### ITEMS CULLED FROM THE LEADING LOCAL PAPERS

**COMANCHE.**  
More cotton was marketed in Comanche, Wednesday, Oct. 25, than on any previous day in the existence of the town. There were 900 bales sold on the streets by farmers and \$50,000 was paid out that day for the dry staple.

A case, noted in this section of the state on account of its peculiarly tragic details and because of its long pendency and frequent trials, has occupied the district court's time nearly all this week, having been transferred to our county on change of venue from Coleman county, where the killing occurred.

**PORTALES, N. M.**  
Editor Eagle:  
As the hum of the thresher is making sweet music for we "nesters" I just feel like telling the news thro the columns of the big Bird.

Well, first I will tell something of our crops here, this being really the first crop of real value raised in this section we all feel quite jubilant. Corn has averaged 50 bushels per acre, kauffir and milo maize 25 to 30 bushels per acre; some alfalfa 1 1/2 to 2 tons, besides we grow peas, beans, sweet potatoes and peanuts in abundance. While we have had quite a hard pull bringing this plains country to the front we feel assured now of success. There has been considerable cotton grown here this season. My neighbor, L. P. Jones, will average 1/2 bale per acre and will plant a big crop next year.

Now, as the fair at Roswell has just closed and the folks have returned feeling quite jubilant after seeing the sights in the Peecos Valley such as flowing wells, large apple orchards, etc., we would say that we feel more at home.

There is quite a number of new comers just now and homesteads are rapidly advancing in price. One claim (1/4 section) adjoining mine sold last week for \$900 cash with but little improvements on it. The S. P. McPherson claim relinquished for \$600.

Portales has a skimming plant to the Roswell creamery, so we all (everybody) goes once a day with their milk. They settle

with their patrons monthly. The average cow produces cream to the amount of \$1 per week. Now you can see what the good wife gets from her nine cows.

I have thirty hogs in the pen that will gross over 200 pounds each. So we expect to have sausage for Christmas. We feed them skimmed milk, pumpkin and corn.

This is a fine soil for a vine crop. We have lots of water-melons in the patch now, tho the light frost of last week killed most of the vines.

#### POLL TAX RECEIPTS.

It is important that every citizen secure his poll tax receipt before Feb. 1. In this connection it would be well to remember that a poll tax receipt can not be issued to an agent or representative, but must be delivered to the party in person. An agent can deliver an order containing the necessary information to the collector to secure the issuance of the receipt, but the collector must mail the receipt to the party in whose name it is issued and can not deliver it to the agent. Again, the collector can not issue a poll tax receipt on an order received over a telephone, neither can he issue a poll tax receipt in response to a letter received through the mail. The receipt can only be issued to a person who applies and answers the questions required or sends an order by a representative and answers the necessary questions.

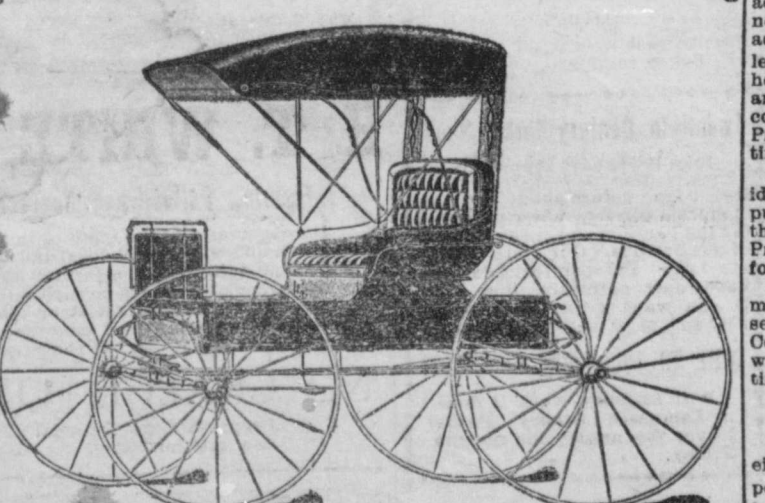

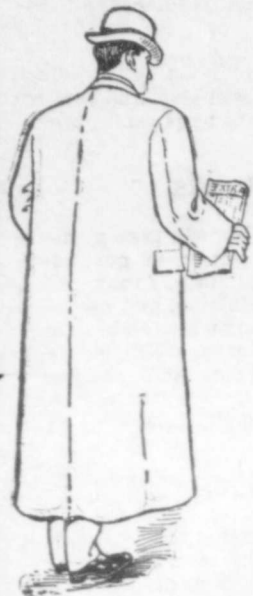
