Dr. R. C. Smith of Cleco was in our city Saturday making arrangements to move with his family to this place, where he will engage in the practice of medicine.

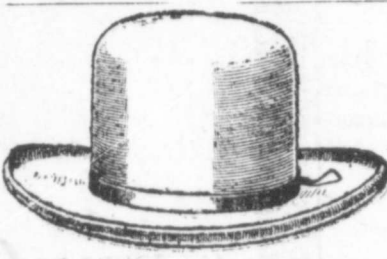

The Japanese still have the Russians on the run.

The court of criminal appeals rules that no city has the right to prohibit people dealing in railroad tickets.

After quoting the Eagle's account of the marriage of Dr. Taylor, the San Angelo Press says: "Dr. Taylor formerly practiced medicine at El Dorado and later on was associated in the practice of his profession with Dr. S. C. Parsons of San Angelo. He has many friends in West Texas who wish him well."

The trial of the bribery case in Austin, which required about two weeks of the district court at that place, resulted in the accused being acquitted of the charge. In this case ex-State Treasurer Wortham and another fellow claimed to have bribed the district attorney to dismiss certain cases against the Kirby Lumber Company.

The revolt of the French bankers is considered by the London newspapers as the most hopeful and important news, promising an early peace between Russia and Japan. Apparently the proposed loan has not been absolutely refused, but only "postponed." This, however, is regarded as being tantamount to a refusal. Reports are current that Japan will now demand an indemnity of between \$500,000,000 and \$750,000,000.

A dispatch from Brady, under date of March 13, says: "The local option election held in McCulloch county on Saturday last, resulted in a complete victory for the pros. With one small box to hear from the majority for the pros is 345. The antis have conceded the county to the pros all along. Out of 693 votes cast 516 were for prohibition. Jasper, Navarro and Nolan counties have each voted recently and all went pro by good majorities."

If some church members would "talk up" their churches as much as they "talk them down" it would be much better for them and their churches. Of course, people who have no heart in church service, and work, will "talk down" the churches that have honored them with membership and fellowship. These people ought to voluntarily "retire to private life," else have the proper help thereto, if they will not mend their ways. An internal is more to be dreaded than an external enemy. No one whose heart and influence is against Christ and His cause, ought to be a member of Christ's church. Is that not clear?—Baptist Standard.

Warren, Malone & Williams, J. J. Cox, McCormick & Williams and Ole Storehoff appear as Mullin business men, while the professional cards of Dr. J. D. Kirkpatrick and Dr. M. C. Brockenbrough appear. The Goldthwaite advertisers are Clements & Nailer, Triplett & Lewis, E. S. Kirby and James & Paffy.

In this issue the announced candidates for the various offices are: W. T. Shannon, district attorney; J. P. Grundy, M. J. Doyle, county judge; G. W. Cunningham, sheriff and collector; M. C. Humphries, W. H. Thompson, county clerk; C. Rawles, W. S. Marshall, district clerk; R. R. Sharp, C. C. Yarbrough, tax assessor; A. A. Hutchinson, G. H. Dalton, commissioner and justice of Mullin precinct.

The paper stated that the Confederate reunion was to be held in Mullin the following Thursday, announced the marriage of C. H. Rich and Miss Mary J. Thacker, and told of a protracted meeting in progress at Williams Ranch by Revs. Harrison, Williams and Tomlinson. It also announced the closing of the meeting at Childer's school house, that had been conducted by Revs. Templin, Johnstone and Pettick. It also stated that M. C. Kirkpatrick had built an addition to his residence and that

Malone & Williams had renovated, ceiled and papered their saloon building. R. P. Conner of Brownwood had visited his brother, J. A. Conner, and Judge Brewer of Comanche, candidate for the legislature, had visited the town. The paper also contained an article from the Fort Worth Gazette regarding the building of the Rio Grande road from Comanche, which was then the terminus, to Eagle Pass. The Gazette was of the opinion that the road would cross the Santa Fe at either Mullin or Goldthwaite and be extended to San Saba, Llano and on to Eagle Pass.

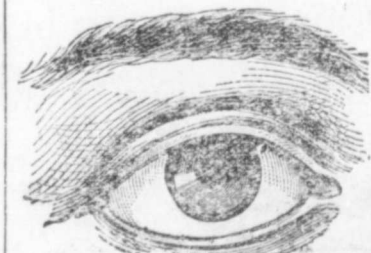
### COTTON RECEIPTS.

There is yet a considerable amount of cotton in the hands of the farmers, as indicated by the receipts this week. Had the weather been favorable and the roads good it is probable the receipts would have been much larger. The total receipts for the season amount to 8561. This is, of course, exclusive of the round bales ginned here and shipped without being weighed by the public weigher.

The receipts during this week were: Monday 30 bales, Tuesday 28, Wednesday 25, Thursday 2, Friday 24. If the price should go to the neighborhood of 9 cents several hundred bales would be brought in by farmers who are holding their cotton for a better price.

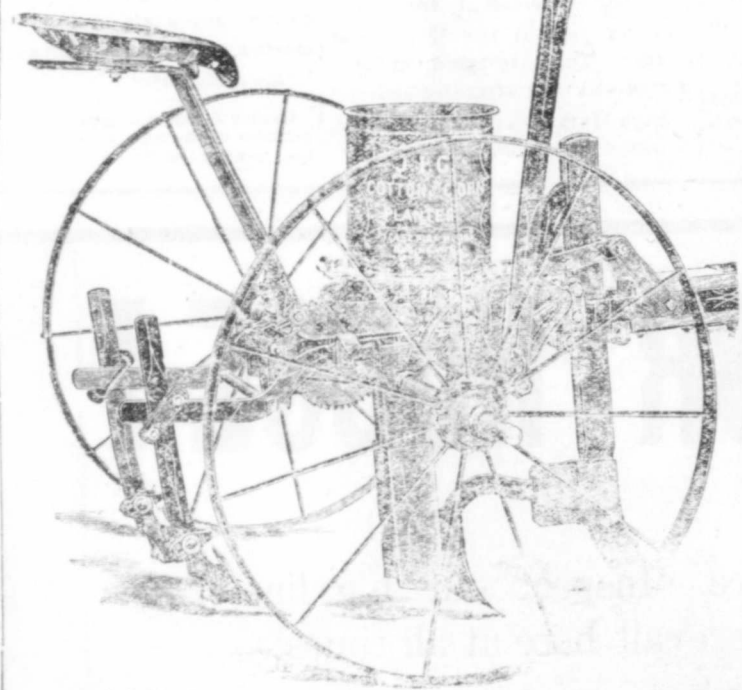

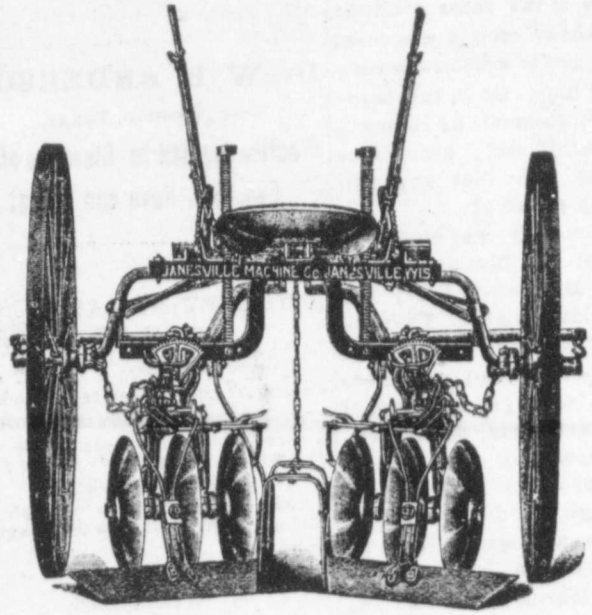
