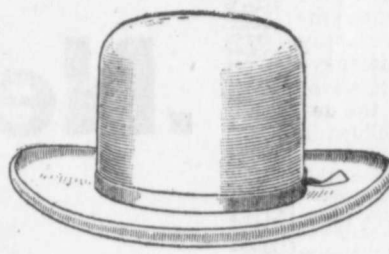
HAMILTON.

CARE OF GIRLS.
As a rule, too many mothers are too careless and indulgent toward their girls. They give them liberties which they are not qualified to use with discretion. They do not mean any harm by such a manner; but they are silly and foolish and without thinking, put themselves on terms of familiarity with young men. Thus, without knowing it, they invite liberties and attentions not in keeping with modesty and propriety. One step leads to another, and sometimes evil is the result. And when it occurs, the mothers of such girls have no one to blame but themselves. They did not use proper discipline and home training. They practically turned their self-willed girls loose to follow their own silly inclinations. They permitted them to make visits away from home, spend nights with companions, go to parties, receive the attention of young men on short acquaintance, take buggy rides after nightfall, keep late hours and indulge in promiscuous dissipations. If such girls escape suspicion, to put it no stronger, it will be a miracle. Not every young man will take advantage of such girls; but many of them will, and a blighted life or a soiled name is the outcome. Foolish mothers are responsible for the after-life of their daughters. A sensible and firm mother will have no trouble of this sort. She will be wise and keep her girls under the right sort of control.—Home and State.

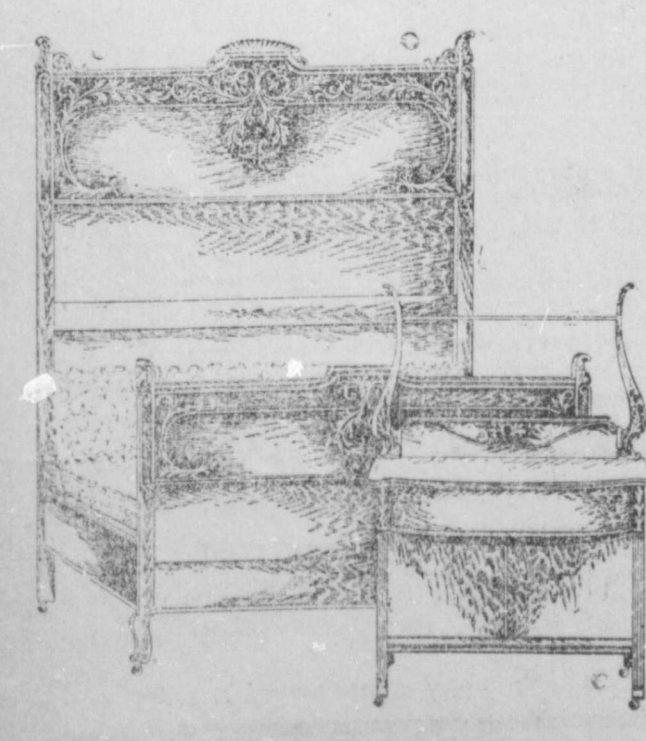

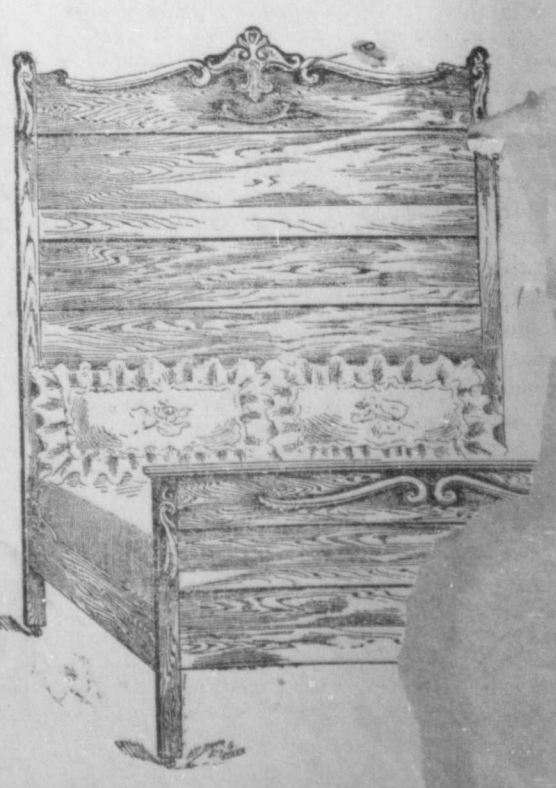

BAR RESOLUTIONS.

Hon. John L. Lewis and family left Thursday for Hamilton, where they will reside. The people of Goldthwaite regretted the departure of this good family and a meeting of the attorneys of Goldthwaite was held to adopt resolutions of regret for the departure of Mr. Lewis. Following are the proceedings:

"Be it remembered that on this May 3, 1905, there was held a meeting of the bar of Goldthwaite, present and participating all the resident members thereof; and thereupon the purpose of such meeting was stated by the chairman to be the passage of suitable resolutions concerning the removal of Jno. L. Lewis, Esq., whereupon there was introduced the following resolution, which was read and considered and unanimously adopted and ordered published in the Goldthwaite Eagle, as a token of respect upon the part of the bar at Goldthwaite towards Mr. Lewis upon his departure.

"There being met in called session all the resident members of the legal fraternity of Goldthwaite for the purpose of passing resolutions concerning the removal of Jno. L. Lewis, Esq., who has lately left us for a new home in Hamilton, Texas, it is resolved that we do all things sincerely regret to lose him as a member of this bar; and remember with kindness and esteem the long and uninterrupted course of high professional conduct which we have observed since our first acquaintance with him. "Mr. Lewis was our oldest member, and since the departure of Col. D. H. Triplett in 1895, has been recognized by us as our leading member, and in its highest sense the Nestor of the bar." All the present members came to Goldthwaite some years after the practice here was already in the hands of Col. Triplett and Mr. Lewis, and the treatment accorded us as younger members, was such as traditionally distinguishes the profession of law as a high-toned brotherhood in which the rights of primogeniture are most honorably and ungraciously waived by their possessors.

We heartily recommend Mr. Lewis to the people of Hamilton, many of whom are our personal friends, as an able, scholarly, astute and trustworthy lawyer. 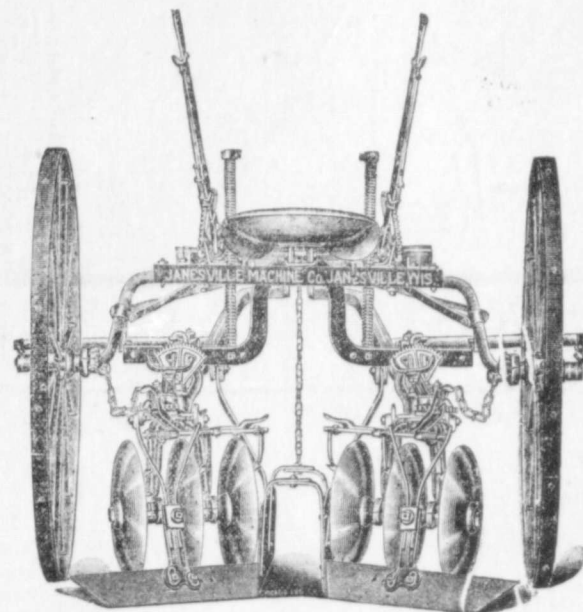

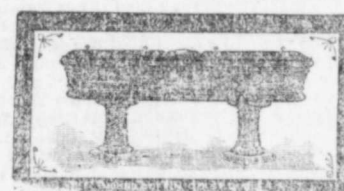

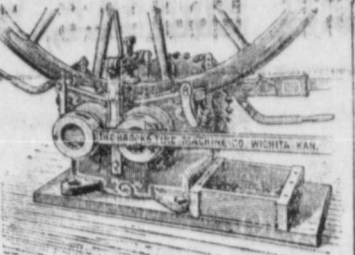

Attorney General Davidson has declared unconstitutional the State banking bill on account of its caption being insufficient.

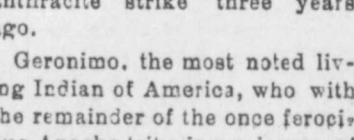
Treasurer Robbins estimates the receipts for the next two fiscal years at \$7,000,000, from which a deficit of \$248,026 must be deducted.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION

For Special Road Tax

That, whereas, a petition having the number of signers as required by law has been submitted to the commissioners' court of Mills county, Texas, praying that an election be ordered to be held throughout Mills county to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified taxpaying voters residing in said county desire to tax themselves for the purpose of supplementing the Road and Bridge fund of this county and to determine whether the commissioners' court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect, annually a special tax of, and at the rate of, not exceeding 15 cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property in Mills county for said purpose and:

Whereas, there is an order passed by said commissioners' court which is recorded in Book 5, page 34, of the minutes of said court, ordering that an election for said purpose be held on the 12th day of August, 1919.

Now, therefore, I, Robert Weaver, county judge of Mills county, Texas, by virtue of authority vested in me under the laws of Texas, hereby order and direct that an election be held in the several voting precincts of this county on Tuesday, the 12th day of August, 1919, for the adoption or rejection of the proposition to levy a special road tax not exceeding the rate of 15 cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property for road and bridge purposes.

Only qualified voters of this county who pay a property tax shall be permitted to vote at said election.

Said election shall be held at the polling places of the several election precincts of this county and shall be conducted by the officers holding same in strict accordance with the law and returns made in conformity to the laws of this state and in accordance with this proclamation.

RELATING TO CONFEDERATE PENSIONS AND INCREASING TAX RATES FOR PAYMENT OF SAME
 House Joint Resolution No. 35.
 Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the constitution of the state of Texas to provide that the legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas prior to Jan. 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$0.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this state for the payment of such pension, providing that the legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making appropriation to pay the expenses thereof:

Be it resolved by the legislature of the State of Texas:
 Section 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the constitution of the state of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
 Sec. 51. The legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipalities or other corporations whatsoever, provided however, the legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this state since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under special laws of the state of Texas during the war between the states served in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the state of Texas who were in active service during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this section shall not apply to women born since the year 1866, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this state under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the competency under such regulations and provisions as may be provided by the legislature, may for husband and wife to re-together in the home. There by levied in addition to all taxes heretofore permitted by constitution of Texas a state ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$0.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the state of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied. And provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.
 Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1919, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots, "For amendment of Section 51 of Article 3 of the constitution authorizing the legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows who have been residents of this state since January 1, 1910," and "Against amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the constitution, authorizing the legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."
 Sec. 3. The governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state, and the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this state not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publications and elections thereunder.

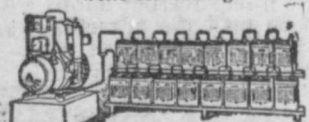

PERMITTING GALVESTON COUNTY AND CITY TO ISSUE BONDS FOR GRADE RAISING PURPOSES

Senate Joint Resolution No. 23.

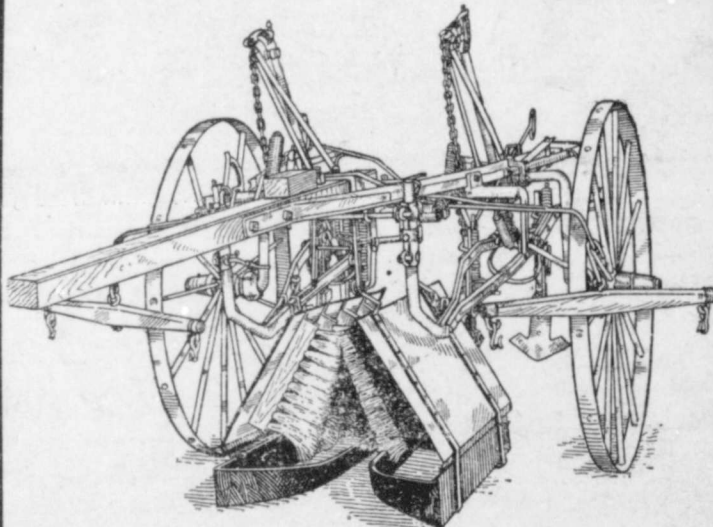
A joint resolution proposing and submitting to the people of the state of Texas an amendment to Article sixteen of the constitution of the state of Texas by adding thereto a new section and authorizing the city of Galveston and county of Galveston to issue bonds for protective works, irrespective of constitutional limitation, in the aggregate of five million dollars for both city and county, as may be by the city or county deemed necessary for the raising of the grade, building seawalls and breakwaters and doing any and all kinds of protective works in said city and county, and to levy and collect taxes to retire said bonds principal and interest, providing for a sinking fund and creating an emergency.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of The State of Texas:

Section 1. The city of Galveston and the county of Galveston, and each of them are hereby authorized to issue bonds in such amounts not to exceed in the aggregate five million dollars, for both city and county, as may be by the city or county deemed necessary for the raising of the grade, building seawalls and breakwaters, and doing any and all other kinds of protective works in said city and county, without regard to and irrespective of any provisions of the constitution of the State of Texas limiting tax levies and governing bond issues, and for that purpose to levy and collect taxes to retire and pay same principal and interest, but no debt shall ever be incurred for such purpose, unless provision is made at the time of creating same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and to provide at least two percent, as a sinking fund, this provision being cumulative, and authorizing the issuance of such bonds in addition to those heretofore issued for such purposes and still outstanding, the amount of such additional bonds to be issued by the county hereunder, not to exceed one million dollars and the amount of such additional bonds to be issued by the city hereunder not to exceed four million dollars, but nothing herein shall apply to bonds heretofore or hereafter issued for purposes other than those herein defined; provided, however, that that portion of Galveston county not lying within the corporate limits of the city of Galveston shall not be taxed for the purpose of issuing bonds for any of the purposes herein provided within the corporate limits of the city of Galveston, unless such bond issue and tax levy be authorized by a majority of all the tax paying voters residing in Galveston county outside of the corporate limits of the city of Galveston; provided that no such bonds issued by the city of Galveston shall be valid unless such bond issue and tax levy be authorized by a majority of all qualified tax paying voters of the city of Galveston voting at an election to be called for that purpose by the mayor and board of commissioners of said city of Galveston.

Sec. 2. The governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting an amendment to the constitution to the qualified electors of the state of Texas on the first Tuesday in November, 1919, being the fourth day of November, 1919. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as is necessary, out of the funds in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated, is hereby appropriated to pay expenses for the carrying out of the provisions of this resolution.
