BROWNWOOD.

D. A. Hise and Miss Carrie Cook were married Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock at the First Methodist church at Blanket.

It is reported that District Attorney James H. Baker will ask for the county judgeship this year and that County Judge S. C. Coffey will be a candidate for the office of district attorney.

M. V. Lane, who came here from Lometa about a month ago on a visit to the family of his daughter, Mrs. Lora Hamel, died Monday and was interred at Greenleaf cemetery Tuesday afternoon with Masonic honors. The deceased was more than seventy-five years of age and had been partially paralyzed.

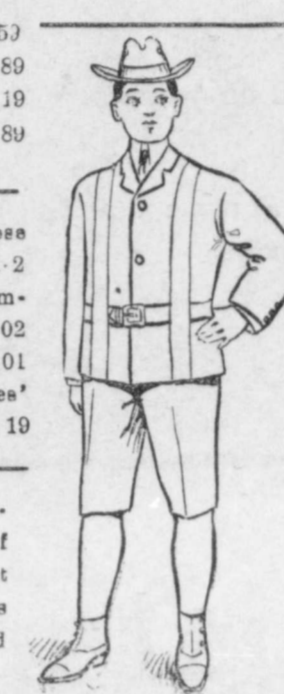

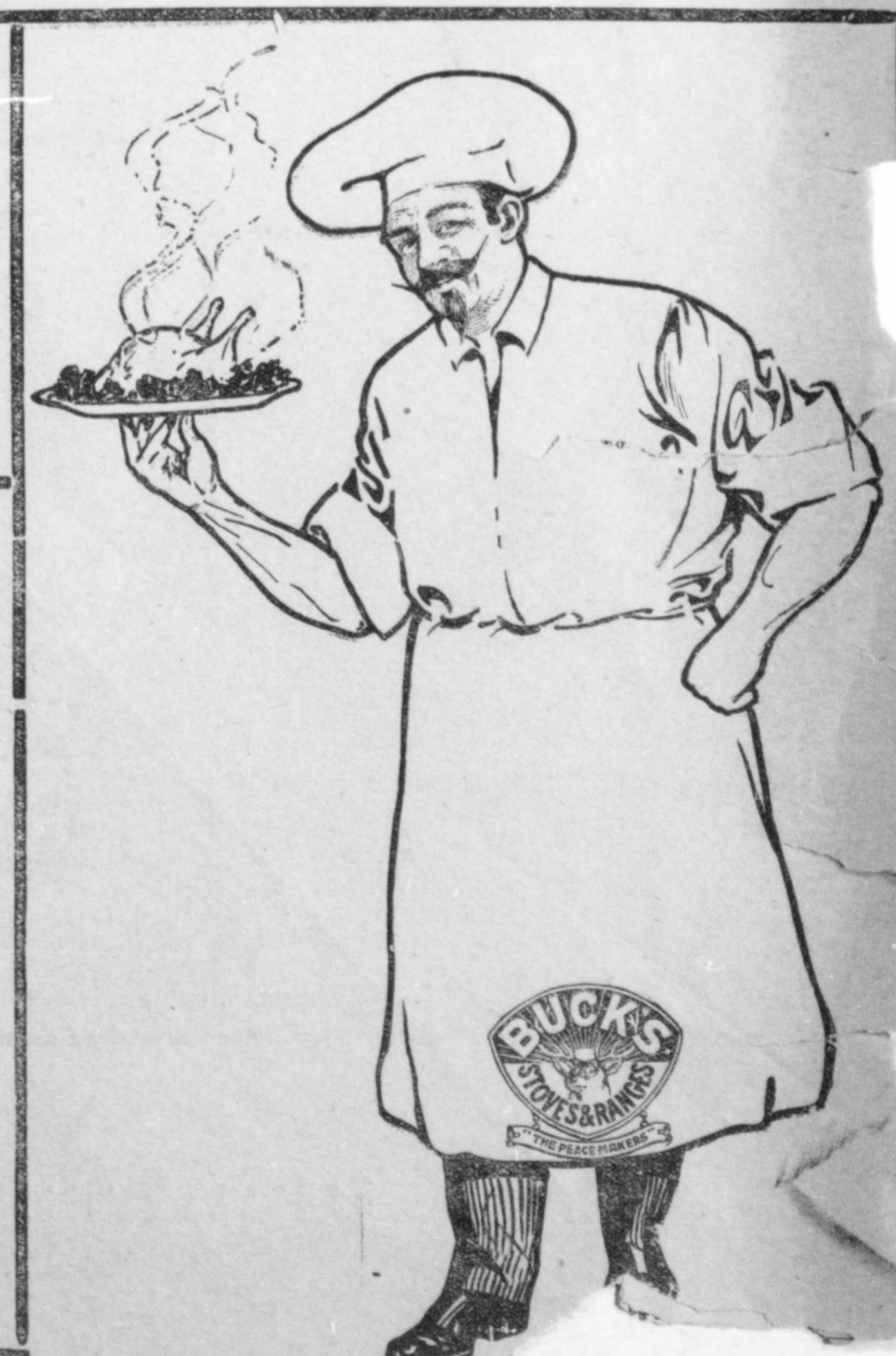

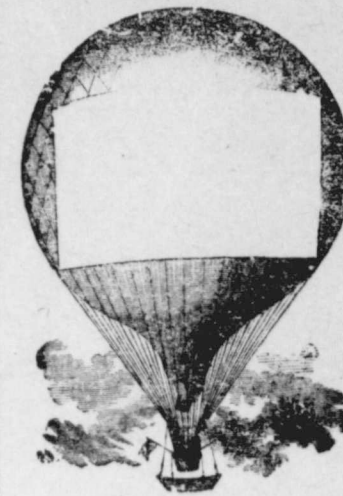
