Mrs. Lon Horton is slowly regaining strength.

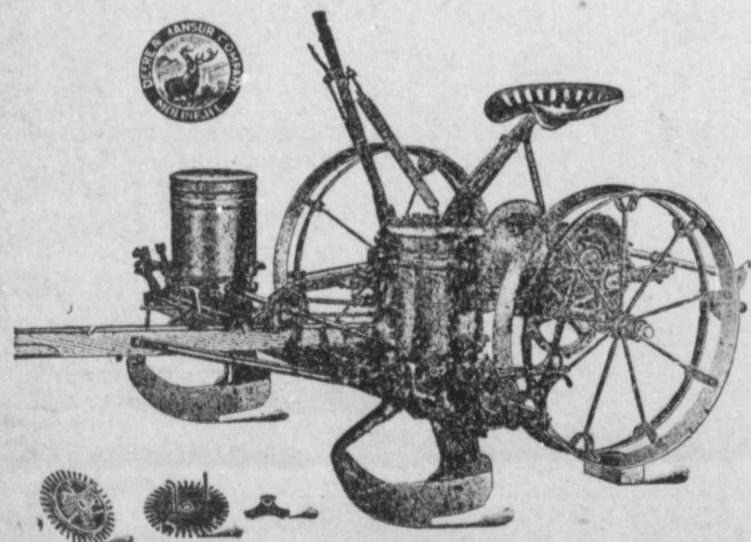

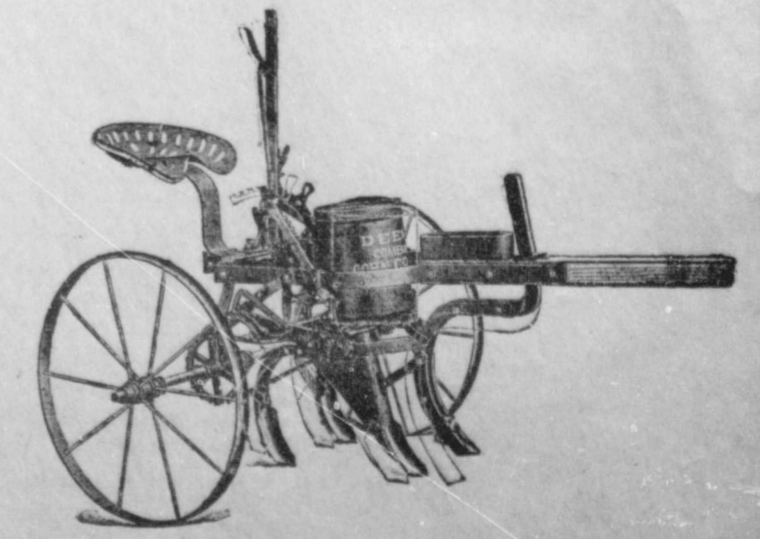
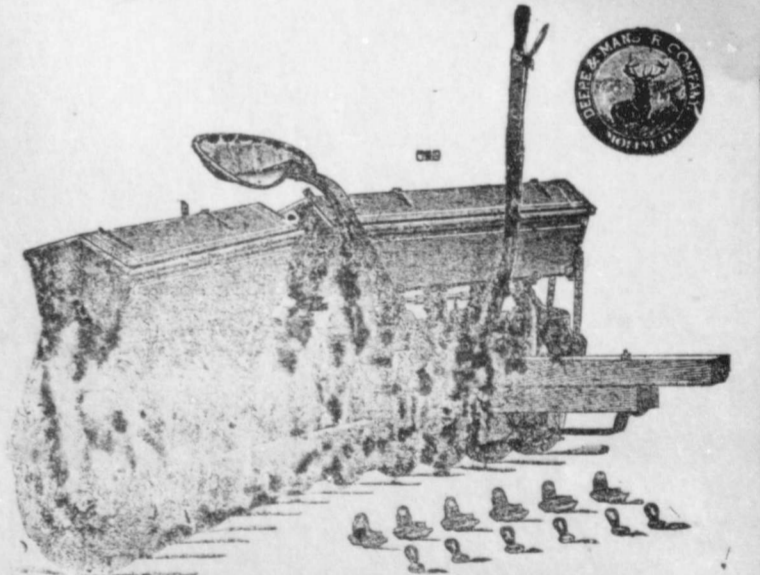
