





THE SALAD ON A CLOUD

It's the season to splurge on saiads. Plentiful summer fruits become sparkling jewels when combined in this spectacular molded salad. It's as good to eat as it is handsome to look at and easy to make too. A favorite of the busy hostess, it can be made a day or two ahead and unmolded on crisp greens right

Here are a few tips to guarantee success with the salad:
To assure ease in unmolding the salad it's a good idea to oil the mold lightly with salad oil. Although this towering shape is most impressive, any 2 quart container can be used — a ring mold, loaf pan, or round mixing bowl.

To speed up the preparation time, set the bowl containing the gelatin and fruit juice mixture in ice water and stir occasionally until the syrupy consistency is reached.

BUFFALO HUNTERS Haley lists the next social inluence of importance, chronologically, as by the buffalo hunters The period was short, as the great slaughter began in the Panhandle in 1874 and was practically done by the close of 1878. A story told by Haley is of a woman who heard talk about buffalo bones selling for \$20 a ton. She said: ". . . You were saying there is not a stick of wood upon the plains for a hundred miles at a stretch. What do they burn?"

She was told that they burned buffalo chips. "Oh," she naively replied, and that's what makes the bones so high!'


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
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
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


