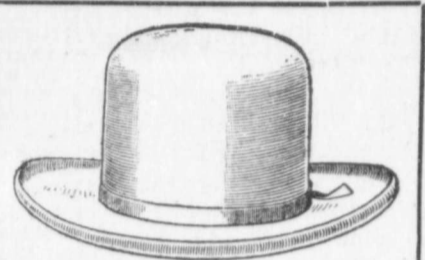

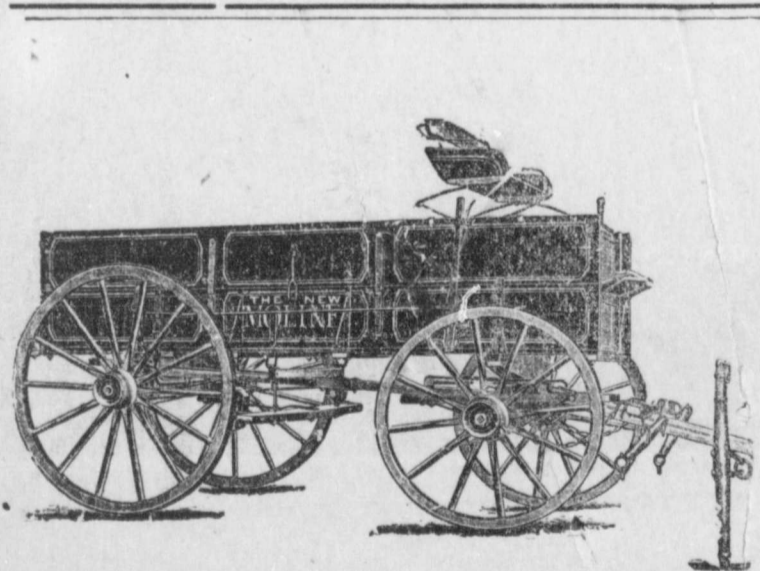
Mrs. J. A. Biggs returned Monday night from a visit to her daughter, Miss Olivia at Blanket.—Stamford News.

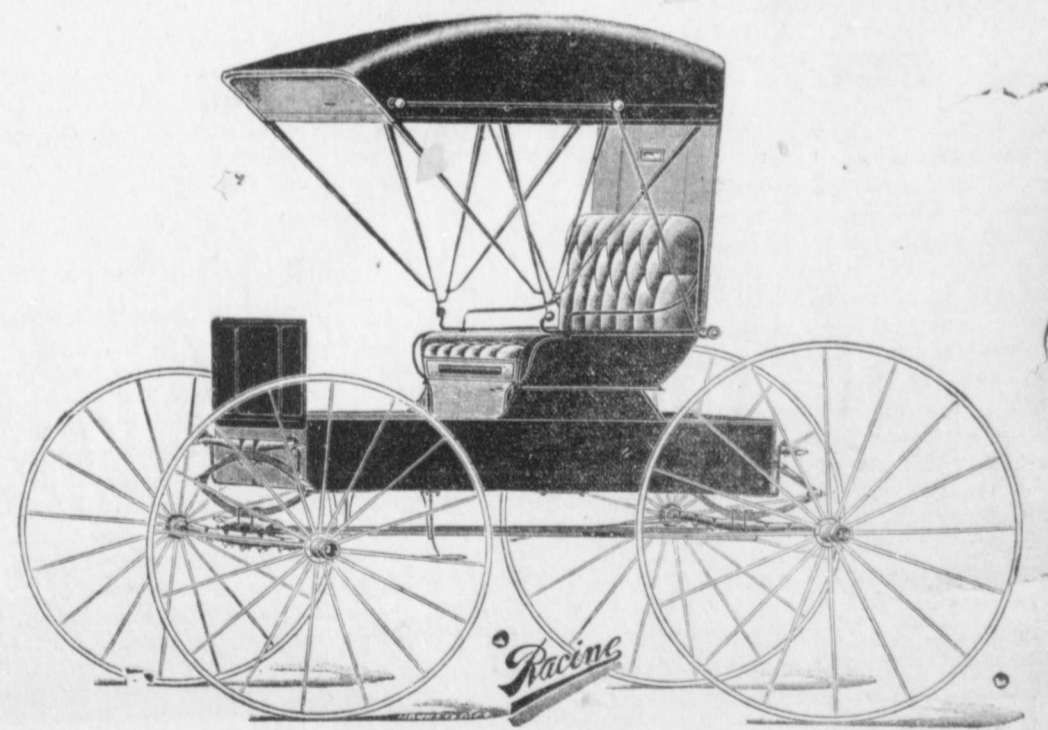

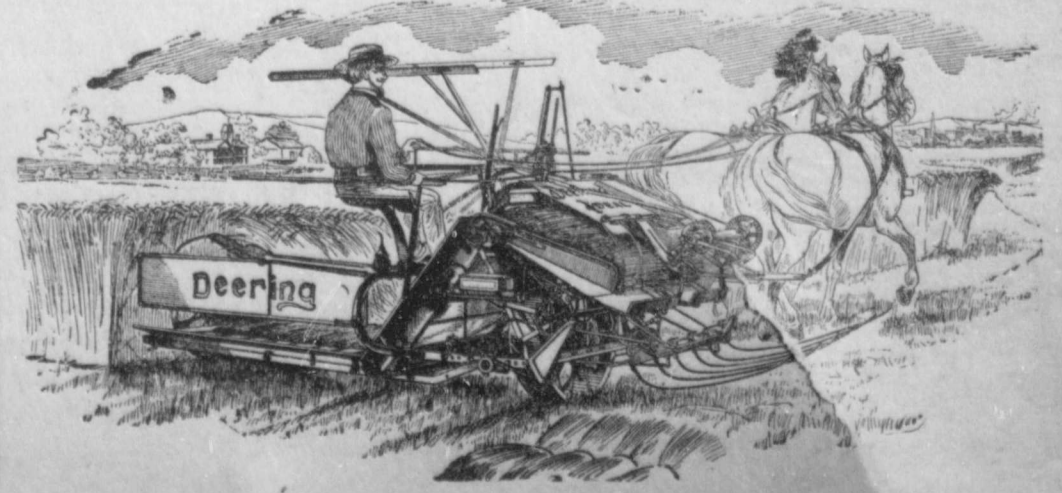

A grand juror of Lamar county was arrested this week charged with disclosing grand jury secrets. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$200.

Rumors are current that the Russian and Japanese fleets have met and that the Japs were defeated, but the entire report is likely a fake. No definite report has been had from the fleets.

Severe wind storms passed over North Texas Thursday morning. Great damage was done to property in Dallas, Denison, Greenville and other places. No lives were reported lost.

The contract between the Frisco railroad company and a firm at Muskogee, I. T., has been signed, whereby the Frisco track is to be leased for running interurban cars from Muskogee to Gibson, I. T.

A cyclone struck Fort Worth Sunday morning and a considerable amount of property was destroyed. The Texas and Pacific depot was unroofed and a part of a wall fell in. Jack Young, a telegrapher for the railroad, was caught beneath the wall and killed.

Henry Carter was shot and killed Wednesday at Comanche by Oscar Roberts. The trouble was over the pasturing of cows and the tragedy was enacted near the railroad depot. When the dead man was picked up it was found that 130 shot had taken effect in his body.

The labor strike in Chicago is assuming large proportions. Thousands of laboring people have gone into the strike and in many cases have resorted to violence when others have attempted to work. One thousand extra policemen have been employed to keep down the riotous element and the governor will likely be called upon to send troops to the city to assist in keeping order and protecting life and property.

Joe Brown ordered the machinery for the Zephyr electric light plant Tuesday, and it is expected to arrive not later than June 10. He has secured others who agree to use forty-horsepower lights, and thinks there will be no trouble in obtaining the five additional lights to make up the fifty, which the machinery people told him he should secure before the enterprise could be run on a paying basis. The new plant will, without some unforeseen mishap, be in running order by July 1.—Zephyr Mirror.

At the age of sixteen John H. Reagan was unable to read, it was at this age that he was thrown upon his own resources without a dollar, without education and without a trade. He secured a job at hard labor for which he was paid \$9 per month. And yet John H. Reagan died with a fund of knowledge possessed by few men and the idol of his countrymen. Let no young man complain if his advantages are not the best. All things are possible to the boy who keeps his hand and brain busy and his heart free from soil.—Honey Grove Signal.

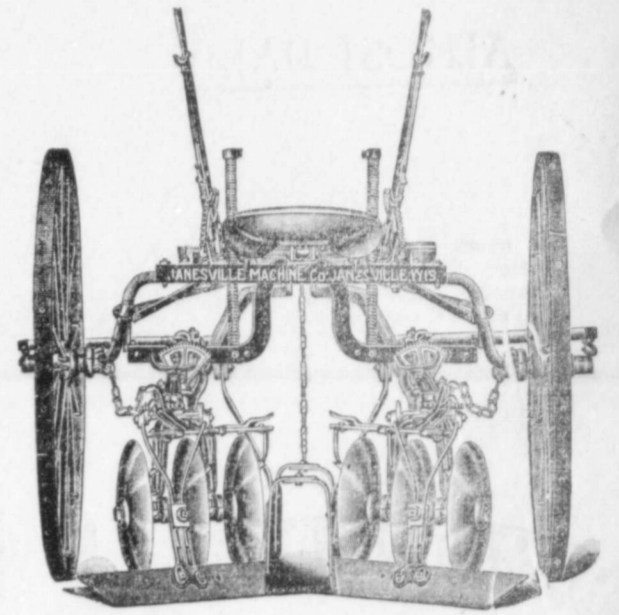

### SCHOOL CLOSURES.

The public school closed last Friday afternoon and there was an entertainment by the pupils in the opera house Friday night. The program was long and varied and was most interesting throughout. The children had given much care to the preparation for the entertainment and had received much assistance from the teachers. The exercises reflected great credit on the school and the large audience gave ample evidence of appreciation of every number on the program.

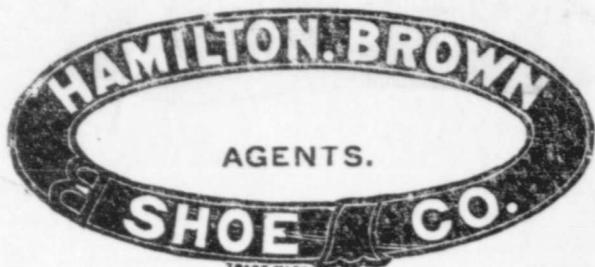

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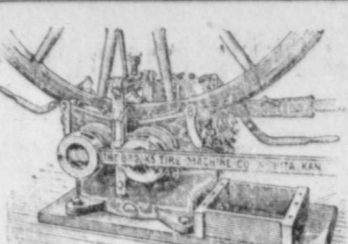
