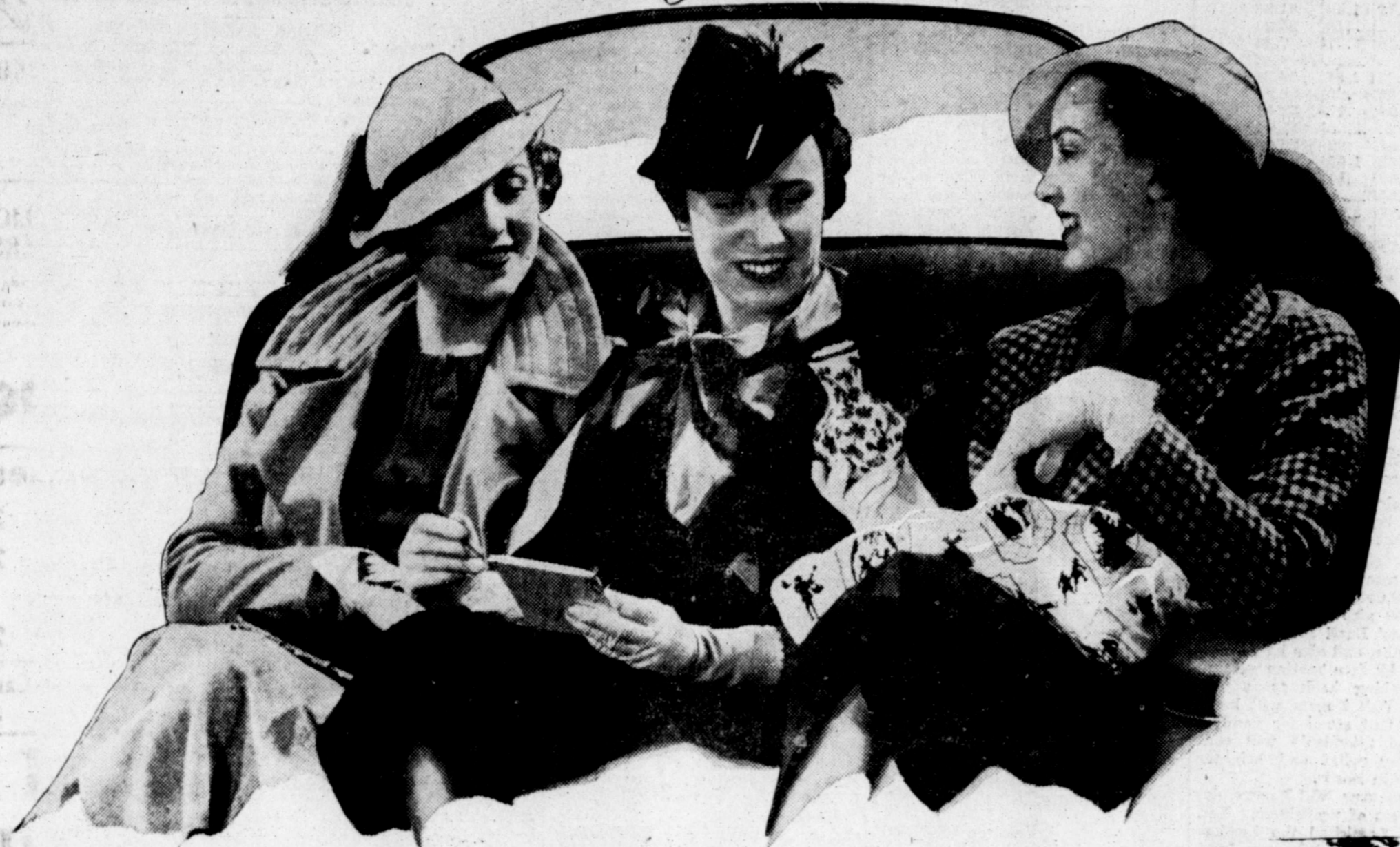
