Livestock and Farm Projects Being Carried On By FFA Boys on Larger Scale This Year

Livestock and farm projects are being carried on by Colorado High school FFA boys on a larger scale this year than ever before, according to F. C. Shullinburg, head of the Colorado High school vocational agriculture department. All of Shullinburg's FFA student boys chosen and been in their projects for the year. Twenty-seven boys are feeding 50 Hereford calves, and 21 boys are feeding 21 breeding gilts. Fifteen of the gilts are registered, and the others are subject to registry. Twenty-four boys are feeding 37 barrows. Seven boys have elected to feed 23 weaner lambs. This is the first time that lamb feeding has ever been included among livestock projects for Colorado High school boys.

If anything about tax-paying is worrying Goss right now it might be the thought that somebody may beat him to Tax Receipts No. 1 next year. That's something which hasn't happened in the past 15 years or so, however, and Goss doesn't intend for it to happen as long as he can get about. Tax collectors of Colorado and Mitchell county know without looking who'll always be waiting outside their door on the morning when taxes—state, county, city, and school—become payable. It's Tom Goss. He prizes his collection of Tax Receipts No. 1. And the taxes which Goss pays are far from negligible. He has never had less than two farms, more often three, to pay taxes on, in addition to seven rent houses and his home in Colorado. There are other things Goss is proud of in addition to his collection of Tax Receipts No. 1, but they're all in line with his readiness to pay taxes. He expresses his own creed thus: "I've never been afraid to do any kind of work, from grubbing land and saving cord wood up and down. I've never borrowed a cent of money from any bank except one time when I put up Liberty Loan bonds as collateral. I've never bought a nickel's worth of anything on credit. And I'm a Roosevelt Democrat, through and through." A resident of Mitchell county for 25 years, Mr. Goss was born in Lawrence county, Missouri. He was a small child when his family came to Texas in 1880. They lived first in Denison, then in Collin county, and later in Cook county. They moved to Cooke county in 1891. In 1892 Goss took up 80 acres of land on the Colorado river in Cooke county. He had a small herd of cattle bought one or two at a time with

Goss was elected commissioner of Precinct One in 1924, but resigned shortly to take a job with the state highway department as highway foreman for Coke and Mitchell counties, a job which he filled 3½ years. Football Player Is
Victim Of Injuries
Sustained Nov. 19

Carl Preston Lewis Of Roby
Died Thanksgiving Day;
Burial At Sweetwater

Carl Preston Lewis, 16, of the Roby high school football team died in a Sweetwater hospital Thanksgiving Day as the indirect result of injuries received in a game the Friday before with Colorado Wolves at Cantrill Field. Lewis developed pneumonia after having been taken to the hospital for treatment of a broken leg.

Funeral for the youth was conducted from the Sweetwater Lamar Baptist church Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. Ollie McDaniel, pastor of the Brushy community Baptist church, in charge. Burial was in the Sweetwater cemetery.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. N. P. Lewis, five sisters and two brothers survive. The sisters are Mrs. Arnold McRoy, Blackwell; Marie Lewis, Big Spring; Mrs. Bill McCrory, Blackwell; Ella Mae and Juanita Lewis of near Sweetwater. The brothers are Roy Franklin and J. B. Lewis. The family resides in Brushy community north of Sweetwater.

Teammates of the boy were honorary pallbearers at the funeral.

T. Y. Pool, Only Confederate Veteran
In County, Has Had Interesting Life

An interesting life history lies within the 90 years of living which T. Y. Pool, Mitchell county's only Confederate veteran, celebrated at his home here last week. The anniversary was marked by a gathering of children, relatives and friends at the Pool home.

Mr. Pool and his wife, who is 87, passed their sixty-ninth wedding anniversary October 18.

It wasn't until a few months ago that Mr. Pool was officially listed among Mitchell county's Civil War veterans, although he has lived in Mitchell county since 1897. This was due to the fact that he didn't apply for his government pension until last spring.

"I was managing to get along without it, and I didn't think it was right to draw government money as long as I could make my own living." That's the way Mr. Pool explains his long delay in applying for his pension. His war record was so clear that he received his first pension payment within two weeks of his application.

Mr. Pool was born in Troupe county, Georgia, on November 23, 1847, the oldest son and the second oldest child in a family of six children.

During his childhood his family moved successively to Herd county, Ga., Tallapoosa county, Ala., Calhoun county, Ala., and St. Clare county, Ala. The Civil war broke out when the Pool family was living in St. Clare county, and when T. Y. Pool was 14 years old.

Mr. Pool's father, C. S. Pool, enlisted in the Confederate army soon after the war began, leaving his son as head of the Pool home. Times were very hard, though the Yankees never came to the Pool home until the war was over. Salt was precious, costing around a dollar per pound when it could be secured at all. A common way of securing salt was to dig up the earth in the smokehouse and boil it down for the salt which had dripped from curing meat. Often the family worked all day for a half teacupful of the precious seasoning.

Corn and wheat were parched to make coffee, but the best coffee was made from crumbled biscuit bread parched and then pulverized in a bag.

Hop vines were used for soda and seasoning.

In 1863, when he was 16, T. Y. Pool went to war himself, joining in Capt. Steward's cavalry. He had to furnish his own horse. He fought in three sizable battles, though none of them were major battles of the war. He especially remembers one battle fought north of Selma, Alabama. The Yankees surrounded his company, and as they closed in Pool and others broke ranks and fled as best they could. Pool was so thirsty that he bent from his horse as they splashed across a creek and dipped his hat full of water.

The last battle in which Mr. Pool took part was at Selma, Alabama, in April after Lee had already surrendered at Appomattox. He was paroled from Talladega and went home to a poverty-stricken home and a father whose spirit had been broken by war and illness.

During the war the Pool children had kept all the stock hidden out in the thickets to keep possible Yankee visitors from spotting them. When the war was over they thought it safe to take the animals from hiding. They had just led them from their thicket hiding places to the watering trough when Yankee soldiers came by and took the best animals.

The Pools moved to Clay county after the war, and it was there that Mr. Pool met Nancy Miller, who had been born in Clay county on Jan. 25, 1850, and who had lived there all her life. They were married on October 18, 1868, eloping on horseback to the home of the justice of the peace because of her family's objections.

They lived on in Clay county for a number of years. Mr. Pool taught school and farmed. In the early eighties his brother came back from Texas with stories of the fertile land and great opportunities of the state. Mr. Pool's ear was caught by accounts of railroad land that was being sold cheap. In 1884 he loaded his wife and five children on an "immigrant" train and started for Texas.

It was an awful trip, his children recall today. The train was jammed with people, filled with smoke. Women fainted and children cried. Mrs. Pool and her oldest daughter were among the ones who fainted.

The family landed at Baird, and bought railroad land 16 miles south of Baird in Callahan county. Two more children were born while they lived there. And the great drought of 1887-1889 struck to make farming a nightmare. Mr. Pool, unable to eke a living from his farm, stood an examination to renew his teaching certificate and went back to teaching. Between times he cut and sold cedar posts.

The move to Mitchell county was made in 1897. The Pools always lived in the northwestern and western part of the county before moving to Colorado two years ago. Mr. Pool is a deacon in the Westbrook Baptist church.

Only four of the seven children born to Mr. and Mrs. Pool are living now. They are Mrs. Sam Smartt of Colorado, Mrs. Frank Nessmith of White Swan, Washington, Mrs. Floyd Murphy of Fort Worth, and Mrs. J. W. Webb of near Colorado. Mr. Pool has two sisters, Mrs. F. T. Scott of San Angelo and Mrs. B. F. Smith of Weatherford.

Ford V-Type Cars For 1938 Displayed In Colorado By Wilkes Motor Company

Ford V-Type 8-cylinder cars for 1938 went on display Tuesday at the Wilkes Motor Company and in Ford dealer show rooms throughout the United States. They are offered this year as two distinct lines, differing in appearance and price. Both are in the lowest price field.

The two lines of cars have the

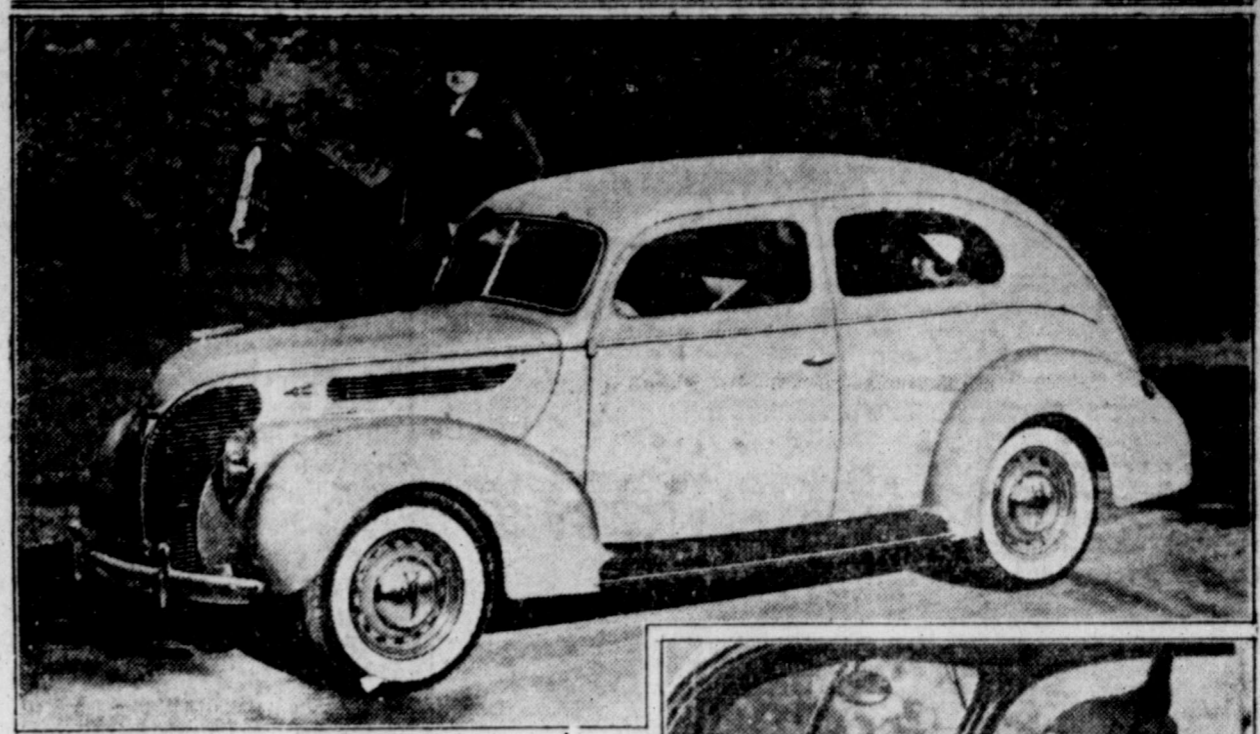
Interiors of the two cars are roomy and attractive, styled in keeping with the exteriors. The de luxe sedan interiors are larger.

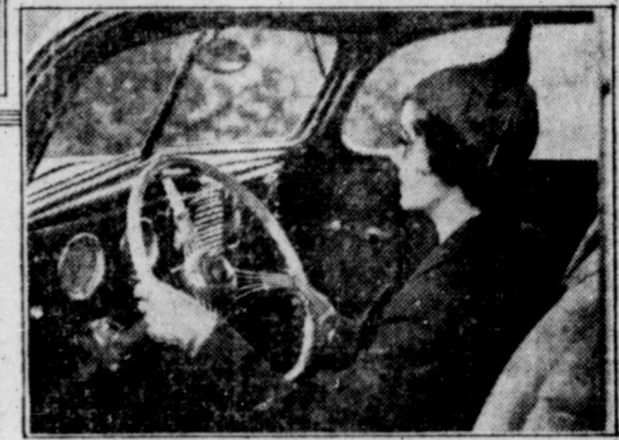
