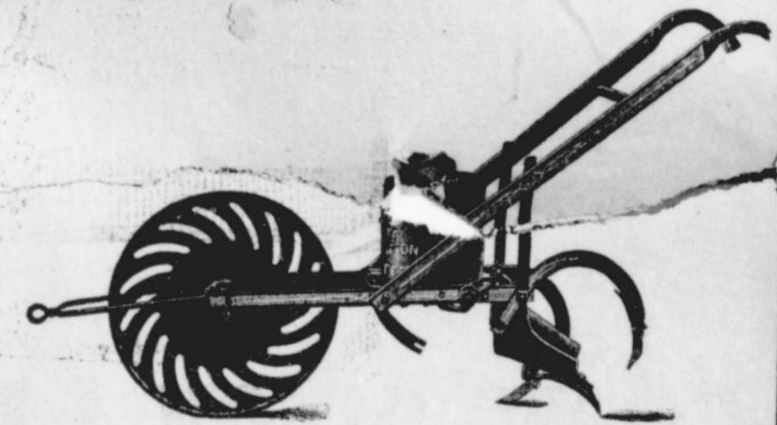

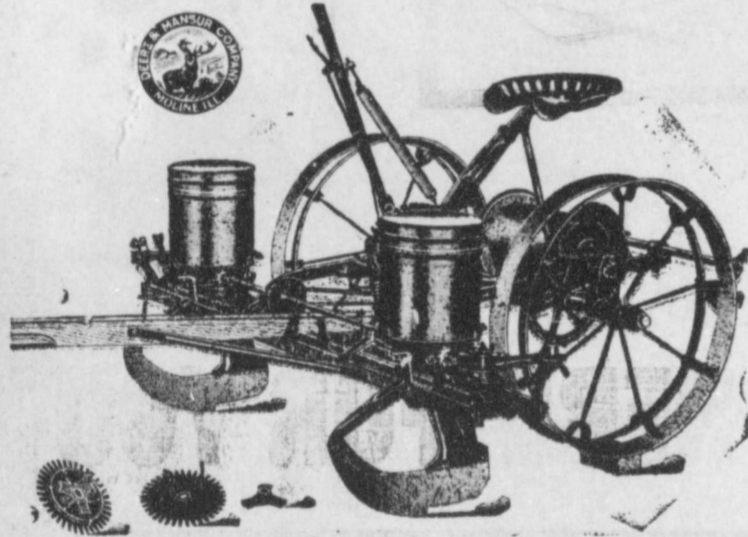
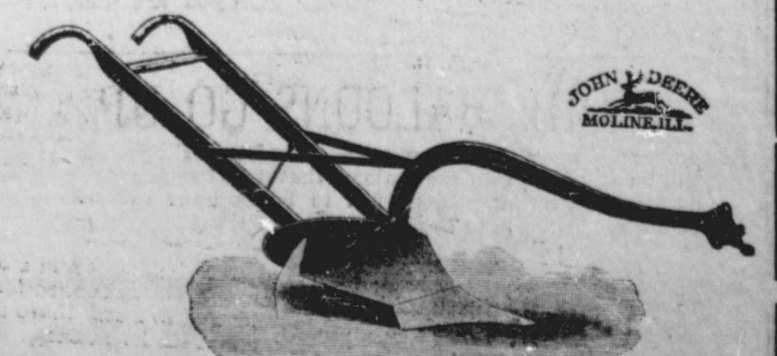
### General Description

The No. 61 Deere Riding Cotton and Corn Planter is a machine that will sweep the top of the bed, plant and cover either in bedded land or surface planting and at the same time allow the operator to ride. The No. 61 is automatically thrown in and out of gear by the lowering or raising of the machine. With the exception of the tongue, the machine is built entirely of steel. The adjustable sweep standard is built so that any sweep or corn shovel now on the market can be attached. It has a large seed hopper and a small opening is left at the top of the seed spout, enabling the operator to see exactly what work is being done. The covering shovel standards are all equipped with slip joint bolts, avoiding breakage upon striking any obstruction. The equipment includes a strong malleable clevis and special heel bolt and washer on sweep shank. The machine is simple in its construction, is strongly built, and is devoid of all complicated mechanism, making first-class work possible for anyone, without previous experience with farm tools. With ordinary care the tool should last a lifetime.



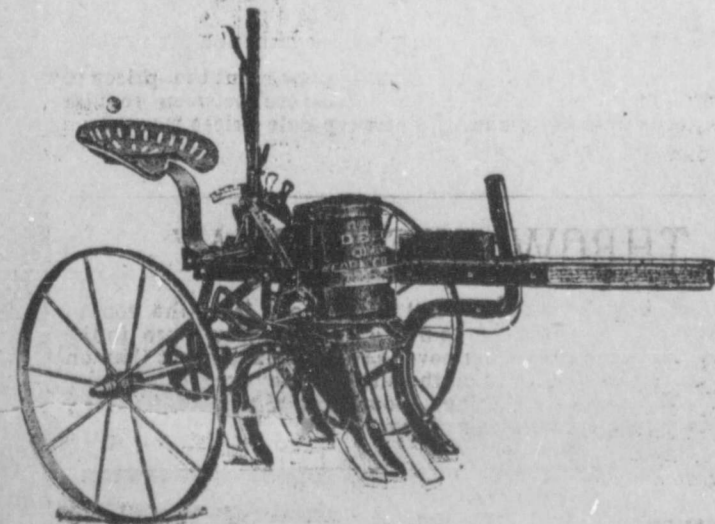

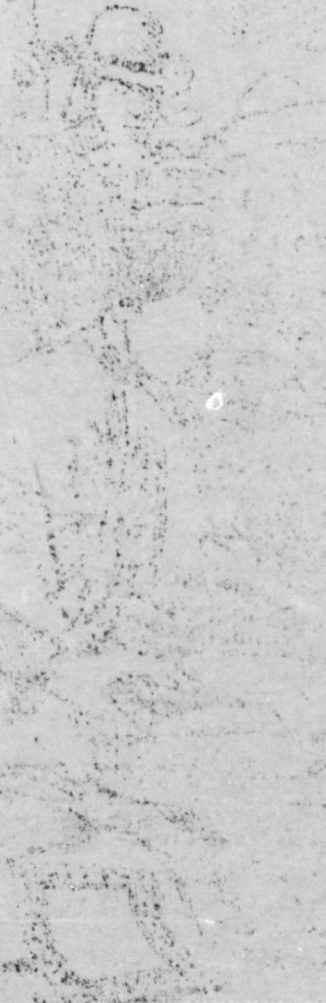

The Pecan Valley News reports several cases of smallpox in Brownwood.

Two prisoners escaped from the Coleman jail last Saturday, but they were soon recaptured.

One representative who is violently opposed to nepotism has introduced a bill to refuse pay for services rendered in state offices by relatives of the employing officers.

The bill authorizing the payment of \$65,000 by the state for the purchase of the grounds surrounding the Alamo in San Antonio has been adopted by both branches of the legislature and now only wants the signature of Governor Lanham to become effective.

Hon. C. A. Culberson has been re-elected to the United States senate by the Texas legislature. The election was held Wednesday in the house of representatives in Austin.

A great many ginners announce that hereafter they will not make the reports to the government agents as to the number of bales of cotton they have ginned, as they believed such reports operate to reduce the price of cotton.

The labor troubles in Russia have reached a point amounting to insurrection against the government. Thousands of factory hands, railroad workers, printers and other laborers have joined in the strike for shorter work hours, the legal working day in Russia being eleven hours. Last Sunday 300,000 or more people of the working class assembled in St. Petersburg and marched to the emperor's palace to request a hearing from the Czar, but so far from accomplishing good for themselves it had the effect of starting a genuine revolt against the government. The military guards around the palace, which had been made very strong, was ordered to disperse the crowd and the order was obeyed, but not without the shedding of much innocent blood. The soldiers fired directly into the crowds and reports say that many were killed outright and thousands were wounded. The Czar was in a state of terror and would not see the representatives of the people and his advisors were given a free hand to deal with the strikers. The outcome is watched with interest by the nations of the world and the belief is indulged that the time is near at hand when Russia will cease to be an absolute monarchy and the laboring people will have an opportunity to become something more than slaves to the aristocracy.

In the cotton growers' convention at New Orleans held the first of this week, ex-Lieutenant Governor Geo. T. Jester of Texas was selected as temporary chairman and his speech before the convention was full of interesting information to cotton growers. The convention will undoubtedly have the effect of inducing farmers to decrease the cotton acreage this year.

A special from Lawton, O. T. says: "It is with strenuous effort that the law-abiding citizens of the territory contiguous to the Kiowa-Comanche Indian pasture reserve in the southern part of Comanche county are preventing hot-headed, incensed persons from firing the entire 500,000 acres of the grazing reservation. The citizens of that section allege that the cattlemen, through corrupt influence, have blocked the passage of the bill in congress opening these lands to settlement."

No town will become a good business center as long as the majority of its business men rely upon a few merchants to bring trade to town. Too often the men in a few lines of trade are about the only ones that reach out after custom. Other merchants wait until these business men influence people to town and content themselves with the trade that naturally drifts to their places. A public spirited man asks himself if he is doing his part to attract the people to come to town. Any person who induces people to come to trade is helping the entire business community, and no town is a success unless all lines of trade are working to extend business as far as possible, and trying to bring a larger territory in the circle of which the town is the business center.—Ex.

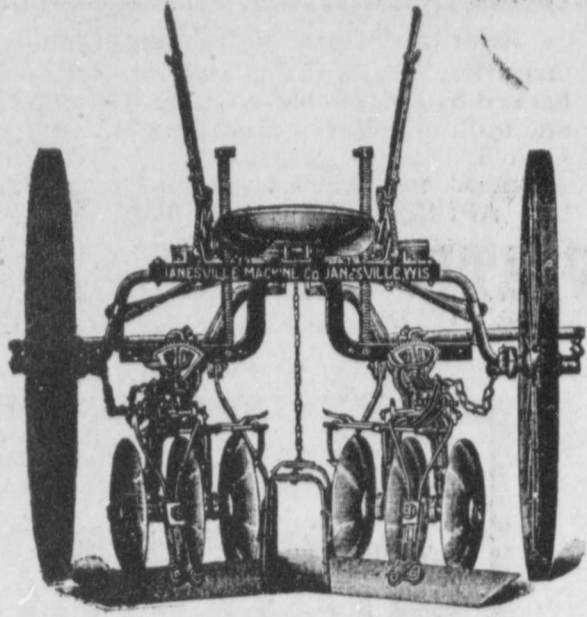

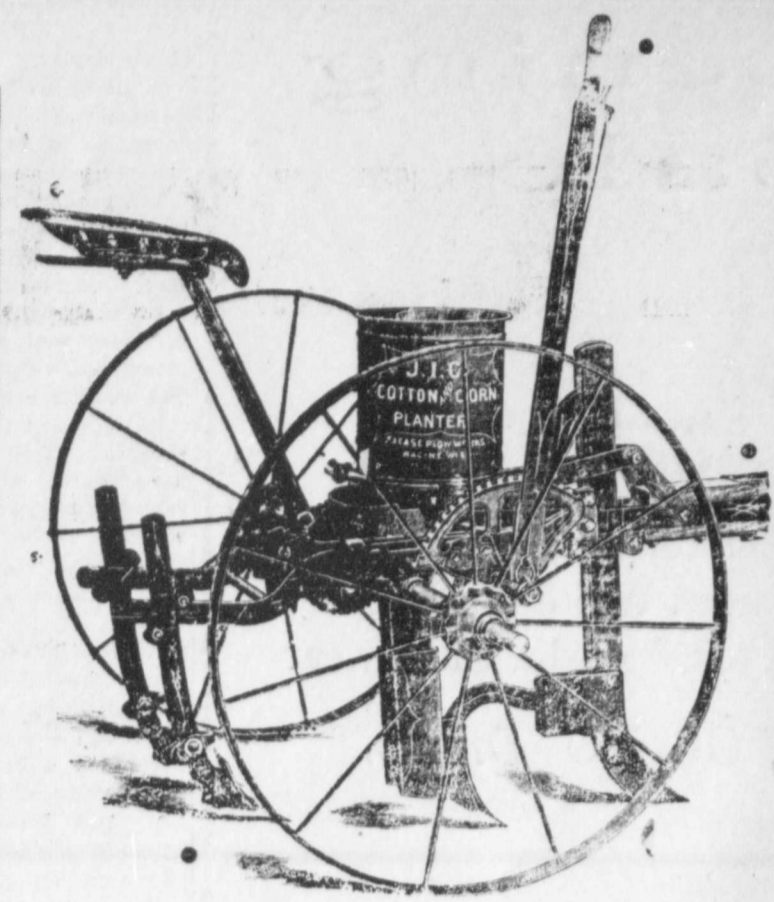
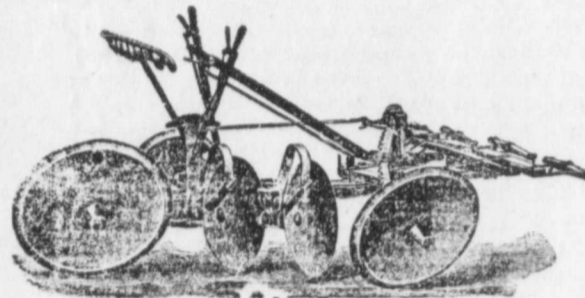
