



Texas beef cattle was seen by the Bureau of Agriculture Economics, United States Department of Agriculture. Its predictions for the coming season and the-entire year were higher prices for cattle.

Results of the detailed study, which the bureau has given the situation, disclosed that in its view prices of nearly all grades of slaughter cattle are expected to average higher in packers for cattle and calves. In 1937 than in 1936, and probably higher than in 1935.

One factor in the advance of the price of better grade cattle is the reaction of the consumer to increases above current levels in price. This grade of cattle has shown a continual advance in price since last June and in mid-March, this year, was nearly as high as in the Spring of 1935.

The bureau expects the price of lower grade cattle to advance until May or June, when it usually drops. However, with further improvement in the consumer demand for meats and the relatively strong demand for replacement cattle the decline this year may be less than last year.







A Kermit group has been told, in effect, if they want a highway from Kermit back to a connection with the Bankhead, they can have it if they will pay for it, or rustle federal money to build it as a works progress job.

From Kermit west, there is no romise or indication anywhere soon, ven of this meagre encouragement. State Highway Engr. Gibb Gilchrist has said that so far as he knows, no steps are contemplated toward trying to complete the long gap from Kermit west. points on the existing highway. The proposal would involve build ing 200 miles of highway in an extremely-sparsely settled section to take about 75 miles off the present highway distance to El Past.





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
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ARE MAIL ORDER HOUSES CITY BUILDERS?

This is the third article on Buy-at-Home.

The mail order house builds the city in which it is located only, and it helps the upkeep of the large eastern cities. Every dime spent by mail stays there and doesn't circulate back to its origin. If you spend a dime at home the home merchant in turn spends it here and it continues until it winds back to you.

When there is anything to be done for the town's benefit the merchants are the first to be asked to contribute. Naturally they do business here and should contribute, but does the mail order house contribute? No, it never has and never will. If someone has hard luck and loses his hard-earned savings a petition is carried around asking the merchants to contribute. Now, if this person is a hometown customer, he should be helped on his feet again, but if he orders his merchandise from mail order houses do you think that the home town merchant should sympathize with him and help him start over again? No, let him ask the mail order house for help and see what he gets. He will get nothing, absolutely nothing. They don't care a bit about you, who you are, or what you do, just enough to get the money that rightfully belongs to the home town. Friends, you who fit into the picture at this point, think about it. Don't you think that's right?

Study the problem for a minute. Don't let 89c turn you to the mail order house because the home town merchant's price is \$1.00. The first thing you see is a 11e saving. Now let's analyze the saving. It costs you 3c to send for it, which leaves you a saving of Sc. If this priced article was a pair of shoes you would pay at least 8c postage to get it here, leaving the transaction even. Here is where the catch comes in. You are even and you have paid \$1.00 for the article. Now what if this article doesn't suit, fit or live up to expectation. You have to send it back, spending a few more cents, running the cost higher than it was at home and at the same time you have to wait for all this to take place. When all this trading is over you say, "I can order it cheaper." Here at home you see what you buy, you can try it on, and you can get it at a moment's notice.

Do you know why the mail order house affords to sell its merchandise a few cents cheaper? No, you think that it's natural and that the home town merchant is trying to rob you. They don't have to be bothered with you. No one tells them, "Can you make it cheaper?" or "I'll give you so and so for it." If they ask 50c they mean just that, and unless you pay it you don't get the goods. Another thing, if you tell them, "I'll pay you Saturday, next week or in a few days, you're just wasting your breath. They don't care when your pay check comes in. Their policy is to wait until you have the money to turn loose their merchandise. You think that the home town merchant ought to do you a favor not by selling it to you on credit by having it in stock for you.

mode this plan landlords will see an opportunity to sell out and move to town and a lot of tenants will see in it what they think is a chance to buy a good, well-equipped farm from the Government and hold it a lifetime without paying for it. But those ideal tenants who are to be selected as buyers of these farms will see in this plan nothing new. Good tenants have never had any trouble finding farms they could buy on easy terms. The trouble has always been, as it is now, in finding ways to pay for them.

It seems rather strange that the farmers' friends in Congress would bring out a plan like this as a choice piece of farm legislation when it is so well known that trying to pay for farms bought on easy terms has caused hard-working, industrious farmers more trouble than almost any other one thing.

Taking the country as a whole, it may be true that we would be better off if every farmer owned his own farm, but it hardly seems right to encourage people to buy land on these so-called easy terms while farm profits, if any, are so small. Buying a farm on time and trying to pay for it out of farm profits is now as it has always been, a long, hard job that is, in entirely too many cases, given up before finished. It is a job, it may be found, that not many smart tenants will care to tackle so long as conditions remain as they are, and so long as the future of farming promises so little.

All tenant farmers prefer to be free to move to a better location. It may be equally true of the farm tenant. He moves because he likes to move, if he is a good tenant. If a bad tenant, he moves because his landlord moves him. It is precisely the same with a bad house tenant, a bad store tenant. No amount of Government nursing can make a successful storekeeper out of a bad businessman. Nor can any amount of lawmaking make a good farmer out of an indolent or an incompetent one.
