### MARCUS SNYDER, JR., FOUND UNCONSCIOUS NEAR SIERRA BLANCA

Found unconscious in a corral on a ranch near Sierra Blanca early Wednesday morning, Marcus Snyder, Jr., was reported Wednesday afternoon to be in a serious condition in an El Paso hospital. No word concerning his condition had been received by Mrs. D. H. Snyder and other relatives on till Thursday noon.

His mother, Mrs. Marcus Snyder, Snyder was here from Dallas attending the trial over the estate of her late father, Judge R. H. Looney, when news of the mishap came. She and her two sisters, Mrs. Ed Rowley of Dallas and Mrs. H. B. Lindsay of Evanston, Illinois, left for El Paso Wednesday afternoon about 2 o'clock.

Although no complete account of the circumstances had been received here by Thursday noon it is understood that Snyder, who is about 23, and a companion were moving a horse from one ranch to another near Sierra Blanca Tuesday afternoon. The horse was in a trailer behind the car in which the two men rode. The trailer overturned and the men were unable to get the horse loaded again. Snyder walked and led the horse and his companion drove along beside him until they neared the ranch house.

Thinking that Snyder could get the horse the rest of the way without help, his companion drove on to the ranch house. When Snyder had not arrived by midnight a search was begun. He was found unconscious early Wednesday morning in the corral at the ranch house.

Efforts to revive him at a Sierra Blanca hospital failed and he was moved to El Paso and placed in the care of Dr. Felix Miller, who is well-known here, being the brother of Mrs. Y. D. McMurry. Dr. Miller told Mrs. Marcus Snyder, Sr., by phone Wednesday afternoon before she left here that her son was in a "serious" condition.

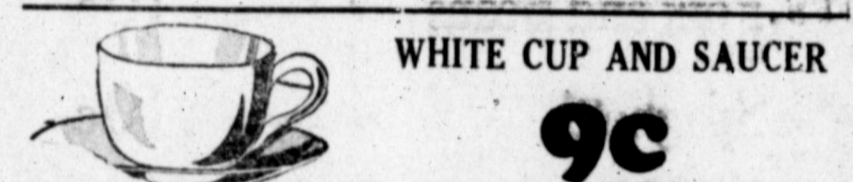

## ROSCOE CITIZEN HIJACKED OF \$245 BY YOUTH POSING AS 'POLITE' AUTO DEALER

### E. C. Brazil Relieved Of His Funds At Pistol Point Near Sweetwater After Ride In Car With Bandit

E. C. Brazil, aged farmer of the Roscoe community, reported to the Nolan county sheriff late Tuesday that he had been driven a few miles into the country and robbed of \$245 in cash by a well dressed young man who a short time before had approached the farmer in guise of a car salesman.

Brazil had gone to Sweetwater to cash a Federal soil conservation check in the sum of \$295. He paid some bills and was about to get into his car to drive home when approached by the bandit.

The thug, described as polite and expressing interest in Brazil's car, suggested a trade for his (the bandit's) Ford. Brazil got into the Ford with the man and was driven to the edge of town where they agreed upon terms of a deal.

"Well, drive back to where I parked my car and we will fix up the papers," Brazil suggested. Instead the youth drove rapidly out the highway and when some four miles from town pulled into a side road. Thrusting a gun into the farmer's side he demanded his money.

Brazil stated that he gave the bandit his money, left the car, as directed and walked back to Sweetwater. Officers here were requested to be on look-out for the bandit.

## BATTLE TO BREAK LOONEY WILL ENDED IN NON-TRIAL AS JURORS FAIL TO AGREE

## Children Of Late Pioneer In Effort To Establish Claim Undue Influences Figured As Testament Written

Legal battle instituted by children of the late Judge R. H. Looney, pioneer Colorado attorney, banker and property owner, to break his will in which Mrs. Gertrude Looney, widow of Judge Looney, is named beneficiary in the estate, ended in a non-trial in 32nd district court here Wednesday noon after the jury trying the case reported to Judge A. S. Mauzy they were unable to agree on a verdict. The twelve men were discharged and the case entered as a mistrial.

The charge that undue influences were brought into play by wife of the benefactor was stressed in original petition filed in the court, in pleadings by plaintiff attorneys and echoed from the witness chair as counsel representing the children directing the taking of evidence. This was denied by the defense.

The case was called Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The jury was selected after a short time and introduction of evidence started. The case went to the jury Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Several Coloradans and other Mitchell county citizens were brought into the case as witnesses.

The plaintiff was represented by Beall, Beall & Beall of Sweetwater and Thompson & Barber of Colorado. The defense was represented by Thos. R. Smith of Colorado.

In will of the late Coloradoan, executed February 5, 1927, and witnessed by C. H. Earnest and M. Carter, Judge Looney bequeathed his home, home furnishings, one motor car and \$250 in cash per month for one year following his death to his wife. The Colorado National bank was named executor of the estate.

The will provided that his property be sold and his debts paid, after which his wife, Gertrude Looney, receive the sum of \$25,000. On May 27, 1931, Judge Looney executed amendment to the original will, designating Mrs. Looney as sole executrix of the estate.

Hayes admitted responsibility of killing Matthew McCarver, another young negro, after the two met at a negro restaurant near Lone Wolf Creek bridge late Saturday night. An argument was started and Hayes stabbed the other youth with a long bladed knife, inflicting injuries in his head from which he died Sunday afternoon.

Hayes was taken into custody by Night Patrolman Terry a short time after the fight and taken to the county jail. He made statement to the district attorney Monday morning.

**SPRING TRAINING TO BEGIN SOON**

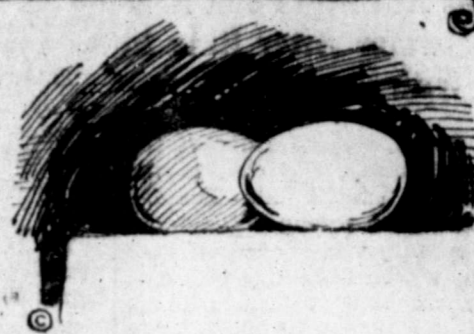

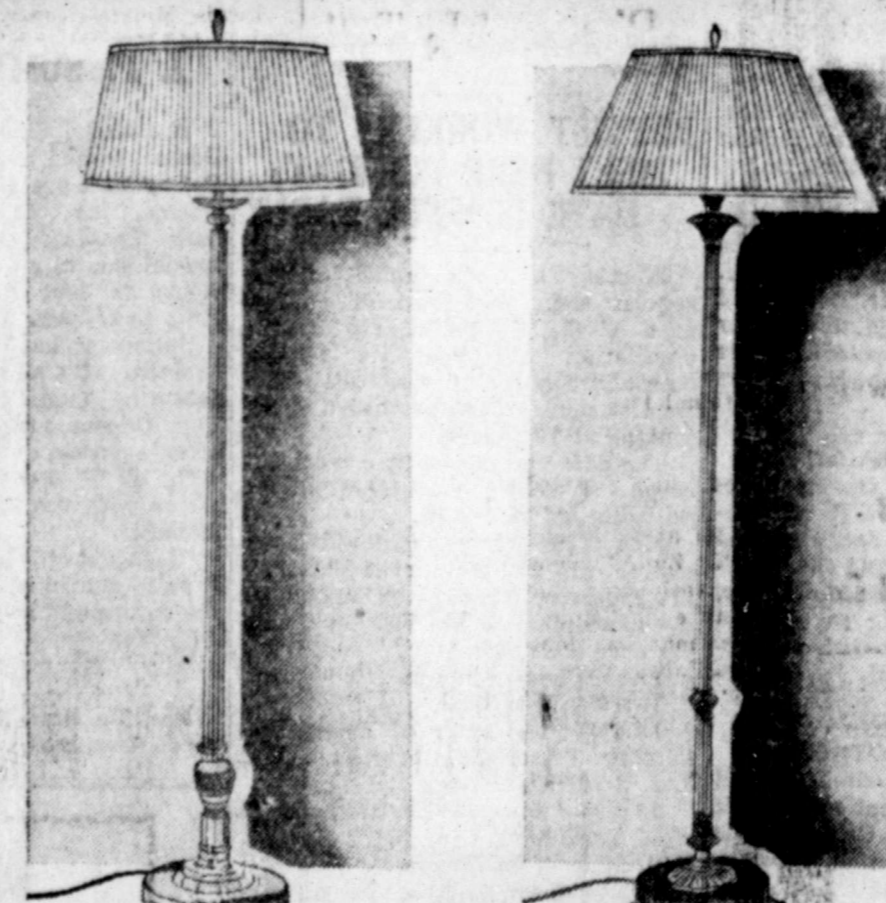

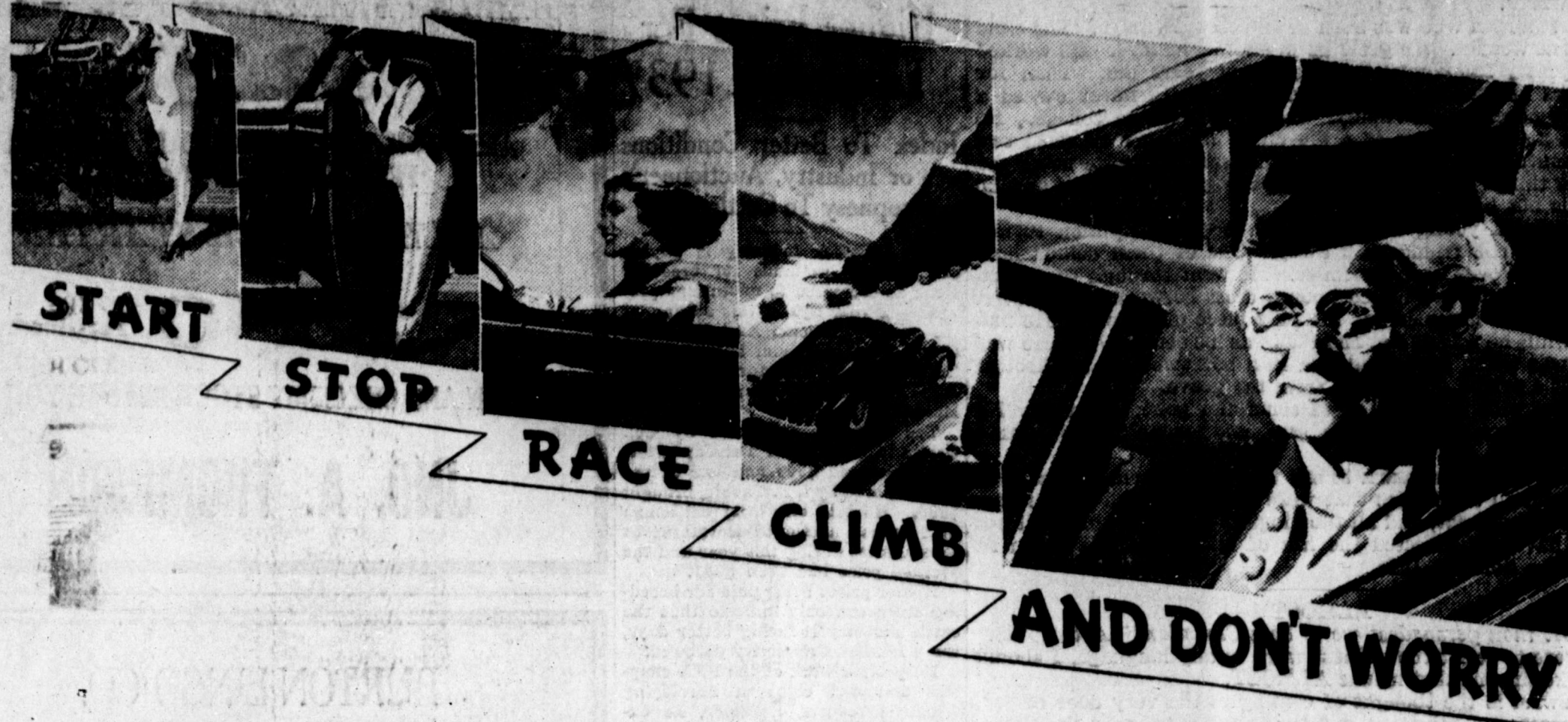

**ELECTION ORDINANCE**  
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO, TEXAS.  
1. That, a city election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Colorado, Texas, on the first Tuesday in April A.D. 1937, the same being the 6th day of April A.D. 1937, for the purpose of electing a Mayor, Three (3) Aldermen and a City Secretary for a term of Two (2) years.  
2. That J. C. Etheridge be and is hereby appointed presiding officer, and he shall select two (2) judges and two (2) clerks to assist in holding said election, and said election shall be held in the manner prescribed by law of the State of Texas for holding other elections.  
3. That every person who has attained the age of twenty-one years, and who has resided within the corporate limits of said city for six (6) months preceding the date of said election and is a qualified voter under the laws of the State of Texas shall be entitled to vote at said election.  
4. REQUEST TO GO ON BALLOT: That a request to have the name of any person placed upon the OFFICIAL BALLOT of said election as a candidate for any elective office of the city of Colorado, Texas, shall be filed with the city secretary in writing, not later than the 24th day of March A.D. 1937.  
5. The Mayor of the city of Colorado, Texas, is authorized and directed to have notice of said election be published as required by the laws of the State of Texas. PASSED AND APPROVED THE 8TH DAY OF FEBRUARY A.D. 1937.
