Old Settlers Reunion, Rodeo, Fair, Livestock Show To Be Staged September 10 and 11, CC Announces

Combining all of the county's major attractions into one central exposition under a title yet to be determined, executives of the chamber of commerce announced Tuesday noon that September 10 and 11 had been designated as dates for staging the original united attraction.

Listed in the exposition calendar will be the annual Old Settlers' Reunion, rodeo, county fair and horse, mule and jack show. Recommendation that the attractions be combined was offered by a committee appointed a few days before and of which County Agent Ben J. Daskin was chairman

The rodeo and county fair attractions are to be held on property of the Colorado Independent school district, with Cantrill Field converted into a rodeo arena during the two days and nights and athletic building at high school housing the agricultural displays.

The exposition is scheduled to be formally opened on Friday morning, September 10, at 10 o'clock. A parade, tentatively planned to be one of the most colorful ever witnessed here, will follow through the streets at 4 that afternoon. 

Texas Is Returning To Prosperity, The Dallas News Says

Outlook Over The State Is Reflected In This Area; Prices Continue Good

That Texas is returning to stable prosperity, upon a plane like that registered in 1919, is suggested in editorial comment in the Dalkas Morning News. The flattering outlook pictured in the News is reflected on the farms of Mitchell county. The News says:

"As the season reaches the high noon of summer it is apparent even to casual observers that Texas is making the best crops in many years. Not only is the wheat crop the most profitable since 1919 but the corn erop promises considerably more than the Federal estimate, which could not foresee the eleventh- hour rains of last week that may add perhaps ten to fifteen million bushels to the 72,000,000 forecast. It begins to look like old times as to big crops, with this important distinction, that prices are generally above the prewar average level. Such a condition is rarely associated with bumper crops and is to be attributed to a combination of circumstances in which new deal policies play an important part. It would be folly to deny that the farmer is not being benefited by certain adjustments in production which were instituted by AAA and in a measure are being continued in the soil conservation program.

"No one would dare make a guess as to the outlook for Texas cotton, because of the delicacy of the market and its possible effect upon producers. That is why the Federal Government must wait to make its first forecast on Aug. 9, when the crep is sufficiently advanced to warfant an estimate. It is safe to say, however, that unless rains continue and insects do serious damage, Texas should produce cotton in acordance with the other crops which a soil flayed by three years of drought is now able to produce as result of more seasonal distribution of moisture. 



HUDSON BAY STORY

Generations ago, when the Canadian North Woods knew only the stealthy moccasined step of Indians and trappers, the Hudson Bay Company started trading their world famous blankets for furs. Because little English was spoken among the French trappers and Indian tribes, the "Point System" of buying and selling was devised. The "points" are black lines near the center of each blanket served a twofold purpose. It specified the size and weight of each blanket; it also indicated the number of beaver pelts each blanket would be worth. A 3point blanket brought three adult skins; a 31/2point blanket, three adult and one small beaver skin; a 4-point blanket was worth four skins.

Today-the same "Point System" indicates the comparative size, weight and worth of each blanket. Only the genuine Hudson Bay blankets are marked in this fashion.

Cotton Outlook Is Good Most Areas; Plains Crop Late

Insects Damaging Crop In Parts Of South Texas, Dallas News Reports

Unusually excellent cotton outlook continues over the upper two thirds of Texas, although if showery weather continues it may encourage insect damage, which at this writing is negligible except in South and Southeast Texas, the weekly summary of The Dallas News ended Friday states.

Most counties report the weather as just what the plant has needed. Moisture is sufficient for some time except in spots on the South Plains, where it is getting dry and where the crop is late. North and Central Texas report plants as of good size and growing satisfactorily with blooms becoming plentiful. The more than average shedding in some counties is attributed to rapid growth of plant since the rains and local showers of the past week. With hot, dry weather fruiting should be satisfactory.

South Texas reports insects as increasing with five counties suffering heavily from leafworm and others from weevils. Farmers are poisoning. Picking is general in the southernmost counties. Insects in the rest of Texas were not present in sufficient numbers to harm the crop up til now and the plants are setting part of a doing appreciable damage. tending summer school at Sul Ross in crop which looks as if it might escape

To the Citizens of Mitchell County

GREETINGS

On next Saturday, July 31st, it is proposed to vote on a \$30,000.00 bond issue to determine whether or not Mitchell County will build or acquire a general hospital. The purpose of this letter is to present to you some important facts pative to this issue.

The importance of living within easy reach of a hospital in case of need of hospital care in some grave emergency is now duly recognized. A general county hospital has certain advantages over private hospitals because in a county hospital we have what is known as open staff, which means any citizen may have the doctor of his choice treat him at the hospital and may have the privilege of calling any other doctors from anywhere for consultation and assistance, surgeons and other specialists. By so doing, the patient is saved the hazard and expense of the trip as well as delay in going to distant hospitalst. Furthermore, there is usually a saving of money of perhaps fifty per cent, besides the great advantage of having the patient at home among relatives and friends. A county general hospital owned by the people, maintained by the people, patronized and boosted by the people is the only solution to

WOULD THE PROPOSED HOSPITAL BE A CHARITY HOSPITAL AND/OR WILL IT INCREASE THE CHARITY WORK OF THE COUNTY? No, it is not to be classed as a charity hospital and is not so intended. A charity hospital is one maintained especially for patients unable to pay for necessary care and treatment, and is supported by charity organizations, gifts and endowments. This proposed county hospital will not be a charity hospital at all, and we firmly believe it will be self-supporting and will serve well the hospital needs of this territory. The county's indigent patients who really should he helped will be provided for here, perhaps in a ward, at a minimum expense to the county. There is no reason why a general hospital should increase the demand for charity work. Certainly it can in no way increase the necessity for the care of indigents. The number of indigents would be the same, no more, no less, whether or not a county hospital is maintained.

WHAT WOULD IT COST THE AVERAGE MAN? For example, we will take a farmer who owns 160 acres of land: The best farm lands in this county are assessed for tax purposes at \$10.00 per acre. This farm would then be rendered for \$1,600.00 and the farming equipment for this type of farm would be rendered for taxes at about \$400.00 or a total of \$2,000.00 for the total rendition. On the \$30,000.00 bond issue there would be due each year \$1,000.00 on principal and the interest at not more than four per cent, possibly less. At the end of the first year we would owe \$1,200.00 interest or a total of \$2,200.00. With a valuation of \$8,000,000.00 it would require a rate of 2 3-4 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property to raise the required amount to pay off the amount due. This would cost on the property set out above only 55c on the first year's bill and less thereafter, because we retire one of these bonds each year. Therefore, on the 30th year, instead of \$1,200.00 interest, we would only owe \$40.00 interest.

There may be a question in the mind of someone as to whether the hospital would be self-sustaining. It is reasonable to believe that it would because a c'tizen's committee from this county have interviewed every county hospital being operated in West Texas, and without exception they report that the county hospitals are self-sustaining and in several cases earning surplus money.

HOW WOULD IT BE OPERATED?. The laws of the State of Texas set out definitely the proceedure for the management of a county hospital. Briefly, it is this: When a county hospital has been acquired, the Commissioner's Court shall appoint a Board of Managers consisting of six citizens of the county who shall have charge of the hospital as a Board of Directors. They shall select a superintendent who will have actual management of the institution and the superintendent shall run the hospital under the direction of this Board. The Board shall receive no salary or other compensation for its services.

We, the undersigned citizens, believe that a general hospital for Mitchell County is necessary and should be established at this time. We urge that you earefully consider this matter and don't forget to vote Saturday.





> Production of No. 13 million was marked by no ceremonies at the factory, but M. E. Coyle, general manager of the division, issued a brief statement from his Detroit office officially announcing the event, which was also the occasion for an informal

> When the present management, headed by Mr. Coyle, took over the reins in October, 1933, the company had built 9,000,000 cars and trucks. The 10-millionth was produced Nov. 20, 1934, the 11-millionth Dec. 4. 1935, and the 12-millionth August 5, 1936. Records show that it took 12 years for the company to build its first million units, while the remaining 12 million have been produced in a period of only 14 years. Mr. Coyle has been a member of the Chevrolet organization throughout the production of all but 120,000 of the 13,000,-00 units built to date.



We turn this column this week to two of our distinguished readers to answer my article last week on Baptism.

"ABOUT BAPTISM"

The above title that appeared last week in The Record invites a reply, and we feel grateful for that privilege. We shall enumerate the questions and statements just as printed, and offer a brief reply to each. Kindly get your Bible and read the passages as suggested, then we will not have to take the space in the paper to write them

True to the form of those who oppose the truth of the Scriptures Mr. Whipkey does not offer one passage of scripture to substantiate his statements or exposition. He only offers objections and leaves doubts in the peoples' minds.

1. "If baptism is for the remission of sins, what was Christ baptized for?" Jesus answered it, Matt. 3:15. Righteousness is the commandments of God, Psa. 119:172, therefore Jesus kept the command of God. Read Acts 10:48. The suggestion of the question is that since Jesus has no sin he was not baptized for that purpose: Yes, but who else can say that? The rest of the Jews were baptized for remission of sins. Read Mark 1:4.

2. "If baptism is for the remission of sins, what is the blood of Christ for?" The same words that say the blood of Christ is "For the remission of sins," Matt. 26:28, is used to say that repentance and baptism is for the same purpose in Acts 2:38. Christ died to make remission of sins possible, and we reach his death, where his blood was shed, in baptism, Rom. 6:4.

3. "We know that baptism does not wash away sins, for we have known some who were meaner after baptism." Acts 22:16 says baptism does wash them away, so who will you believe, Mr. Whipkey or Paul! However, this assertion proves nothing. I also have heard people given "an experience of grace" and voted o.k. then live so mean a life that church had to revote and say they were not all right.

4. "Should a son obey his parents because he is their child, or in order to become a child?" If a man is a son, he does not have to do anything to "become" a son; he is already that. The point is, "How do we become a son?" We are children of God by faith in Christ, Gal. 3:26, and the only way we are told to get into Christ is to be baptized into him. Rom. 6:3; Gak 3:27.

5. "Baptism is a work, and if baptism saves, then are we saved by works, or by grace?" We are not saved by works of which we lawyers (educated men) for ye have taken away the key of knowlcan boast, Eph. 2: 8, 9, but works of justification do enter into our salvation. Jas. 2:24, Rev. 20:12. James does say emphatically we are not justified by faith only

6. "It is true that to Him gave all the prophets witness, that through His name whosoever believeth in Him shall receive remission of sin?" Acts 10:43 Yes, but if you read all of the incident you 10:48.

7. "If baptism is essential to salvation, then the preacher is as given. However, God does not save people apart from the preaching tized to fulfill all righteousness Matt. 3:11-15. He was our example of the Gospel, 1 Cor. 1:21, John 6:44, 45, and the ministry of reconciliation is committed to gospel preachers, 2 Cor. 5. 18

"If baptism is for the remission of sins, the dying thief was lost, Christ to the contrary notwithstanding." Another assertion Matt, 3:5, 6, or by one of the disciples of Christ, John 4:1, 2?

9. "If baptism is for the remission of sins, then is it true that Christ never saved anyone directly, as he never baptized anyone?" Every person that is saved is saved by Christ, but the point is that Christ has not promised to save anyone until he believes and is baptized. Mark 16:16.

10. "If baptism is necessary would not Christ have said. He that is not baptized shall not be saved?" Read Mark 16:16. It was not be baptized, saying, "Can any man forbid water?" 1 John 5:8 says necessary. He said what to do in order to be saved believe and be and there are three that bear witness in earth. He did not. Read all of that case law and grace. Luke 16:16 says the law and the prophets was unto of conversion. He did not tell the jailer that faith alone would do the coming of John. Since that time the kingdom of God is preached believers in New Testament times.

13. "If baptism is for the remission of sins, and all should be baptized who believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, would not the devils be saved if they were baptized?" That is beside the point unless someone considers himself a devil. The Baptist doctrine has them saved anyway, because James says they believe. James 2:19.

14. "Since the Roman Catholic church originated the doctrine of baptismal remission, should not those who hold to the dectrine go to that church?" The Catholics believe that Jesus is the Son of God, Mr. Whipkey does too, should he go to that church? The church of Christ does not teach the remission of sins by baptism alone, no more than by faith alone. However, that baptism is one thing that contributes to the salvation was taught by Peter centuries before there was any Pope in Rome. Acts 2:38.

15. "If only the blood of Christ cleanses us from sin, will not those be lost who trust in blood and water?" There is not a passage in the Bible that says "only" the blood of Christ cleanses us from sin. Try to harmonize John 3:5 with the faith only doctrine!

16. "Would it not be better to baptize a man to cure his headache than to baptize him to insure his salvation? Would it not be very sinful to do either?" A very childish question! The Bible teaches that baptism washes away our sins, Acts 22:16, then if we are faithful unto death. Rev. 2:10, we have an "insured salvation."

Closing remark: "Remember that baptism is only a church ordinance and has nothing to do with salvation." I want to call on-Mr. Whipkey to produce one passage that says baptism is a "church ordinance.

We are happy to see Mr. Whipkey attempt to defend his doctrine, because it has been significant in the last few years that he could get none of his preachers to do so. I admire his courage. JNO. A. THOMPSON.
