The school trustees have employed Dennis Herring to take the city scholastic census. He has also been employed to take the census of the entire population of the city within the corporate limits.

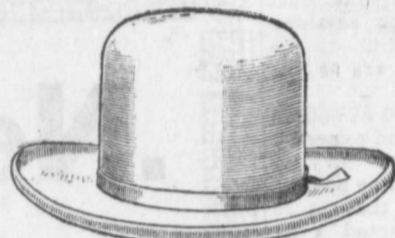

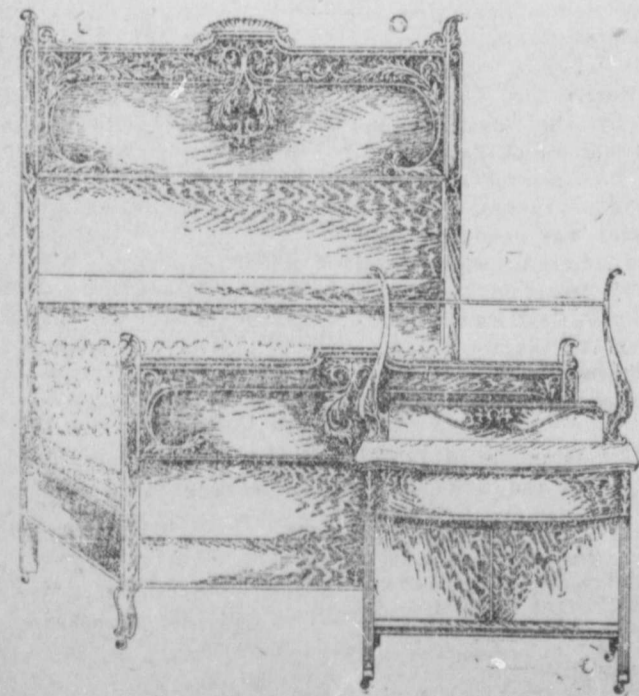

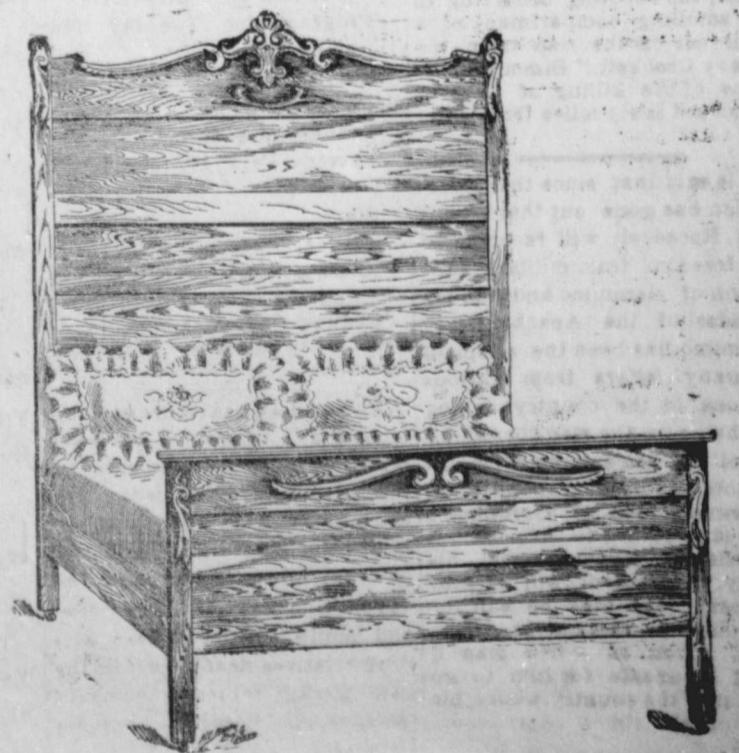

COMMISSIONERS COURT.

Commissioners court met last Monday, and is yet in session. The proceedings had up to the time of going to press are as follows:

John Reeves allowed \$28 50 in payment for work and expense.

1. A general order levying taxes for the county was passed Monday and provides that there shall be annually collected a direct ad valorem tax of twenty-five cents on each one hundred dollars, for general purposes of the county.

2. An annual ad valorem tax of fifteen cents on each one hundred dollars to pay interest on court house bonds and to create a sinking fund to redeem such bonds.

3. An annual ad valorem tax of fifteen cents on each one hundred dollars to pay interest on bridge bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay such bonds, and for general road and bridge purposes.

4. A poll tax on all citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 of twenty-five cents for general county purposes.

5. An occupation tax against every person following any occupation taxable under the state laws, one-half the amount levied by the state.

6. A special tax of twenty cents on each one hundred dollars for public free school purposes.

7. A special tax of twenty cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in Big Valley school district No. 23 for public free school purposes.

8. A special tax of fifteen cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in Live Oak school district No. 30 for public free school purposes.

9. A special tax of fifteen cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in Washboard school district No. 33 for public free school purposes.

Upon petition of J. F. Bull and sixteen others it was ordered that the line between school districts Nos. 9 and 37 be changed.

J. L. Farmer and others were given permission to erect and maintain a telephone line along the Brownwood and Hamilton public road in Mills county.

Upon petition of C. L. Featherstone and others, a jury of view was appointed to lay out a second class road beginning at the Lometa and Center City road at Pleasant Grove school house in Precinct No. 2. The jury consists of T. N. Berry, W. F. Horton, A. M. Rose, I. T. Moreland and C. L. Featherstone.

A jury of view consisting of J. M. Boler, Joe M. Swindle, Z. T. Christian, P. T. Miller and J. W. Bishop was appointed upon petition of Andrew Lorenza and twelve others to lay out a third class road in Precinct No. 3 beginning at the Mills and Hamilton county line 150 vrs. east of Henry Snider's south east corner.

Upon petition of J. J. Davis and 13 others, a jury of view was appointed consisting of Will Blackburn, P. M. Henry, A. M. Jones, J. A. Fletcher and Jim Green to lay out a new road in Precinct No. 3 beginning at J. J. Davis' northeast corner.

A number of petitions for roads and changes in roads were considered and rejected, and a number were continued to the next regular term.

Permission was granted to J. P. Hoff and E. W. Harris of Comanche, Texas, and to their successors and assigns to erect and maintain along the public roads, streets and alleys of Goldthwaite an electric light line for the purpose of supplying electric lights to the town, for the period of fifty years.

The quarterly reports of H. T. White, J. F. Jones and Walter Nelson were examined and approved.

The quarterly report of G. W. Templin, treasurer, was checked and found correct and approved.

Revival services are now in progress at the Methodist church twice daily. At 3:30 and 8:30 p. m. Preaching and communion service Sunday afternoon at 5:30. Everybody invited. The Epworth League program will not be carried out next Sunday afternoon.—J. T. FARNS.

A cyclone struck Owl, I. T., last Friday evening and damaged the business part of the town to the extent of over \$50,000. Ten people were injured, four fatally.

Snyder, Okla., is a total wreck, a terrific cyclone having struck there Wednesday, killing about 80 people and injuring many more. Relief parties have gone there and the dead and wounded are being cared for.

A passenger train on the Galveston and La Porte road was wrecked Sunday night at 11 o'clock. The engineer and fireman both crushed under the engine and burned. The tank of fuel oil in the tender burst and oil was spread over the wreck and all of the coaches were burned. None of the passengers were seriously hurt.

Lawyer J. L. Lewis and family of Goldthwaite arrived last Saturday are now living in the Nicholson residence in east Hamilton. They have come to make it their home, and all Hamilton extends them a cordial welcome. Mr. Lewis is a lawyer of ability, and a most pleasant, affable gentleman. He and his family will prove a valuable acquisition to the town.—Hamilton Herald.

Tuesday morning another chapter was added to the troubles, which resulted some time since in the death of William Duncanson. W. T. Eldridge, who slew Duncanson at Simonton station on board a San Antonio and Aransas Pass train, shot thrice and killed instantly W. E. Calhoun, a brother-in-law of Captain Duncanson, the shooting occurring in a chair car on the rap train, the scene of the killing of Captain Duncanson is six miles from Wallis.

It is said that since the information has gone out that President Roosevelt will recommend the freedom from military subjection of Geronimo and the remainder of the Apache tribe, Geronimo has been the recipient of many letters from various portions of the country asking that he go on the stage or exhibit himself in attractions after his freedom has been granted. The uppermost idea of Geronimo's mind is to return to Arizona. It is believed, however, that his liberty, if granted, will be compelled to remain in Oklahoma. Even as a free man it would be unsafe for him to go again into the country where his most cruel crimes were committed.

Now, I wish to publicly express my appreciation of the kindly expressions contained in said resolutions, and to assure each of my former professional associates that I hold them in kindly remembrance; that our former conflicts in the forum of justice will ever be fresh in my mind, as also our social intercourse, in all of which I have profited.

I will also utilize this occasion to say to the people of Mills county generally, that I appreciate the kind treatment I have had at their hands, and, notwithstanding the clashes and conflicts, incident to a long public career—things that are inevitable with public men—I leave the county without malice to any individual therein—no exceptions.

CONFEDERATE MEETING.

Camp Jeff Davis, U. C. V. No 117, met at the court house May 6 with Commander J. D. Sexton in the chair.

The Comrades were called to order, and business opened with prayer by Chaplain Harralson. The time to hold our annual reunion was taken up and being discussed, a motion to hold it on July 3, 4, and 5 at the Confederate Park near Goldthwaite, carried unanimously.

The next in order of business being the dues. We each owe to the state and National reunion, 5 cents to the state and 10 cents to the National. All present paid in the amount to the adjutant.

The third matter to be considered by the camp was the election of delegates to the National reunion to be held at Louisville, Ky. on June 14, 15 and 16 1905. Col. F. J. Crews and Adjutant M. S. Wallace were put in nomination and unanimously elected. Com. Harralson made a motion which was duly seconded and being put to the camp carried, that Capt. Crews, Capt. Wallace and J. T. Prater be appointed as a committee to secure speakers for our reunion. The motion was amended, R. M. Thompson being added to the committee.

This being a reunion of our regiment, and the camps from other points will attend, and most of them come on the railroad, a motion made and carried and J. D. Sexton, J. T. Prater, Capt. W. R. Cox and Leon Harris, a son of a Confederate Veteran, were appointed as a committee to secure rates on the railroad for this occasion. The old Veterans having

thought over and discussed the subject previously and to some extent at this meeting that the ground had been bought and paid for and some improvements made by them and they were unable to fix it up as comfortably as they desired and that in a few years it would pass from them to the sons and daughters of Confederate Veterans and would be used by them as a meeting place when these old soldiers of a "Lost Cause" were mouldering in the dust, a committee to raise funds to build a tabernacle on the reunion grounds was appointed consisting of L. G. Blackburn and D. S. Hopkins from our camp and Leon Harris and H. T. White from the town of Goldthwaite. Miss Lida Thompson and Miss Jennie McAlister being present were appointed as auxiliaries on this committee to assist in raising funds.

Leon Harris had been requested by the comrades to make an estimate of the cost of material to construct a tabernacle forty feet square, and being present was called on and submitted his report which was about two hundred dollars.

A motion by Capt. Dan S. Kelly that every Confederate Veteran present be requested to solicit the sons and daughters to organize here.

The following motion made by Comrade Martin and carried. It is the sense of the Jeff Davis Camp U. C. V. and so ordered by motion and seconded that R. M. Thompson be requested to open a roll for the enrollment of the names of the sons and daughters of Confederates with a view to organization of a camp. And further that the Veterans of the Camp notify all who desire to join such organization to come in and give their names to Mr. Thompson.

The business being done the camp adjourned to meet the first Saturday in June. The last meeting before our annual reunion in July.

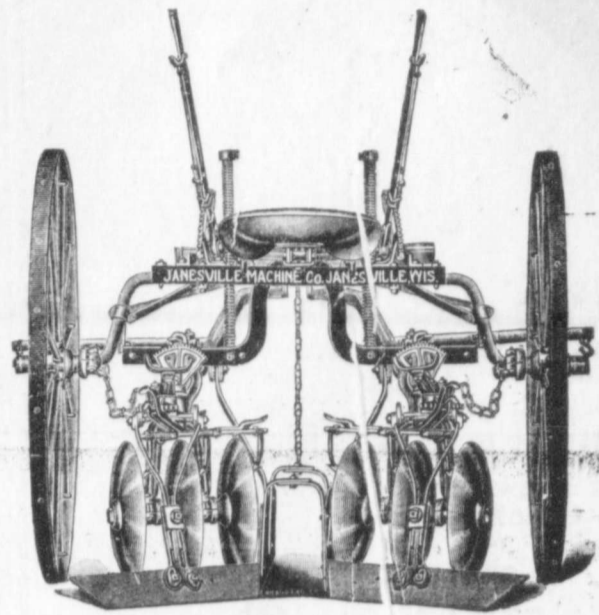

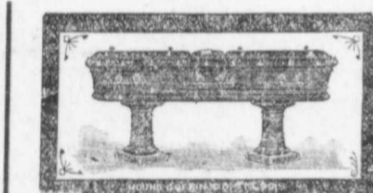

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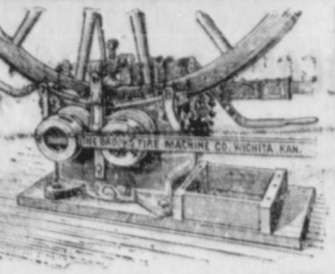
