## CEMETERY WORK.

The cemetery association met Thursday afternoon and received the report of the committee appointed to have a well sunk in the cemetery. The well was made by Martin McDonald for 40 cents per foot for the first 100 feet and 50 cents for the second.

The contract was for 60 cents for the third 100 feet, but plenty of water was reached at about 145 feet. Mr. McDonald donated \$5 to the association, leaving only \$58 to be paid to him for the work. Messrs. W. B. Jackson, J. H. Randolph and J. A. Allen were appointed to buy a pump and have it put in the well.

A committee composed of Messrs. James Rahl and John Hester and Mesdames W. W. Fowler and J. A. Allen was appointed to have the cemetery grounds cleaned off.

It is likely that another collection will have to be taken to pay for all the improvements necessary, but the people of Goldwaite can be depended upon to do their whole duty.

## PARK ASSOCIATION.

Those interested in purchasing grounds for a park and pleasure resort met in the court house Tuesday and organized the Mountain Park club with a capital stock of \$2,500. Forty-nine members were enlisted, leaving just one place to be filled. The stock is \$50 per share and the money is to be used in buying and improving a park some where near the city and the grounds will be in charge of the board of directors of the club. A charter is to be secured, which will provide that the capital stock can be doubled if desired by the club and that no assessments can be levied on the stock for expenses of maintenance. Messrs. E. H. Clements, W. B. Jackson, B. F. Geslin, E. B. Anderson and Dr. M. L. Brown were elected directors of the association.

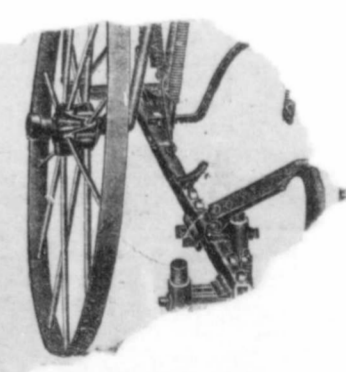
