

### In translating the Spanish records in Texas some queer transfers have been found. In a trade consummated between a Mexican and Indian in the year 1789 for a league of land now situated in Angelina county, the consideration was one flint-lock rifle, fifty loads of powder, one bunch of red tape and drink of marmalade. After the trade had been accepted by the Indian, whose name was Left Hand, the Mexican applied to the authorities for a grant to the league of land. A lot of commissioners were appointed by the Spanish government to go over the premises and investigate the price paid. They found that the flint-lock rifle was worth \$100, the fifty loads of powder \$3, a bunch of red tape \$2, and the drink of marmalade \$1. The sale was ratified by the commissioners and recommended that a patent issue to the Mexican for the land, which was done. This matter is on record in the county clerk's office in Nacogdoches county.
