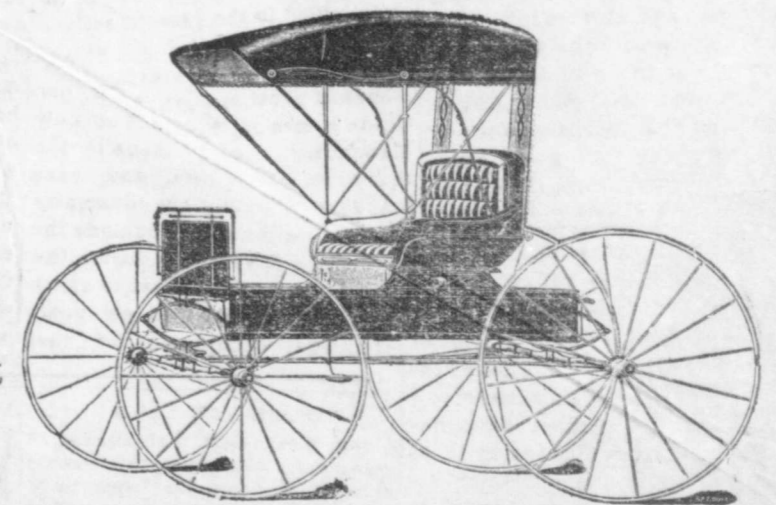

feeling in passing thru Zacatecas, as this was the only state in Mexico, who like Texas, resisted Santa Anna's tyranny. Here some one will point out to you the famous old mine owned by two "old maids" of London. This mine has been worked for 300 years, the returns are said to be about \$60,000 per month. (I don't know the old maids' address, I mention this for the sake of any matrimonially inclined gentlemen who might wish to know.)

The Mexico is famed for her mines, yet her other resources are not to be over-looked. On this trip you pass thru some fine farming sections. Corn and cotton here, as in Texas, seem much in favor. Cotton bears and rears without replanting. I'm told that a cotton crop is not planted more often than every four years. All the vegetables and fruits known in North America are found in the gardens and orchards of Mexico and all of the tropical plants are found in the lower, or hot country, as the people call this section. There is an infinite variety of flowers.

The Magney plant should have special attention in this article, because it has in the Republic. You pass thru acres and acres of the Magney, or Century plant, from which are produced the intoxicating drinks of the country—pulque, tequila and mescal. Tequila and mescal are obtained by distilling the juice of the roots and lower leaves, but the pulque is the fermented juice of the flower stem. The peons take a burrow loaded with pig skins to the Magney field, here they draw the sap until about six pig skins are full, these are loaded on the burrow and taken to the nearby hacienda when it is fermented one night, reloaded on the burrow and sent to market in the morning. Several peons go along, when they become thirsty they pass around the pig skin and all take a drink. If the pulque happens to be old enough to be intoxicating you will soon see all the Mexicans asleep and the burrow grazing around with the remainder of his burden.
