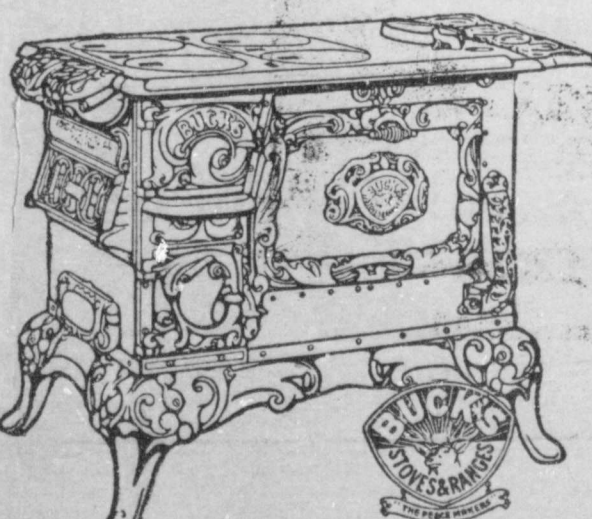

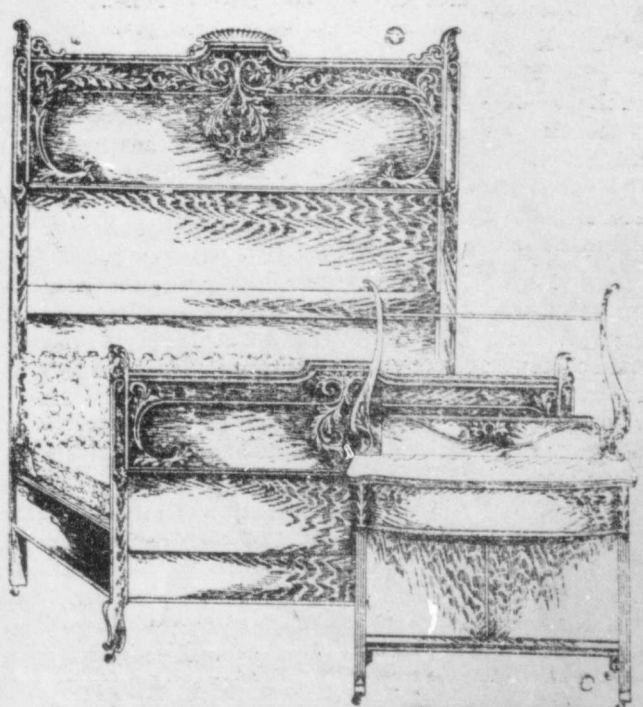

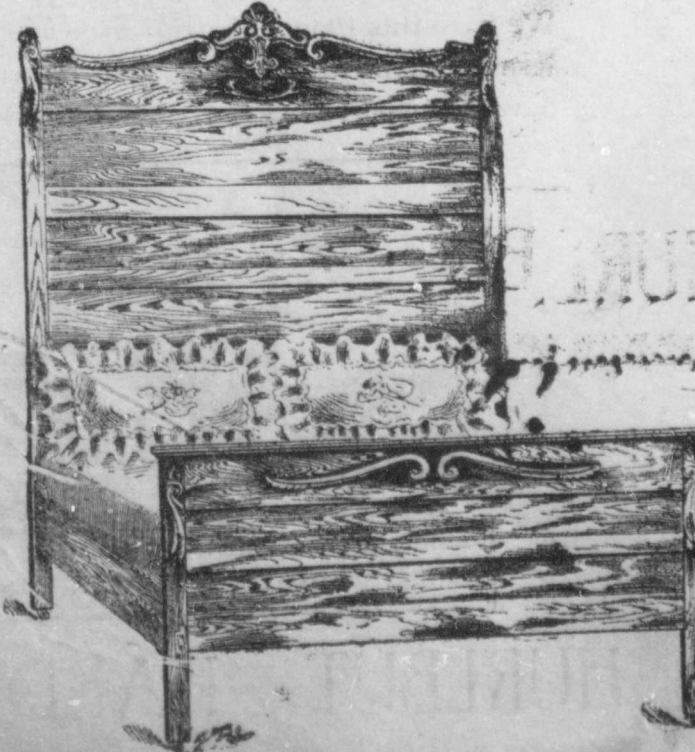

These drummers are generally the most expert salesman to be found and they simply talk the people into buying. The safe way is to always buy from home merchants.

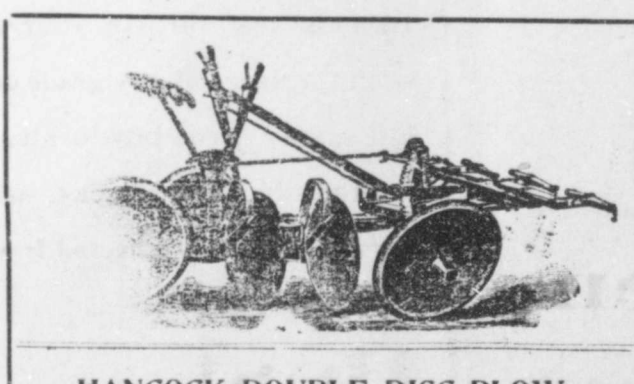
BAIRD-RENFRO.

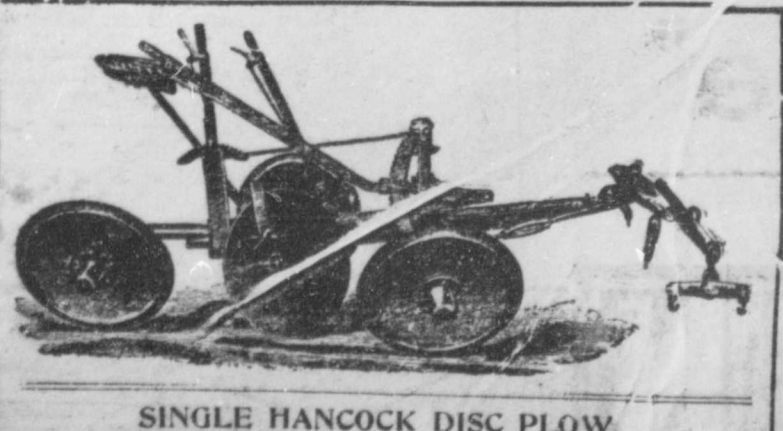

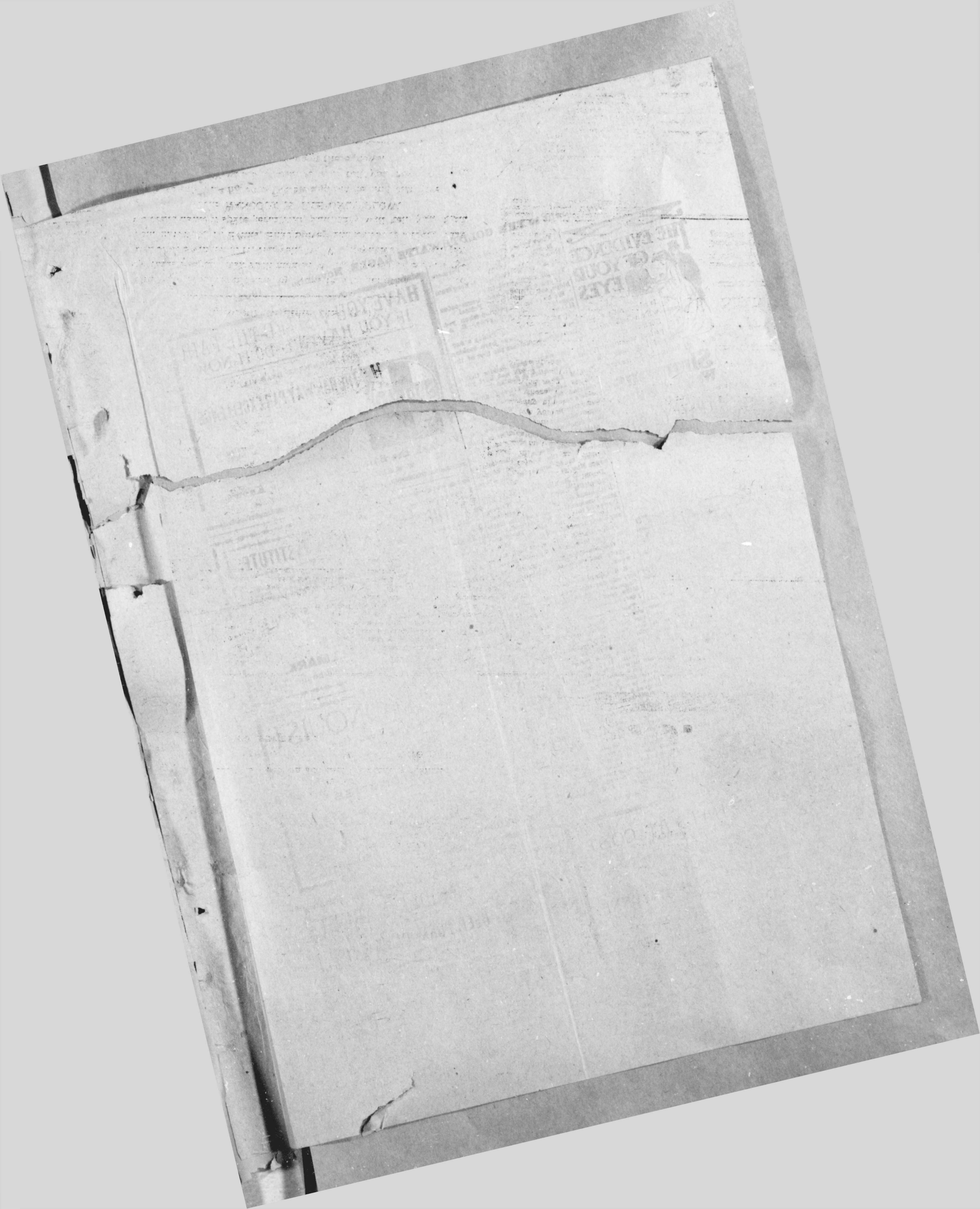

ELECTION RESULTS.

A SWEEPING REPUBLICAN VICTORY. EVERYBODY SURPRISED.

Even President Roosevelt and Chairman Cortelyou were surprised at the immense majority given the Republican national ticket—a majority larger than ever known in the history of the two great parties. Even the "Solid South" contributed to the victory by Missouri giving her electoral votes to the Republican party. The Democrats were not in reality expecting success, but such an overwhelming defeat was not anticipated. Even Texas lost a congressman to the party in power, the El Paso district having elected Mr. Sherpe, Republican, over Pat Dwyer, Democrat.

Texas Democrats elected the state officers, and the party's nominees were all elected in this county and the various districts formed in part by this county.

The constitutional amendments were adopted by big majorities.

The vote in this county was unreasonably small, only about 35 per cent of the voters participating in the election. No local contest was the cause of the lack of interest.

VISIT TO THE FAIR.

WEBSTER, TEX., NOV. 2.

Editor Eagle:

I have just returned from St. Louis, where I, in company with a lady friend, spent two weeks attending the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, and am so enthusiastic over the trip that I must tell my friends of some of the wonders I saw while there. But, in the beginning I want to say that this Fair is so colossal that it is beyond my power to give a complete description. No person can, by reading the best description that can possibly be written, or listening to the most graphic oral description that can be given of this wonderful aggregation, get any adequate conception of it. Before going, I had heard descriptions from people who had been there, and had read a great deal about it, and then when I saw for myself, it was far beyond my expectations.

The buildings alone which comprise the main features and decorative structures of the Exposition are worth coming from any part of America or the old world to see. The twelve main exhibit palaces are of varied styles of architecture, and the exhibits which they contain are not only vast in extent and variety, but they are unusually beautiful and attractive from every standpoint.

In addition to these twelve great exhibit palaces, the forty-four states and territories of the Union have erected their own separate homes within the Exposition grounds. Besides all these buildings there are exhibit palaces which have been erected by foreign nations. There is a tract of forty-seven acres within the grounds devoted entirely to exhibits of men and materials from the Philippine Islands. It contains a vast number of exhibit buildings, many being of Philippine style and materials. Here we see the different classes of these little people as they live in their native homes.

In another reservation of fifteen acres is the Boer War exhibit, which is like a bit of South Africa. I consider this one of the leading features of the fair. The men and horses are so excellently trained that one would think it a real battle instead of a farce. Cannons and guns are brought into active play and after the battle the field is covered with dead soldiers and horses, which make one shudder and hope we would never have to see a real battle.

One of the most beautiful features of the fair is the Cascade building. The hills which have been so admirably utilized, and the lagoons make a glorious picture, and at night when the electric lights are gradually turned on, changing in color from green to red, there is not a grander sight to be seen anywhere. In fact the illumination of the whole grounds at night, when over two million lights shine forth, is a sight worth seeing. The building and grounds throughout are decorated in the most lavish manner with groups of statuary, with shrubbery and trees. By day it is as if one had come into some new world where everything is in harmony and beauty. By night when the electric lamps are lighted and reflected along lagoons, and the bands playing, it is a dream of fairyland.

Jerusalem, the Holy City, is reproduced at the exposition. A lofty stone wall encloses an area of eleven acres. Visitors are conducted through the city by a guide who points out the different places of interest. We saw a representation of the manger in which Christ was born, and also Christ's Tomb. On every hand are booths presided over by gaily costumed orientals, and filled with eastern wares. Drowsy gamblers that lie in the street, waiting to be ridden, add the final oriental touch. Of course we took a camel ride and enjoyed very much riding a camel through the streets of Jerusalem.

The pike is the amusing feature with everybody who goes to the fair. It is the same as at

other midways, an aggregation of remarkable side shows, extending on either side of a broad highway for a mile, and offering a variety of amusements to suit every taste. It is a thing apart from the exposition, and yet every visitor to the exposition is admitted free to the entire avenue of the pike and it depends upon his own inclination whether he will patronize any of these shows or not.

The Ferris wheel is another feature of amusement and attracts large crowds day after day. This is a massive piece of machinery, the wheel being 285 feet in diameter and carries 38 coaches. We took a ride and enjoyed it very much as we could get a lovely view of the whole fair grounds.

I have said nothing of all the exhibits contained in the different buildings, but would have to go into details to tell the least of any of them, so will only say that they are all grand, and most especially the government and military buildings. A person can spend oceans of time profitably by going through any of these exhibit palaces. The foreign buildings are also very interesting, as well as instructive.

We spent two Saturdays in St. Louis. We attended church each Sunday, and visited some of the beautiful parks of the city.
