
A trade has been concluded whereby Lucas Bros. of Dallas

To raise wheat on a large scale, the farmer has to work on it about five months in the year. His pasturage running from the middle of November to the first of March, gives him fat horses and enables him to keep from fifty to one hundred head of (short horn) cattle. His immense "straw pile" gives him plenty of "roughness" and enables him to carry his stock all the year round on plenty of feed. After he cuts and thrashes his grain, which should be not later than the 15th of July, his wheat stubble affords splendid pasturage until he has again turned it for the next crop. It is certainly safe to try it.—Rising Star Record.






General Description

The No. 61 Deere Riding Cotton and Corn Planter is a machine that will sweep the top of the bed, plant and cover either in bedded land or surface planting and at the same time allow the operator to ride. The No. 61 is automatically thrown in and out of gear by the lowering or raising of the machine. With the exception of the tongue, the machine is built entirely of steel. The adjustable sweep standard is built so that any sweep or corn shovel now on the market can be attached. It has a large seed hopper and a small opening is left at the top of the seed spout, enabling the operator to see exactly what work is being done. The covering shovel standards are all equipped with slip joint bolts, avoiding breakage upon striking any obstruction. The equipment includes a strong malleable clevis and special heel bolt and washer on sweep shank. The machine is simple in its construction, is strongly built, and is devoid of all complicated mechanism, making first-class work possible for anyone, without previous experience with farm tools. With ordinary care the tool should last a lifetime.

LETTER TO JOE TAFF.

Dear Sir: A big mill owner, Spartansburg, S. C., wanted 5,000 gallons of paint and bought by price; paid 5 cents less than ours; got a "lead and zinc" paint; but the lead was sulphate of lead, not carbonate. Sulphate costs about half; and covers about half.

That paint was adulterated about six times as much as the 5 cents paid for. He "saved" 5 cents, and it cost him 30.

Oh no; it cost him more than that; we forgot the labor. Can't work it out exactly; don't know how long it'll wear.

Short measure besides; that alone was twice as much as his "saying" 5 cents.

It was thin, too; some loss there; don't know how much.

There was too much dryer in it. The maker made something on that; he didn't.

Taking it altogether, he didn't make much by that 5 cents.

Mr. Armour of the Fort Worth packing house says that more than one-half of the hogs slaughtered in Fort Worth are shipped there from outside the state, and that Texas farmers would make more money raising corn and

hogs than in raising cotton. This is a reminder that the late John R. Hoxie, when engaged in the packing business at Fort Worth, encountered the same difficulty

of which Mr. Armour speaks, and attempted to remove it by importing brood sows and selling them to Texas farmers on credit

to be paid for with hog shipments to his packing house. The question of feed for the hogs was one

that he was never able to solve to the satisfaction of the farmers, and he was finally compelled to

admit the defeat of his plans. It is apparent, however, that in a land as fertile as Texas hogs may

be raised at a profit, and it would be to the advantage of the packing houses at Fort Worth and Dallas, as well as the farmers of the adjacent territory to co-operate

in the investigation of the best methods to increase and make profitable the production of hogs in this state. A continuous and stable revenue may thus

be added to the farm owners, and an outlet afforded to energy and capital that are now devoted to the over-production of cotton.—





FROM BROTHER LINN.

Editor Eagle:

We have now been here two months and so swiftly does time fly that it seems but a few days. My goods and horse came through all right with not more than a dollars damage to everything.

We have a most kind and appreciative people, good comfortable house and a beautiful brick church. Gold is in an especially well drained locality, and is said to be very beautiful.

We have just had our first real killing frost, and in many places the grass is still green, and in the lot next to ours is a fine garden of some six or eight different kinds of vegetables.

I have stood on the spot where Fannie's men were taken here and have taken prison from the men who were marched off Sunday morning to be shot. Sunday morning to be shot. Sunday morning to be shot.

Infamously shot down. An iron pillar marks the place of capture and an old rock building, part of which is used by the Mexicans for a church, still stands where the old fort was. Our house stands in the cyclone strip and on this block ten people were killed. Two whole families, with the exception of one little boy, were wiped out of existence. It is said to have been the most destructive storm of its size ever known. The Baptist church, just south of us, was so completely demolished that nothing recognizable was ever found not even any pieces of the old glass windows. About one hundred and fifty were killed outright or died as a result of the storm, one-third of whom were negroes. All those who were killed outside of houses were burned and blackened, sometimes beyond recognition, supposed to have been by electricity. There are little signs of the storm now further than the great amount of kindling wood scattered everywhere.

We are both in good health and nappy, and send love to all our friends, of whom we feel we have a goodly number. If you find any enemies of mine tell them to write to me and we will try to make it right.

The Eagle comes regularly and is greatly appreciated, and I can truthfully say it is the best county paper I have seen in a town the size of Goldthwaite. Adios.
