She gave the Standard Club credit for originating the plan.

County Judge B. L. Templeton presided at the meeting. He stated that the commissioners' court had agreed to appropriate a sum of money to aid in financing such a building. Mayor J. A. Sadler offered the same pledge for the city council. W. S. James of Abilene, manager 'of the WPA, district 13, was present and addressed the meeting. He expressed himself as in favor of such a project and pledged cooperation out of

Proposed Change To 12 Grades Is Oked By Watson

Several Advantages Seen In System, Superintendent Of Colorado Schools States

The proposed change from eleven to twelve grades in public school would prove advantageous to students and should further efficiency of these institutions in Texas, J. E. Watson, superintendent of the Colorado schools, stated Monday.

In reference to the proposed change, Mr. Watson said:

"The proposed change from eleven to twelve grades in the public schools of Texas will have some very immediate advantages. The extra year would be taken up in the primary

"Such a plan would relieve a very difficult situation we now have in the primary grades. Since pupils in those grades are so young it is difficult for them to reach the present standards in the primary grades. The first three grades are perhaps the most difficult of the whole eleven grades. The pupil is immature, yet he has to learn more new things than in any other period of his school life. He has to have a new manner of life, new habits, new tools, have to read, have to write.

"Another added year would give the six-year-old more time to mature -to reach a mental age where he could better accomplish those difficult problems in a more efficient and in many cases less discouraging man-



Early this year the district committee, in a session at Sweetwater, took stringent action to prevent participating schools playing ineligible men in non-conference as well as conference games, and issued a warning on the subject. No formal motion was passed and the discussion was informal, but it was agreed that the committee would adhere closely to the ruling of the interscholastic league which savs ineligible men shall not be played in any game. I. R. Hutchingson. Roscoe superintendent, s serving his first year there, was not a member of the committee last vear, and consequently did not attend this meeting. Addressing the committee Wednesday Hutchingson said Roscoe was admititng Banes' ineligibility, but he added, "Early this fall before the season started. 



"As a means of making the best use of some of the late feed that could not have matured before frost, more farmers and ranchers are getting it buried in the trench," reports the Post Dispatch.

The Spur experiment station has found that steers fed five and onehalf pounds of cotton seed meal and about 20 to 30 pounds of ensilage needed no other feed to top the market and that they consumed these amounts at each feeding.




