



12 of whom died in traffic accidents. In this respect Mitchell county again escaped with no serious accidents reported although a few meter accidents in which cars were demolished occurred on highways of this immediate territory.

State highway patrol and other public officials dealing with the traffic problem suggest that persistent appeal from practically every organized source that the motorist be careful is having good effect in keep. ing traffic accidents of a serious nature to a low figure in this section of West Texas. 

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

Epsom Salts Will Not Kill Hoppers Farmers Advised

County Agent Cites Recent Tests In Which Negative Results Were Obtained

Considerable publicity has been given recently to the use of epson salts instead of arsenicals with bran mash to destroy grasshoppers, Ben J. Baskin, county farm agent, stated Monday afternoon. Baskin stated that several inquiries had come to his office as to efficiency of the new formula.

Extensive tests in which epson salts was used have proven negative in destroying grasshoppers have been reported by government experts, the county agent explained. In a recent Federal Grasshopper Control with offices in Minneapolis, Minn., standard bait killed 98 to 100 per cent of the hoppers within 48 hours and the epsom salts mixture failed to produce any fatalities at all after a period of ten days.

Baskin offers the following for mula for killing the pests:

Twenty-five pounds course wheat bran, one pound white arsenic or Paris green, one ounce amyl acetate, 2 quarts molasses. Water sufficient to make mixture that will crumble when placed in small piles. Should be applied at rate of five pounds per acre. Broadcasting should be done early in morning before temperature reaches 90 degrees or late in the afternoon.
