Russia's avowed intention to continue the war until Japan is exhausted is little short of ridiculous, in the light of recent events. Just how the czar and his obstinate advisers expect to win Japan is not clear. The object of the determination to continue the war came before the emperor to ask for Japan's peace, and it may have some idea that the terms be made easier for his government if the Japanese believed that the Russian monarch really desired to continue hostilities indefinitely.

The committee having in charge of the building of an auditorium at the reunion grounds this week let the contract for the work to Marshal Welch, who has already commenced the building. The plans are for a structure 40 feet square to be built in a way that an addition can be made to it at a later date. The roof is to be of shingles and is to be "hipped" on the end next to the railroad. There are to be upright posts 6x6 placed every 10 feet in each direction. These posts are to be sunk in the ground and set in cement. No side wall will be placed now, but later the sides will be placed in such a way that they can be raised and lowered by means of hinges. The lumber for the work now being done will cost about \$215 and the contractor does the work for \$67.50.

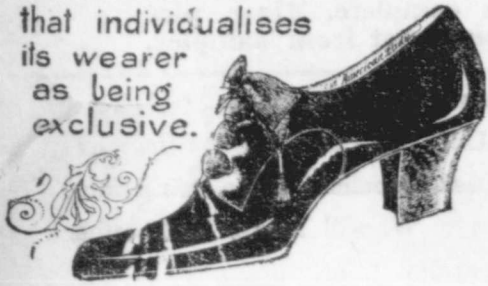

FINE COUNTRY.

A VISIT TO INDIAN GAP AND PRIDDY LAST WEEK.

The Eagle editor visited the pretty little town of Indian Gap last Saturday and spent a part of the afternoon at Priddy, and was delighted to see that splendid country and its people in such a prosperous condition.

The road from this town to Indian Gap is fairly good and the farms along the way are well tilled and the crops are growing nicely. There is a small strip of country near Indian Gap that was visited by a destructive hail storm a few weeks ago and the crops were so badly damaged that they were replanted, but outside of that small strip the oats and wheat are almost ready for harvesting, corn is large and cotton is growing nicely.

Indian Gap is surrounded by fine farming land and the business men of the town are progressive and carry large stocks of goods. One merchant buys some of his goods by car loads, which shows that a good patronage goes to the merchants of that place. Some of the residences on the farms are large and costly. In fact there are few such residences in the county as those of J. A. Harris and Mr. Christie, while over the line in Hamilton county there are other good houses. Mrs. Helen Stoddard's home is one of the finest in that section. It is built of stone and is two-stories.

Right on the topmost peak of the mountain at Indian Gap is a monument erected at the graves of Mr. and Mrs. Hawley Gerrells. This monument cost about \$3500 and from its base one can get an excellent view of the surrounding country. It is in a beautiful location and can be seen from a great distance. Mr. Gerrells located at Indian Gap in 1878 and built the residence now owned by Mrs. Stoddard. He died in 1891 and his wife died in 1896. They still have relatives there who are among the best citizens of that section.

At Priddy there are two large stores with stocks of goods equal to those carried in large towns. Mr. E. M. Meyer has a stock of general merchandise and is doing an immense business. He is assisted in the store by his father, Mr. Chas. Meyer, who has a beautiful home and a large farm and a fine orchard at that place. The McCullay Mercantile Company's business there is in charge of Mr. D. Andrews, who is a business man of experience, and he, like Mr. Meyer, carries a large stock of general merchandise and is popular with the people.

J. R. Lewis has a fine new gin at Priddy and there is a blacksmith shop and a barber shop located near the stores. There is no better land than that of the Priddy and Indian Gap country and those who have never visited that section should take the first opportunity to see that fine country. The road from Priddy to Goldthwaite is almost impassable in places and no part of the road is

good. Several culverts are badly needed and a considerable amount of money could be used to better the road. It is small wonder that many of the people of that section buy their supplies in other towns while they live nearer to Goldthwaite. The road is so utterly bad that a load could not be drawn over it and an empty vehicle is liable to be broken down in the ditches, ruts and washouts. Surely this road could be made at least passable, and in the name of the people of that section and the business men of this town the Eagle urges the commissioners to appropriate enough money to pay for doing the work.

At this time the departments of work will be chosen and superintendents appointed.

Many interesting incidents of this magnificent meeting might be related had we time and space. Mrs. Greene considers this one of the most pleasant and successful meetings she ever held.
