Taxes Being Paid Much More Rapidly This Year Than Last

County-State Collections Nearly Three Times As Great As In 1938, Due **To Reduction**

current taxes at much more rapid of commerce. rate this year than last, according to figures obtained from a number of \$100 shares, which will be negotiable tax collecting offices.

Collections of state, county, and rural school 1939 taxes have shown. the greatest increase, the total to November 1 being nearly three times that for the same date in 1938. According to figures obtained at the office of Bruce Hart, county tax assessor-collector, the total on November 1 was \$47,562.56, as compared with only \$16,167.21 for the 1938 roll at the same time.

Hart credits the jump to the 3% reduction offered on current state taxes paid prior to Nov. 1. The reduction is 2% this month, and will be 1% during December. Hart's office collects all state and county taxes and also school taxes for all districts except the independent districts of Colorado City and Loraine. Westbrook and latan school taxes are not included in the figures quoted, however.

Closing their home football schedule, the Colorado City Wolves will play the Roby Lions on Cantrill field at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon.

The Wolves are now tied with Snyder in second place in district 6-A. Snyder's one defeat at the hands of Roscoe last week being equal to the undefeated Wolves' two conference ties of the season with Roscoe and Loraine. Roscoe has a half-game margin, having the tie with the Wolves to mar its record. Final game of the season for the Wolves will come when they play Snyder's Tigers at Snyder Thanksgiving, Nov. 30.

Approval Given Soil **Conservation** District For Mitchell County

Approval of a soil conservation district including all of Mitchell county and the watersheds of creeks crossing the county has been announced by the Texas Soil Conservation board at Temple

This approval is tentative, however, pending the outcome of an election which must be held for andowners in the affected area. The election may be held up for some time due to a recent ruling by the attorney general that soil conservation elections must foll

ahead of 1938, according to Ford Merritt, city secretary and tax collector. Collections on the 1939 roll on November 1 amounted to \$3,298.74. whereas the 1938 collections at the same time last year were \$2.711.36.

Payment of the first half of city taxes may be made any time before January 31 in order to wait until June 30 for payment of the second half without penalty.

J. Lee Jones, Sr., tax collector for the Colorado City district, reports a total of \$5,257.11 paid on 1939 taxes by November 1, as compared with \$3,656.41 paid on 1938 taxes on the same date.

Armistice Day! The day of all days, the world over! It had inception at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of the year A. D. 1918 in France.

Nearly two million American boys were in France on that day engaged with their allies in the most gigantic struggle in the history of the human race to beat back the Cerman and his allies which had combined to overthrow the nations of the world and place the heel of a heartless tyrant upon their neeks.
