SHAFT IN HONOR OF TEXAS **VOLUNTEERS WHO FOUGHT** For Second Term INDIAN RAIDERS RECEIVED

On Highway Near City By CC; Battle Staged Here October 24, 1840

A granite monument commemorating heroism of a band of volunteers who in October, 1940, wrote colorful history for the then infant republic of Texas by destroying a Comanche Indian village on banks of the Colorado river a short distance south from where later was established this city, has been received by the chamber of commerce from the State Highway Commission

The few pioneers who in that early day had pushed into the wilds of Central and West Texas to establish homes were being attacked by the Indians. Their meagre homes were destroyed, their families ruthlessly murdered and their livestock driven away. One of the hostile savage bands had established camp on the

On October 24, 1840, 90 citizens under command of Colonel Henry Moore attacked the Indians, killing 128 of their number and capturing killed during the engagement and only two were wounded.



Sign-Up Campaign Will Be Ended On Saturday, May 15

Baskin Urges Attention To This Matter In Event Benefits Expected

The final date for acceptance of work sheets under the Agricultural Conservation Program has been set for May 15 by the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee, according to Geo. Slaughter, Chairman. The committee has approved an earlier closing date for many counties where the sign-up is well advanced. B. J. Baskin, county agent, is urging all farmers to sign one of the work sheets, whether or not it is planned to enter program now.

Indications are that approximately 240,000 work sheets will be signed. for the 1937 program. Of these, some 15,000 cover ranches with a combined acreage of 53,000,000 acres which will take part in the range conservation feature of the program.

The sign-up this year is progressng rapidly, and is three months ahead of the 1936 participation in the program. Slaughter pointed out that due to the advanced stage of the set-up, it would not be possible for the State committee to accept any work sheets after May 15.

The committee urged that farmers who contemplate filling work sheets do so at once in order to avoid any chance of being left out. Slaughter called attention to the fact that submitting a work sheet entitled a farmer to receive payment if he complies with the soil-building and soil-conserving practices indicated in the program, but does not obligate him to enter the program.

Rates of pay for Soil-Conserving are the same in 1937 as in 1936-5c per pound on the adjusted yield per acre-and \$1.00 per acre multiplied soil building practices being the amount one may earn for a soil building payment. Various soil building practices that producers may safely follow and rates of pay are:

Terracing, 40c per 100. feet; conouring, 25c per acre; legumes plowed under after 60 days growth, \$2.00 per acre (up to soil building allowance); sudan, seeded in rows or solid (provided all crop is left on land or turned under after 60 days growth), \$1.00 per acre; oats, wheat, barley (furned under as green manure crop), had died. 


